LANE WEATHERS SNOW AND ICE CLOSURES

Lane Community College closed 2003 and welcomed 2004 with snow closures and delays, as follows: Monday, December 29: snow; main campus, Downtown Center and Cottage Grove center closed by 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, December 30: snow; main campus, DTC, and Flight Tech closed; Cottage Grove and Florence open. Wednesday, December 31: all locations open. New Year's Day: a holiday, and six inches, more or less, of snow. Friday, January 2: all locations delayed two hours, except Florence, which held regular hours. Monday, January 5: snow and freezing rain; all locations closed except Florence. Tuesday, January 6: ice and freezing rain, all locations closed except Florence. Wednesday, January 7: all locations open by noon; Florence open as usual. The last time severe weather closed Lane was on February 7, 2002, due to a windstorm. DECEMBER BOARD REPORT

The participation of 600 citizens serving on 45 program advisory committees was approved by 7-0 vote at the December 10 Board of Education meeting. Committee members represent business, industry, labor, and the community. A new committee this year is the Specialized Employment Services Advisory Committee.

Tuition was adjusted for inflation effective summer 2004, from \$63 to \$64.50 per credit hour, following a 7-0 vote under the tuition indexing policy adopted in November 2002.

Administration was authorized by unanimous vote to renegotiate its license agreement for Oracle software with the maker, for an amount not to exceed \$122,000.

Administration was directed to conduct a cost-benefit study of the active recruitment of international students, including social benefits, by 7-0 vote. Earlier in the evening, four international students described a successful experience at Lane and in the community, under Statements from the Audience.

Also under Statements, Stan Taylor, faculty bargaining chair, discussed faculty negotiations and advocated for comparable pay.

Second readings of existing board policies were held on budget making, budget officer, budget preparation and adoption, and board officers. Each was approved by unanimous vote. Some included minor language revisions. The personnel policy was removed because it recently had been reviewed.

First reading reviews of existing board policies were held on financial planning and budgeting, financial condition and activities, emergency president succession, asset protection, and communication and support to the board.

First readings on proposed budget development policies were held including definition of a balanced budget, ending fund balance, stabilization reserve fund, capital

reserve funds, budgeting of nonrecurring resources, inter-fund transfers, and general fund contingency. Some revisions were made for consistency.

The academic calendar for 2004/05 was approved by 7-0 vote. The action followed a motion by Jay Bozievich, seconded by Paul Holman, to rename the holiday break a Christmas break, which failed 5-2.

In other unanimous action, the board authorized the president to award management working conditions for 2003/04, not to exceed that which was settled classified staff.

Benchmarks reviewed included goal accomplishment of former students; employment of professional technical students in jobs related to their training; professional technical student satisfaction; and transfer student satisfaction. The board also reviewed a summary of indicators from a national community college benchmarking project.

The meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting is January 14. Minutes are posted to the web after approval at <http://www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm>. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, Native American language instructor at Lane, offers the following Native American words for the week. "Weechasha" is the Lakota (Sioux) word for "man." In the AIL 100 "Foundations of American Indian Languages" course this winter term, participants learn how Native Americans see themselves in relation to the rest of their environment and other beings on the planet, and in the skies. "Weecha" (the first two syllables of the word above) literally means "a man" (basically a gender reference) and "sha" (the last syllable), "adornment." "Sha" is short for another important Lakota word, "sha-eek-ee-ye" which means "to dress up." On a deeper level, however, "sha" means achievement in education, maturity, and responsibility. A man who has these spiritual values is no longer a boy "hok-shee-la." So when a man "weechasha" makes a decision, he is not a "real" man unless he is truthful, follows through with his decisions, is dependable, and courteous. Traditionally a young man must reach this status before marrying and starting a family.

COPIA LECTURE SERIES

The Copia Lecture Series continues on Saturday, January 17, at 7:30 p.m. at St. Mary's Episcopal Church, 13th and Pearl in Eugene, with Lane physics instructor Dennis Gilbert giving a lecture entitled, "The Future of the Academy, Faculty, and the Soul of Humanity." SCHOLARSHIP BOOK OFFERS HUNDREDS OF OPPORTUNITIES

Students facing high tuition and a slow economy may find relief in scholarship opportunities at Lane. Nearly 300 different awards are available ranging from \$150 to \$5,000. Each is described in a publication just released by the Lane Community College Foundation, 2004-2005 Scholarship Opportunities. The book is available at Career and Employment Services on main campus in Building 1, at high school counseling offices throughout Lane County, and at www.lanecc.edu/foundation.htm.

Scholarship donations are up 25 percent, says Foundation Director Janet Anderson, for a total award fund of about \$465,000. "That represents over 90 new scholarships and some that have increased in size."

