If you are using the ExpressLane class lists, you are likely to see the words "confidential" next to some students names on your ExpressLane class lists.

This indicator means that the student has filed a form with Students First! which restricts anyone from releasing directory information on this student, without written permission from the student.

Therefore, please do not distribute a class list or roster showing a student's name with the words "confidential" on your list. If the student with the "confidential" indicator has given you written permission to release this to the class you may do so. Some instructors have asked the student for a pseudonym instead of their real name and that has been acceptable to the student and still meets FERPA standards.

EXPRESSLANE IS BUSY AND SMOOTH

On Monday, the first day of fall term, Lane had 4,911 unique (each person counted once no matter how many times they visited) visitors to ExpressLane, reports Associate Vice President for Information Technology Stephen Pruch. That was the highest count to date and was 30 percent more than on any other day. Only one report of slow response came in, at 5:20 a.m. "Response was excellent. I still believe that we have an SCT/Oracle problem to resolve and we could still experience slowness until then, but the system did well." On Sunday, Lane had over 2,000 unique visitors to ExpressLane: all individuals who received service on a day when staff were at home and the campus was closed. From the editor.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. We will look at our own cultures and identities and how they are "interactive," rather than "additive." We'll very briefly look at population realities for who makes up the U.S., schools, and the workforce with factors such as race, age, economics, and immigration and review some "diversity definitions," such as stereotype, power, privilege, and prejudice. We'll participate in a few short consciousness-raising exercises that deal with issues of disability and sexual orientation. Then we'll view the award winning video, "Blue Eyed," which deals, primarily, with race and ethnicity, but can be used as a vehicle to think about diversity issues generally. We'll use the video as a touchstone to talk about some general issues of diversity. We'll wrap up with some ideas about taking an adversary path versus taking an ally path. OSPIRG's general goal is to eliminate unnecessary publications of new editions, and minimize the practice of bundling throughout the textbook industry. The second issue we're raising awareness for is the toxic state of the Willamette River. Each year over 4 million pounds of foreign materials are dumped into our river, many containing dangerous amounts of lead, mercury, and dioxin. Last year OSPIRG was able to get Governor Kulongoski to pledge to clean up the river in his campaign. This term we will make him keep his promises, and promote permanent removal of chemical discharges, while ensuring the polluters, not the taxpayers, are held accountable. Our third campaign is fighting hunger and homelessness. The national average for a hungry person in the states is nine years old, and Lane County is no exception. With budget cuts on the rise, there is even less help than before to lend a helping hand. Through the combined efforts of OSPIRG and local homeless shelters, we are working to find effective solutions to this huge problem. Currently, OSPIRG is planning National Hunger and Homelessness Week at Lane. KLCC MEETS RADIOTHON GOAL WITH HALF-HOUR TO SPARE

\$250,000 goal reached in just under a week

ALGEBRA SEQUENCE WINS \$398,484 FIPSE GRANT

Lane Community College has been selected to receive a FIPSE grant under the Comprehensive Program of the United States Department of Education. The award is for \$398,484 federal dollars to fund a year of planning and two years of implementation, research, and dissemination. The comprehensive program of the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education encourages projects that are inclusive, action-oriented, innovative, bold-thinking, and responsive to practitioners.

The program, called Flexible Sequence Algebra, creates and pilots a new curriculum and teaching approach for developmental algebra. FSA seeks to provide the benefits of flexible pacing, modular instruction, and variable credit classes while maintaining the structure and support of instructor-led classes. In each course section, the material is broken into two-week long modules that are taught sequentially. However, if a student fails a particular module he or she moves into a "trailing" section, repeats the failed module, and then continues additional modules in the appropriate sequence. Because different sections are overlapping and start with different modules, students can be placed more effectively, and gain course credit for individual modules as they complete them. BOARD REPORT FOR OCTOBER

The George Alvergue Conference Room was christened by the Board of Education on October 14 at a special reception for him on the fourth floor of the Center Building. Alvergue is a highly regarded former board member and retired social science instructor who championed the remodel of the fourth floor.

A resolution honoring past board member and current state representative Robert Ackerman passed 7-0 during regular session. Ackerman served on the board from 1965-73 and 1999-2003. Recalling some highlights from his terms of service, he said his best moment was hiring President Mary Spilde.

A plaque was awarded to Roger Hall in appreciation for his outstanding leadership as board chair in 2002/03. He chaired the board twice before and has served on the board since 1991.

Lane's diversity plan was reviewed in work session and regular session. There was board enthusiasm for the plan, but some concern how to implement and fund all of the recommendations. President Mary Spilde said staff will review cost concerns and recommend some priorities.

Board Resolution 489 opposing the repeal of House Bill 2152 drew widespread interest. There were 17 statements from the audience including 10 supporting the resolution, 6 opposing, and one unrelated. Board discussion raised questions about the board's purview to issue resolutions, how the resolution might impact signature gathering, and how repeal would impact Lane's funding. Motions to postpone the vote to December and to revise the resolution both failed 5-2, with Jay Bozievich and Paul Holman in the minority. The resolution passed 5-2, same split.

The consent agenda passed 7-0 including purchase of a telephone switching system from Verizon Northwest.

The board reviewed its policy on board membership. They also held first-reading reviews of board policies on educational program, appraisal and evaluation of operation, personnel, and budget making, with some minor language changes.

Budget Committee appointments approved unanimously were Jerry Sirois, recently retired from Counseling, to Zone 3; Rick Yecny to Zone 1; and Bert Dotson to Zone 5, effective immediately for three-year terms ending June 30, 2006.

Two benchmarks were reviewed. One showed that unduplicated student headcount declined 14.2 percent since last year, from 40,099 to 34,394, although total headcount since 1986/87 increased 10.4 percent. The other benchmark showed a decline in FTE of 6.8 percent since last year: transfer fell 1.2 percent, professional-technical fell 2.7 percent, developmental declined 16.6; and other reimburseable fell 29.6 percent.

The meeting adjourned at 10:10 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting is Wednesday, November 12. After approval, minutes are posted to the web at <http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm> . Submitted by Joan Aschim, Marketing and Public Relations.

DIVERSITY WORKSHOP RESCHEDULED

ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES CLASSES CONDUCTED WASTE AUDIT - RESULTS HIGHLIGHT NEED FOR RECYCLING

On October 23, students enrolled in two Environmental Studies courses at Lane sorted through trash from October 22. These students sorted through 776 pounds of garbage. This was less than half of the garbage generated on the previous day. Of the 776 pounds, 262 pounds, or 34%, was recyclable. 16% was recyclable paper. 10% was recyclable metal. 5% was recyclable glass and 3% was recyclable plastic. Another 262 pounds, or 34%, of the trash was compostable food, paper towels, and napkins. 5% of the garbage was disposable cups and the remaining 28% was "waste."
