### ACCREDITATION SELF-STUDY UPDATE

Taking pride in what we do well and identifying what we can do even better

Our Accreditation Self-study is a process where everything we do is reviewed with an eye toward continuous improvement of student learning. The Self-study is divided into nine separate standards. Each standard has a team of staff across the college conducting an audit to see how our work aligns with the college's mission, vision, core values and learning-centered principles. This alignment audit is the first phase of the Self-study process. ### INDOOR TEMPERATURES

Due to the recent change in weather, many indoor spaces at Lane have been hotter than normal. Lane's temperature settings for warm weather months are 74 to 77 degrees F. Facilities staff work to maintain ventilation and air conditioning equipment to ensure that temperatures stay within this range, however, occasionally indoor temperatures will rise above 77 degrees F. According to the most widely used standard for building operators, the acceptable temperature range for warm weather months is 73 to 79 degrees F. This standard is based on people doing light to primarily sedentary activity and wearing light slacks and a short-sleeved shirt.

Maintaining temperatures as close to outdoor temperatures as possible helps the college to save money and energy. Remembering to dress more lightly on warm days will help staff and students stay more comfortable. If you feel that temperatures are too high in your area, please contact Facilities, Management and Planning at ext. 5216. Facilities staff will check the temperature in your area as quickly as possible. If the temperature is higher than 79 degrees F, we will put a priority on checking and correcting the ventilation system. No item should be closer to the logo than a distance equal to the height of the letter "C" in the logo (this is known as the encroachment zone). The college logo is the only logo that should be used to represent college departments and programs, and it is required on most printed communication intended to go off campus. ### SUMMARY OF HARASSMENT COMPLAINTS AND OUTCOMES 2002/03

#### Formal complaints:

Sexual harassment: one formal complaint against a faculty member alleging inappropriate sexual comments/inappropriate touching and sexual relationships with students. There was a finding that an ongoing context of sexual comments and one incident of inappropriate touching did occur. Remedy was 20 hours of documented training before further student contact.

Racial harassment: one formal complaint by a student against a faculty member alleging racial harassment. There was no finding of ongoing harassment. There was a documented incident of inappropriate offensive language. Remedy was a written apology and attendance at diversity training.

#### Informal problems:

Sexual harassment: eight informal problems involved sexual harassment. Three were students having problems with staff members, four were students having problems with other students, one was a staff member having problems with other staff. Issues were sexual name-calling, inappropriate sexual comments, discomfort with physical contact, and perceived hostile learning environment. All resolved through individual and departmental education, one-on-one coaching and discussion, and assisting instructors to set boundaries in the classroom.

Racial harassment: seven informal problems involved racial harassment. Four were staff reporting problems with other staff, two were students reporting problems with staff, one was a student reporting a problem with another student. Issues included racial slurs, perceived hostile environment, name calling, and perceived hostile learning environment. Resolution through a campuswide response is ongoing with three of these complaints. Others resolved through mediated discussion, verbal and written apologies.

### JUNE BOARD REPORT

The Board of Education met June 11 and held a work session on board and college governance. A summary of the board's retreat June 6 and 7 noted that: the board intends to rescind the existing shared governance policy; the president is directed to create a governance system as opposed to a policy that stipulates a governance system; the system should value participation, collaboration and representation; the board does not intend to give away authority invested in them by statute or other board policy; there is concern about authority, accountability and responsibility; the president is responsible for the actions of the institution; the difference between governance and decisions remains unclear; and the role of labor leaders and councils in governance and board meetings needs further discussion. Questions arose about the term shared governance, and about the representativeness of appointed council members vs. elected union officials. The president will draft a governance policy for a first reading in July.

In regular meeting, Jay Bozievich was appointed to the Zone 2 position effective immediately through June 30 (see photo and more information at <http://www.lanecce.edu/instadv/authors/jac/re100544.htm> ).

The annual budget hearing was held; there were no speakers. The 2003/04 budget and related appropriations resolutions were adopted by 6-0 vote with Bozievich abstaining. The budget's general fund is \$68,944,572.

Under statements from the audience, instructor Bob Barber advocated for the term shared governance.

The consent agenda passed 6-0 including the workers compensation insurance contract to SAIF Corporation, president's annual authorizations for 2003/04, and budget transfer authorizations.

A demonstration of ExpressLane online registration system was given.

The Racial Harassment Response Team report was reviewed. The president said the team is ad hoc but has a lot of work to do, and that staff development funds will help pay for training. The president said Lane is committed to providing a respectful environment and will not tolerate racial harassment.

"Committed, decisive, and focused leadership at both local and state levels," was among the many accolades in President Mary Spilde's second annual evaluation. She "inspires confidence and a sense of stability even in these times of unstable funding," said board chair Roger Hall, and she is "a rare commodity in the community college system." The board's only concern was that the president use more leave time and adjust her "unsustainable workload." The president declined a salary increase for the second year in a row, stating she still wants the college on firmer financial ground first. She thanked and credited the board, her executive team, and all employees for their support, encouragement and teamwork.

Benchmarks were reviewed on students by age group, race/ethnicity of students, credit students gender and enrollment status, new credit students' reasons for attending Lane, and the employees of color as a percent of all employees. Benchmarks are collected in the Profile, an annual publication from Institutional Research, Planning and Evaluation available at <http://www.lanecc.edu/research/profcontents.htm>.

The board reviewed a monitoring report on the treatment of learners and consumers.

Rebecca Hill, student body president for 2003/04, was welcomed and gave her first report of student government activities.

Lane's highly acclaimed Rites of Passage summer academy for middle-school and high-school students of color will hold opening ceremonies on Monday, July 7, from 6-8 p.m. in the Center for Meeting and Learning, building 19, room 104, main campus. Everyone's invited.

The ceremonies mark the beginning of a five-week journey of self-discovery and actualization for 80 Lane County students. Rites of Passage has a four-fold mission: (1) to introduce African American, Asian/Asian American, Native American, and Latino/Latina students to the rich history, literature, folklore, and customs of their individual cultures; (2) to expose this population of students to the opportunities and possibilities of life-long education through the community college experience; (3) to prepare students for the demands and rigor of higher education in an environment that respects and nurtures their culture and community; and (4) to help these students develop positive self-esteem, confidence, and awareness essential for success in life. These goals are achieved through an academic framework and curriculum which celebrates the contributions of each culture to our nation and the world.
