LANE FACULTY TEACH ENERGY EFFICIENCY TO MID EAST COLLEAGUES

Two Lane instructors recently returned from Cyprus where they trained faculty from the American University of Beirut, Jordan University of Science and Technology, Birzeit University, and Palestinian Polytechnic University, in energy efficiency and energy auditing of commercial buildings.

Roger Ebbage and Mike Hatten teach in the two-year energy management technician program. They also train and certify practicing professionals in conservation and energy efficiency through the program's Northwest Energy Education Institute.

Ebbage and Hatten conducted a five-day workshop April 20-25 in Larnaca, Cyprus. Topics focused on environmental sustainability through energy efficiency, and renewable energy technology. The program included a cultural exchange covering the differences in energy use in the United States and Middle East. Participants will take the information back to their engineering departments and offer advisory services to government ministries and commercial establishments.

Participants included 12 mechanical engineers, two architects, one electrical engineer, one energy economy and engineering manager, and one environmental sciences instructor. Two were women.

The workshop was funded by a grant from the U.S. State Department. The Energy Management Program is entirely funded by the Eugene Water and Electric Board. For information about the program or NEEI, call 463-3977.

BOARD REPORT FOR MAY 14

The Board of Education began its May 14 meeting with affirmation from President Mary Spilde that Lane is committed to creating a respectful learning and working environment and that racial harassment will not be tolerated. Spilde said some name calling and offensive leafleting recently had been reported, and that she sent an all-staff e-mail and held an all-staff meeting to discuss concerns and remind everyone of college policies. She has formed a response team to develop a plan of action.

There were no statements from the audience.

In action, the board approved the supplemental budget for 2002/03 to transfer budget authority between expense functions to reflect anticipated expenditure levels, and approved an employee wellness start-up program, both by 5-0 vote.

Discussions included an accreditation self-study update, a workers compensation report, and a board retreat.

Lane's institutional effectiveness measurement plan, adopted in 1992, was reviewed. Lane currently tracks 12 primary effectiveness measures and 27 benchmarks. Information is used for accreditation, reporting to the state, internal planning, providing data to internal and external audiences, and other purposes. Lane may participate in a national benchmarking project in the future. More information is available at <http://www.lanecc.edu/research/index.htm>. Recent benchmarks on the importance of skills and effectiveness of training also were reviewed.

Faculty: do you know about the Library's Course Reserves program? Course Reserves are supplementary course materials that an instructor makes available to his/her students through the Library. Examples are: books, journal articles, class packs, homework assignments, case studies, sample exams.

They may be in print or electronic format. Print reserves are traditional hard copy items kept at the Reserve Desk in the Library. Electronic, or E-reserves, are digitized materials that are made available to students inside and outside of the library via computer. E-reserves are typically scanned versions of print reserves or links to articles and other types of documents in full-text electronic sources. E-reserves are available 24/7 to any registered student with Internet access. All course reserves are entered in the Lane Library catalog under instructor name and course name.