Eligibility criteria vary widely. Some require enrollment in a certain program, financial need, academic merit, or other factors. For example, there's a \$250 award for small business owners, and a \$1,000 scholarship for students from a Pacific Rim nation. If your reading skills fall below the 8th grade level, you may qualify for a \$500 award. If you need money to pursue a professional technical career or a transfer degree, you can apply for a \$5,000 scholarship. There's a \$2,000 award for students who attend classes full time at Lane's Florence center. The possibilities go on for 24 pages. The scholarship book includes an application and instructions. The deadline to apply is March 1.

But last January at LCC, 81 staff members and students scheduled appointments during a two-day blood drive. "Those numbers are awesome," said Christine Stockdale, Lane Memorial Blood Bank's community relations representative. "The timing couldn't have been better as we had been seeing a high usage of many blood types and it has been a struggle to keep the blood supply adequate to meet all the needs."

Donors must be 16 years of age or older, be in good health, weigh at least 110 pounds, and must wait eight weeks since the last donation. Certainly, there are reasons a person cannot donate -- for example, a history of hepatitis, being an insulin-dependent diabetic, having certain respiratory or cardiac conditions, or testing positive for the HIV virus. And some medications and antibiotics may disqualify a potential donor. If you have a personal question about your eligibility to donate, call LMBB at 484-9111 and ask to speak with a nurse.

The Bloodmobile will be on the LCC campus on Thursday, January 29 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. If you're interested and are eligible to donate blood during this campus visit, please call or email Judy Ann Fuller (at ext. 5564 or fullerj@lanecc.edu) and identify the time you prefer to donate.

The entire process takes only 45 minutes, but your donation will help local people encountering loss of blood products due to auto accidents, burns, surgeries, childbirth and chemotherapy. There is no substitute for human blood, yet only 5 percent of eligible donors actually give blood each year.

But last January at LCC, 81 staff members and students scheduled appointments during a two-day blood drive. "Those numbers are awesome," said Christine Stockdale, Lane Memorial Blood Bank's community relations representative. "The timing couldn't have been better as we had been seeing a high usage of many blood types and it has been a struggle to keep the blood supply adequate to meet all the needs."

Donors must be 16 years of age or older, be in good health, weigh at least 110 pounds, and must wait eight weeks since the last donation. Certainly, there are reasons a person cannot donate -- for example, a history of hepatitis, being an insulin-dependent diabetic, having certain respiratory or cardiac conditions, or testing positive for the HIV virus. And some medications and antibiotics may disqualify a potential donor. If you have a personal question about your eligibility to donate, call LMBB at 484-9111 and ask to speak with a nurse.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, Native American language instructor at Lane, offers the following Native American word for the week. "Weechasha" is the Lakota (Sioux) word for "man." In the AIL 100 "Foundations of American Indian Languages" course this winter term, participants learn how Native Americans see themselves in relation to the rest of their environment and other beings on the planet, and in the skies. "Weecha" (the first two syllables of the word above) literally means "a man" (basically a gender reference) and "sha" (the last syllable), "adornment." "Sha" is short for another important Lakota word, "sha-eek-ee-ye" which means "to dress up." On a deeper level, however, "sha" means achievement in education, maturity, and responsibility. A man who has these spiritual values is no longer a boy "hok-shee-la." So when a man "weechasha" makes a decision, he is not a "real" man unless he is truthful, follows through with his decisions, is dependable, treats women and children with respect, and courteous with respect to other two-legged peoples, and animals. Traditionally a young man must reach this status before marrying and starting a family.

BOARD REPORT FOR JANUARY

The Lane Community College Board of Education extended the fundraising deadline for the long house to April 2005, by 7-0 vote at its January 14 meeting. A related motion to allocate board contingency funds to the project failed. "I love the sentiment of the motion and we will consider this in our budget development process," said President Mary Spilde, who suggested the board revisit the idea if needed. Another

motion to approach the new Florence casino for funding failed given that fundraisers already would be considering this. Earlier in the evening under Statements from the Audience, Frank Merrill recalled the history of the long house project and his many years at Lane in the Native American program. He said he hopes the long house is built soon. "My future family is coming this way."

Strategic directions to guide the college for the next three to five years were approved by 7-0 vote. The directions emphasize transforming student lives, transforming the learning environment, and transforming the organization. The directions will be posted to the web and distributed around campus.

Action on the economic agreement between the college and the faculty association was postponed because faculty ratification was delayed by weather closures. The agreement was unanimously approved at a special telephone meeting January 20.

The board completed second readings of several existing policies and new policies, and conducted first reading reviews of other existing policies. Also reviewed were a benchmark on gender and race/ethnicity of students, and an update on the accreditation self-study.
