UPDATES FROM COMPUTER SERVICES

ANTI-VIRUS / ANTI-SPAM: From Tuesday August 19 to Tuesday August 26, our anti-virus solution captured 17,000+ infected e-mails. During this same time period, the total number of e-mail connections were 108,000 and pop3 connections were 10,000. Last month the total number of infected e-mails was 696. As you can figure from these statistics, mail delivery may be slow due to system overloads. Since the implementation of anti-spam, there have been 60,000+ junk mails filtered from LCC employee mailboxes. The spam filtering also adds to the system load.

BLASTER WORM: The increase in infected e-mails is due to the proliferation of viruses that are currently circulating the Internet. It is very important that all computers that connect to Lane's network (desktop, laptop, and home) be patched. If you have not yet patched for the blaster worm please use the following URL to update your computer:

WILLIAM D. CARTER NEW STATE DIRECTOR FOR OSBSCN

William D. Carter was appointed to the position of state director for the Oregon Small Business Development Center Network effective August 1. Carter succeeds founding state director Sandy Cutler, who is retiring after 20 years.

ANNUAL POWER OUTAGE SCHEDULED

Sunday, September 14, Facilities electricians will cut all electrical power to main campus buildings. The outage will facilitate maintenance and repair to our 12,000-volt transformers and 12,000-volt switch gear equipment. The outage is scheduled to begin at 7 a.m. and continue until 7 p.m.

A number of permanently installed emergency generators will provide electricity for essential operations. KLCC and the instructional web server will be up and running. Facilities will provide an auxiliary generator for Lane TV, Channel 12 or 23, to keep it on the air during the outage. With the emergency generators in use, Facilities does not anticipate any disruption to the above listed operations.

In addition, Buildings 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 16, and 19 (Student Services, Business, Health Technology, Health & PE, Performing Arts, Science/Math, and Workforce Training) have generators which will provide emergency lighting. This lighting is not intended for working conditions. Staff should not be in the buildings during this outage.

Staff are encouraged to turn off computers and all other equipment that need power before 6 a.m. on Sunday, September 14, and preferably Friday, September 12, before the outage.

Please do not attempt to use the elevators during the outage. They will not work!

ALAN SIPORIN LEAVING KLCC**Two Retrospective Radio Shows and a Farewell Party Scheduled**

After 22 years on the air, KLCC's Alan Siporin is leaving his position as host of Critical Mass due to health problems. His last two shows on Sundays, September 7 and 14 at noon, will present a retrospective of his significant body of work. The shows will include snippets from Siporin's interviews with guests ranging from Ken Kesey to Lon Mabon, and issues as far reaching as the timber industry, gay rights and both Bush-Iraq wars. Listeners will enjoy the voices of Allen Ginsberg, Abbie Hoffman, Joan Baez, Caesar Chavez, Jesse Jackson, Dick Gregory and many others, including long-time KLCC caller Mel.

A farewell party for Siporin is planned for Wednesday, September 17, 5-7:30 p.m. at Tsunami Books, 2585 Willamette in Eugene. The public is invited to join the KLCC staff in wishing him well. Complimentary snacks will be provided.

During his 22-year tenure with KLCC, Siporin has produced and hosted the Blue Plate Special, a daily news magazine; Live Wire, an evening listener call-in program; and Critical Mass, his current listener call-in program. In addition to hosting and producing, he has served as an editor, trainer, commentator, and reporter. Siporin designed and has headed up KLCC's award winning Special Issues Unit for the past 12 years. He has been honored with more than 100 national and state awards for his reporting, commentaries, writing, use of sound, interviewing, and talk-show hosting. The ACLU and NAACP have also presented Siporin with awards in recognition of his significant service to the community. He is one of only two reporters ever presented with the Associated Press Tom McCall Award, given for exceptional reporting on quality of life issues.

Between 1983 and 1993, Siporin was National Public Radio's primary reporter for Oregon stories, producing more than one thousand feature and spot reports for national airing. He served as NPR's analyst during President Clinton's Forest Summit, and his commentaries have aired on NPR's Morning Edition and All Things Considered. He's also filled in as an editor at NPR. He served as moderator for Oregon's Gubernatorial Debate in 1994. He's written articles for

the New York Times and Northwest Magazine, and he wrote a regular editorial column for The Eugene Weekly. He contributed the chapter on activism to the Eugene City Club's history of Eugene, 1945-2000.

