SLIDE SHOW TELLS STORY OF RED SEA MURALS

Tom Madison and the American Association of Women in Community College would like you to join them for a presentation of "108 Days in the Saudi Sun," a slide show and lecture on the negotiating, planning and execution of 12,000 square feet of murals inside and outside a private aquarium on the Red Sea Coast of Saudi Arabia. The presentation will be held Wednesday, March 3, at noon in Building 19, Room 102. The AAWCC is sponsoring the event and providing refreshments.

Over a two-year period in the late 1990s, Madison traveled back and forth between Saudi Arabia and the U.S. to inspect, negotiate, research, and oversee wall preparation and paint large-scale murals of life-sized, indigenous Red Sea flora and fauna, from clown fish to minke whales. All were rendered in their appropriate habitat at a private aquarium on the west coast of Saudi Arabia. Madison's company, Madison Design, specializes in marine biology illustration. His work with the Oregon Coast Aquarium, the Oregon State University Hatfield Marine Science Center, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association and other marine organizations paved the way to the mural work in Saudi Arabia. Madison continues to travel to Saudi Arabia on an annual basis to perform maintenance on the existing murals, as well as design new buildings and interiors for the private palace and other ventures spawned from his business there. He also takes a cultural anthropology approach to his travels and has studied Arabic culture and women's rights and Islam, and was a guest lecturer on the latter subject for the AAWCC in the past. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, Native American language instructor at Lane, offers the following Native American word for the week. The Hopi word "Qu-TIM-mua" is used to refer to the dried out husk or corn plant once it has died. This material all dissipates back into the

ground. The same word is also used to refer to the dead body of a human. Hopis believe that the corn plant is very sacred because the Hopis eat the corn to sustain life, and this spiritual principle emanates from the "Katsina" or "Kachina" or the "life giving force of Nature." When the corn plant dies and the human body dies, the spirit or soul of the corn and the human live on in another spirit world or existence, or life after death. Hopis believe humans only take with them the good qualities such as generosity, humor, service, humility, respect, reverence, into the next existence or spirit world after we die. The corn feed humans; when we die we leave our breath, and when corn is baked it leaves steam, and that steam and our breath rises to the sky, becomes Kachinas, forming clouds, which bring rain to water the corn and the circular cycle continues indefinitely. When it's about to rain, Hopis say "the Kachinas are coming" and these "beings" are immortalized in the famous Kachina dolls of the great Southwest. Native languages are intimately wrapped up with Native religious beliefs, and the cooperation between humans and all other beings on the planet, as well as art, music, and literature.

FINANCIAL FREEDOM COURSE STRESSES LIFE OVER MONEY

Lane is offering an eight-week community education course called Your Money or Your Life which will focus on getting out of debt, living better on less, and creating a lifestyle that provides the time to do the things that are really important to us. Based on the best-selling book of the same name, this class is for those stuck on the earn more/spend more treadmill, who feel like their finances are out of control, or that they don't have enough time or money. The class is based on a groundbreaking nine-step program for financial freedom and a new way of looking at money and paid employment. Course instructors Dale Lugenbehl and Sandy Aldridge retired in their 40s from their jobs as part-time college instructors after following the ideas in the Your Money or Your Life program. They have taught this class numerous times and have been featured in Kiplinger Personal Finance magazine.

According to Lugenbehl, "Many people find that their jobs almost completely take over their lives, leaving only scraps of their time and energy for everything else. To make matters worse, the jobs that many people have are dulling, tedious, without meaning, and frequently conflict with their deepest beliefs about what is right and wrong. Life often seems like an endless treadmill of working in order to buy things which ultimately do not make us happy. Meanwhile, we have this uneasy sense that the way we are living is destroying the natural world and the health of our environment which keeps us all alive. But life does not really have to be this way."

BOARD REPORT MARCH 2004

ASLCC ballot measures for the student election to be held May 10, 11 and 12 were approved by 7-0 vote at the March 10 Lane Community College Board of Education meeting. There are seven fee measures: \$5 for athletics and recreational sports; \$1 for the child care co-op; \$1 for a child care subsidy; \$1 for student clubs and organizations; \$1 for the international student program; \$1 for the women's program; and \$1.44 for ASLCC.

In other action, the board approved purchasing the Electronics Annex modular buildings currently under lease.

Second readings of board policies on college governance, parliamentary procedure, and global board-president relationship were approved, and first readings were held on board policies on delegation to the president, and contractual authority.

President Mary Spilde said feedback on the college governance proposal includes concerns about workload impact, release time, decision turn-around time, and others. The final governance document will be presented for board approval in April.

Updated budget projections show a reduction in tuition revenue due to enrollment trends, reported Vice President Marie Matsen. While the projected bottom line for this year and next still looks good, Matsen cautioned against complacency because state funding is still the college's major source of revenue.

Other reports covered outcomes from the board's strategic conversation with school district superintendents; cash flow; and accreditation standards.

Under Statements from the Audience, several people advocated for reinstating baseball; and several others encouraged the board to allow the ASLCC financial ballot measures to go to the students for a vote.

A benchmark on employee headcount showed decline from budget reductions, vacancies, and substantial completion of bond construction.

The meeting adjourned at 9:28 p.m. The next regular meeting is set for Wednesday, April 14, at 6:30 p.m. in the Boardroom, Building 3. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, American Indian Languages instructor at Lane, offers the following Native American word for the week. The Choctaw word "TEEK-EEN-ha-SHEE," pronounced with vocal stress or accents on the syllables in capital letters, and a nasalized sound for "EEN," literally means "Women's Month." This reference illustrates that as the vernal equinox moves the calendrical cycle into spring, March 21 or 22 is a sacred season bringing forth a new year; concurrent with that is the implicit belief that women are regarded as sacred and must be treated with respect, because they bring new life into the world. In their traditional Choctaw calendar, "TEEK-EEN-ha-SHEE" designated approximately what we now call March-April, and among the first fruits of this new year are the mulberries, whose name is subsequently used for the month of May, "ha-SHEE-BEE-hee," or "mulberry month." In the AIL 100 Foundations of American Indian Languages course this spring term, students will explore Native views of gender and how sacredness is not only attached to the land, but also to the whole female population and their ability to bring forth new life, which is also observed in nature, by the eventual appearance of the mulberries which feed the people. This springtime "new year" seems much more logical than the Gregorian January 1, in the middle of winter.

FACULTY TO TEACH ENERGY MANAGEMENT WORKSHOP IN BEIRUT

Two energy management instructors at Lane will teach energy efficiency and renewable energy technology to faculty from the American University of Beirut, the Jordan University of Science and Technology, the Palestine Polytechnic University, and Birzeit University, at a workshop in Beirut, Lebanon, April 26-30.

Roger Ebbage and Mike Hatten are instructors in Lane's two-year energy management associate degree program. They also train and certify professionals through the program's Northwest Energy Education Institute. They participated in a similar workshop last year in Cypress.

The workshop is funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of State. The AUB is coordinating the workshop, part of a larger project to improve the region's educational capacity in the areas of energy efficiency and renewable energy technologies. "The initial challenge to the energy sectors in each of the countries of the region is to improve operational efficiency to minimize the energy sector's financial impact on national budgets, and to reduce negative impact on the environment," says the AUB. The region also needs to "reform and restructure its energy sector," and values the "American experience in performance testing, efficiency certification, alternative fuels, energy codes and norms, management practices, and financing mechanisms."

Ebbage and Hatten will conduct an energy audit on the AUB campus as well as contribute to program development discussions for the universities.
