RECYCLING PAPER SAVES MONEY

During 2002/03, Lane Community College recycled 111 tons of paper and cardboard and earned over \$4,000 by selling this material to Weyerhaeuser Recycling. Throwing this same material away would have cost \$6105. Thanks for making the effort to recycle so much paper and cardboard last year. A recent waste audit revealed that 16 percent of our garbage is still recyclable paper. This means that we paid approximately \$3,520 to throw away 64 tons of recyclable paper. Recyclable paper includes white and colored printer and copy paper, notebook paper, post-its, file folders, NCR paper, newspaper, magazines, brochures, thin cardboard (cereal box), paper ream wrappers, and envelopes. Envelopes with windows and labels are accepted. Paper with staples is also accepted. Paper that should not be recycled is paper plates, paper cups, paper towels, napkins, carbon paper, and non-tearing paper-plastic blends. SELF-STUDY: LANE'S 2004 ACCREDITATION

At the Fall 2003 All-College Gathering, we engaged in a discussion about a collegewide planning process that would align our daily work with who we say we are and want to become. This college system of planning must be coherent, consistent, clearly communicated, and connected so that our work relates to each other.

As we continue to all contribute to building Lane's story, the following statements will show how using Plan, Do, Check, Act can ensure that our work supports the learning of our students. Using this planning process at a collegewide level will be important as we prepare for our accreditation in October 2004.

"Frustrated by students failing to read text before coming to class, I planned an activity based on responding to the assigned reading. I used that activity for two terms (do) then asked students (at the end of the term) to offer me feedback re: activity (check.) Finally, I will use that feedback to change/streamline the activity to use again (act.) However, I know now that with this activity students are reading the text more often." A factor that diminishes the amount of time a used textbook remains viable is the frequency with which a new textbook edition is produced, since a new edition tends to make all older editions obsolete and unusable. Another factor increasing cost is additional instructional materials, such as a workbook or a CD, packaged with the core textbook. OSPIRG believes there is a strong case to make for certain textbook publishers to alter their production practices, such as producing supplemental guides to main editions that faculty can choose to order. USE THE TUTOR CENTER

WORKLOAD RELIEF

Classified staff at Lane have indicated that their workload has been increasing over the years to the point of being unmanageable. The college has budgeted \$40,000 to support classified staff to take time out of their schedule in order to assess their responsibilities, identify "crunch time", redesign processes to improve effectiveness, and to do "less with less".

One of the proposals for streamlining classified work focuses on instructional administrative coordinators and specialists. A committee whose charge it is to identify ways to streamline the workload for administrative coordinators and specialists in instruction was convened September 26 of this year. It has been funded and received board approval prior to the first meeting. Members of this committee are: Christine Marshall, Kirsa Whedon, Denine McMurren, Jana Nelson, Lynne Phillips, Jane Russell, Andrea Newton, and Ken Murdoff.

Two questions to be answered by this committee are: 1) "What are the key factors that contribute to the increasing workload of administrative coordinators and specialists?" and 2) "How can those key factors be mitigated in a cost-effective manner?" The work of the Less with Less Committee, as it has been named, will conclude by March 1, 2004 with the submission of it's recommendations for streamlining workload being made to the executive team. Because of the necessary interconnection of the work of the instructional administrative coordinators and specialists with all other areas of the college, the committee will be asking for input from individuals in these other areas as the work of the committee proceeds. NOVEMBER BOARD REPORT

The Lane Community College Board of Education approved fiscal year 2004/05 budget assumptions and projections at its November 12 meeting. The projections show that Lane will be able to maintain current service levels this year and for the next two years. A deficit is forecast for 2006/07. The projections are available at http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/0405/budget0405.html.

The president was authorized to sign an agreement to purchase a building at 136 West 8th Avenue in Eugene for KLCC's future home. The \$975,000 sale price includes a \$50,000 two-year option agreement. The purchase will be paid by fundraising.

In other action, the board approved the classified union contract for 2003-08; and revisions to its policies on educational program, appraisal and evaluation of operation, and personnel.

First reading reviews were held for board policies on budget making, budget officer designation, budget preparation and adoption, and board officer designation. The board reviewed a benchmark for grants and contracts, the quarterly financial report, and a status report on the accreditation self-study.

Guests Andrea Henderson and David Bridgham provided a legislative review and discussed Oregon Community College Association goals for 2003/04.

In a work session, the board held a strategic conversation with local K-12 leadership (watch The Daily for more information on this discussion).

When bad weather strikes, tune in radio or television news to find out if there are any college closures or delays. In the meantime, review the following frequently asked questions and answers. Q. HOW DO WE KNOW FOR SURE THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?

A. When the decision is made to close the college, the college immediately notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other news media. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Please do not call the media because this interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information. Closures are reported to:

Q. WHAT IF I AM HEARING IMPAIRED?

A. A. Hearing impaired people should check for a visual display of closure information on the TV stations noted above.

Q. WHAT ABOUT COLLEGE LEARNING CENTERS AT HIGH SCHOOLS?

A. Lane Community College learning centers at high schools follow the host high school's closure schedule.

Q. WHEN WILL WE KNOW THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?

A. Weather closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m. Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day but will open for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

Q. WHAT DO DELAYS MEAN?

A. If the opening of classes is delayed, students and faculty should report to the class or lab they would normally have been attending at the new starting time, if at least 50 minutes of class/lab time remains. For example, if opening is delayed to 10 a.m., classes and labs that normally begin at 10 a.m. or are already in session at 10 a.m. would meet, but only if the normal ending time for that class or lab is 10:50 a.m. or later. The remainder of the day would continue on the regular schedule.

Q. IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED, SHOULD STAFF REPORT FOR WORK?

A. When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions otherwise from their supervisor or hear such instructions in the news announcements. If one or more facilities are closed and others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

Q. ARE THERE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES?

A. When 30th Avenue is icy, some people drive in from the east via Franklin, or ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, drivers may choose alternate routes. An LTD route change does not necessarily indicate a college closure.

Q. WILL STAFF GET PAID?

A. The College Online Policy and Procedure System (COPPS) states under Pay: School Closure, General Guidelines For Compensation: "All bargaining unit members, part-time credit instructors and management employees scheduled to work on the school closure day should be paid as if they worked their regular schedule. Employees required to work when the school is closed on a regularly scheduled work day should be provided time off with pay on a straight-time basis." See http://www.lanecc.edu/cops/closure.htm.