His first novel, *Fire's Edge*, published in 2002, was honored as the "Readin' in the Rain" selection for 2003.

Siporin designed and taught the PRNDI Project, a workshop for top level public radio reporters that produced a nationally-aired documentary each year, from 1992 through 1999, sponsored by the Public Radio News Directors. He's also taught at the Fishtrap Writers Conference and at Haystack Writers Conference, both in Oregon.

SMOKE TESTING FOR DRAINS SCHEDULED

On Wednesday, September 10, Weber Elliott Engineers will conduct smoke tests in the sanitary drain pipes throughout main campus. The tests should reveal whether any storm water drain pipes have been mistakenly connected to sanitary pipes.

The testing procedure involves plugging up the manholes between a section of the sanitary drain and introducing some non-irritating smoke into the pipes. The smoke will flow throughout the system and find any mistaken connections. Smoke flowing through mistaken connections will come out of the tops of the building roof, drains, and/or manholes of the storm water system. Once discovered, the pipes will be disconnected and rerouted.

Testing was scheduled after the meter that measures the volume of water entering the sewer lagoons through the sanitary drain pipes showed a greater flow than should be expected, possibly due to mistaken pipe connections or ground water entering through cracks in the sanitary pipes.

The smoke test is expected to last all day and may extend into the next day. Contact Susan Tatar in the Bond Office at 463-5727 if you have any questions.

BOARD REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER

Board of Education Chair Mike Rose opened the September 10 meeting with a moment of silence in observance of the eve of the second anniversary of the September 11 terrorist attacks.

Under statements from the audience, five students expressed concerns that student health services not be adversely impacted by a proposal to provide health services to staff at the student health clinic.

The consent agenda passed unanimously including approval of the July 9 and August 18 minutes; personnel appointments; and purchase of Banner DataMart software.

Policy review included a revision to the board's global governance policy (B.020) to include "compliance with Oregon Revised Statutes," and a revision to the board's asset protection policy clause on naming facilities (A.070) to include the naming of "substantial parts" of buildings, and "significant landscape features," both by unanimous vote. The board policy on executive directions (A.010) was revised to clarify that the "President shall assure that every activity, decision, or organizational circumstance shall be lawful, prudent, and in accord with commonly accepted business and professional ethics," by 6-1 vote, with

Shine voting no on grounds that the language suggests unreasonable expectations.

The board unanimously agreed to a recommendation from KLCC that any new facility purchased for the station be dedicated to public radio, and that purchase negotiations proceed.

The board agreed in concept with a proposal to offer health care services for staff at the student health clinic, provided that the proposal be developed in a collaborative manner, by 7-0 vote. Administration will report back to the board in October.

A benchmark report showed that 12.3 percent of the county population is enrolled at Lane. Another benchmark showed that from 1988/89 to 2003/04, faculty FTE decreased 3.7 percent; classified staff FTE increased 38.8 percent; management FTE decreased 26.4 percent; and student FTE rose 6.6 percent.

The meeting adjourned at 9:48 p.m. The board next meets on Tuesday, October 14 (a day earlier and a week later than usual). Submitted by Joan Aschim, Marketing and Public Relations.

HOW WILL STUDENTS OBTAIN THEIR NEW LTD/LCC BUS PASS/PHOTO ID AND STICKERS?

Please refer students to LTD's website for complete information on this process at http://www.ltd.org/site_files/riding_ltd/fastpass.htm

Here is a quick summary of how this process will work:

Students and staff taking credit classes on the main campus pay a \$15 non-refundable Transportation Fee each term. These students and staff qualify for the "free" LCC Bus Pass. All other students and staff registered for fall classes will pay a \$5 non-refundable Transportation Fee each term. They may purchase a Fast Pass Bus Pass for \$54, but do not qualify for the "free LCC LTD Bus Pass". Staff who have not registered for any fall classes, may also purchase a Fast Pass for \$54.

Students need to have an LTD Photo ID made which will serve as their "free" LCC Bus Pass. LTD will be on-campus on the following dates, times and locations. After October 1, students will need to go to the LTD bus station across from LCC Downtown Center to have an LTD Photo ID made.

FALL TERM TRAFFIC TIPS

Next week, with the start of fall term, we are expecting our traditional morning traffic congestion and lack of available parking spaces at the 30th Avenue campus. Public Safety is working to help ensure a smooth start to the term and a stress-free trip onto campus for all. You can help.

TAKE THE BUS: All credit students, and this includes staff taking credit classes, on the 30th Avenue campus are eligible for a free bus pass. Get your photo ID card and take the bus. More information on obtaining the bus pass is located at www.ltd.org/site_files/riding_ltd/fastpass.htm

Public Safety and LTD will again establish a contra-flow lane in the outward-bound lanes of Gonyea Road. This will allow the LTD buses to drive past the congestion in their own lane and get you to campus on time. No more sitting in traffic while the clock ticks away.

COME EARLY: Traffic usually starts backing up sometime around 8 a.m. Plan to arrive before the congestion gets serious, or plan additional time to cope with the results of the congestion. Coming early also allows you to select the lot and space in which you want to park.

PARK WHERE DIRECTED: If you arrive after the congestion starts, Public Safety officers will direct you into the next available parking space. There will be no choice of lots or spaces. We have found that this method gets cars parked more efficiently than having several thousand cars cruising the parking lots looking for spaces. Exceptions will be made for persons dropping off other persons and for persons with valid disabled permits.

PTECC REVIEWS PROGRAMS

Each month the Professional Technical Education Coordinating Committee (PTECC) interviews one of the Professional Technical Advisory Committees about its participation with the college program. Below are the committees that were reviewed in June and September.

June Advisory Committee Review: The Professional Skills Program is a unique program that helps students that are injured workers find new careers and complete a certificate in one year or less. About four years ago a program called Occupational Skills was added that allows students that are not injured workers to complete a one-year certificate in a variety of different career areas for which Lane does not have a degree. The program is student centered and most of the learning takes place on a work site. The programs were commended for their flexibility for students, the strong partnerships with the community through the co-op placements and the advisory committee itself. September Advisory Committee Review: The Energy Management Program at Lane Community College is one of the only colleges in the United States that offers such a program. The advisory committee is comprised of local practitioners in the field, several of them also teach classes for the program at Lane. THE COPIA LECTURE SERIES RESUMES

The Copia Lecture Series resumes on Saturday, September 27 at 7:30 p.m. at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 13th and Pearl in Eugene, with a presentation entitled, "The Aramaic Jesus: Language and our Relationship to the Divine."

The presentation will be led by Pam Birrell, Ph.D., clinical psychologist, mental health practitioner, and member of the University of Oregon's Psychology Department faculty and of St. Mary's church. She will be helped by other participants in St. Mary's Saturday evening Circle Service, an alternative service held at St. Mary's Episcopal Church based on community and commitment to a vision of equals coming together to worship.

Framing the presentation within Wittgenstein's assertion that "the limits of our language are the limits of our world," Birrell writes about the lecture: "This summer the Circle Service did a series of services on the Lord's Prayer as translated from the Aramaic language that Jesus actually spoke. We not only learned of many nuances and meanings that the English version misses, we also experienced the power of the language itself.

"Indeed, the most profound spiritual and religious experiences are beyond words, and yet we must somehow put them into words. Jesus gave words to his experience of divine unity 2000 years ago--words that can still resonate in the depths of our beings. And yet, encountering the words of Jesus in his native language can open us to new ways of experiencing and relating to that divinity that lives within and among us. In fact, the Aramaic language makes no distinction between within and among. Come join us for what we learned in our encounter with the Aramaic Jesus this summer at the Circle Service."

Public Safety and LTD will again establish a contra-flow lane in the outward-bound lanes of Gonyea Road. This will allow the LTD buses to drive past the congestion in their own lane and get you to campus on time. No more sitting in traffic while the clock ticks away.

Come early: Traffic usually starts backing up sometime around 8 a.m. Plan to arrive before the congestion gets serious, or plan additional time to cope with the results of the congestion. Coming early also allows you to select the lot and space in which you want to park.

Park where directed: If you arrive after the congestion starts, Public Safety officers will direct you into the next available parking space. There will be no choice of lots or spaces. We have found that this method gets cars parked more efficiently than having several thousand cars cruising the parking lots looking for spaces. Exceptions will be made for persons dropping off other persons and for persons with valid disabled permits.
