JIM GARCIA EARNS HUMAN RIGHTS AWARD

Jim Garcia, diversity coordinator at Lane since October 2000, received the 2004 Human Rights Leadership Award from the Springfield Alliance for Equality and Respect (SAfER) at its April 1 celebration of the life of Cesar Chavez in Springfield. Garcia was selected from a variety of nominees, in part for his volunteer efforts to establish a diversity plan in the Springfield school district, SAfER spokesperson Kate Wallace told The Daily. She said he has been "absolutely invaluable" in bringing motivation, vision and practicality to the project. Garcia also was recognized for a lifetime of achievement in diversity, volunteerism, teaching and leadership, including helping establish the Ganas programs for Latino youth at Kennedy Middle School in Eugene and at Springfield High. The award is among many he has earned.

Garcia has taught and worked at the University of Oregon, New Mexico State University, Oregon State University, Chemeketa Community College, Portland State University, and Lane. He is a 1977 graduate of the UO. He also is a singer and musician known for performing Corridos, an oral history of the Chicano movement and Mexican American people. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK.

Dr. Don Addison, American Indian language instructor at Lane, offers the following Native American word for the week: "Tash." From the language which used to be called "Pima," this word means "sun," "time," or "day." This is our first opportunity to feature this language in our weekly column. The "Pima" or "Papago" people voted (when they adopted their new constitution in January 1986) to return to their traditional name, "Tohono O'odham," meaning "Desert People." While it is a more difficult word for English speakers, this is the way they now prefer to be addressed. In one sense, then, they reveal to the world their desire to throw off all traces of colonial treatment they have suffered from non-Native peoples. "Tash" also means "a period of daylight," and as such, is bounded by "si'alig" or "morning" (from "si'ad" [of the sun] to rise') and "hudunik," "evening" (from "huduni" "to descend"). Night is "s-chuhugam" meaning "darkness, night." A month is a cycle of the moon, not the sun as in the Gregorian calendar. In this term's AIL 100, Foundations of American Indian Languages, we explore various Native concepts describing time. When English speakers talk of the "rising of the sun" meaning "a new day has dawned," the Mojave (another Southwest people) refer, instead, to the "going away of the darkness." Interesting and different worldviews frequently are discerned in studying a people's language.

BLOODMOBILE RETURNS TO CAMPUS APRIL 15

The Bloodmobile will be on the main campus Thursday, April 15 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. If you're interested and are eligible to donate blood during this campus visit, please call or e-mail Judy Ann Fuller, ext. 5564 or fullerj@lanecc.edu and identify the time you prefer to donate. A member of the LCC Blood Drive Coordinating Committee will contact you to confirm your appointment. The entire process takes only 45 minutes, but your donation will help local people encountering loss of blood products due to auto accidents, burns, surgeries, childbirth and chemotherapy. There is no substitute for human blood, yet only five percent of eligible donors actually give blood each year. Donors must be 16 years of age or older, be in good health, weigh at least 110 pounds, and must wait eight weeks since the last donation. Certainly, there are reasons a person cannot donate. Examples include: a history of hepatitis, being an insulin-dependent diabetic, having certain respiratory or cardiac conditions, or testing positive for the HIV virus. And some medications and antibiotics may disqualify a potential donor. If you have a personal question about your eligibility to donate, call LMBB at 484-9111 and ask to speak with a nurse. AUTOMOTIVE PROGRAM RECEIVES NATIONAL RECERTIFICATION

Lane's automotive training program has been recertified by the National Automotive Technicians Education Foundation (NATEF) and the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (ASE).

"During the past several months, instructors Tom Kadash and George Hart have worked closely with NATEF to make certain that our program would meet strict industry standards," says David Keebler, chair of Lane's Advanced Technology Division. "We are delighted to continue our tradition as an ASE certified technician program. Students will be assured of a quality education, and shop owners will be assured of getting quality job applicants."

To achieve this coveted recognition, the training program underwent rigorous evaluation by NATEF. Nationally accepted standards of excellence in areas such as instruction, facilities and equipment were used. Upon completion of the evaluation, NATEF recommended that Lane Community College be recertified by ASE, a national, non-profit organization which tests and certifies repair technicians in addition to certifying technician training programs.

Recertification has been awarded to Lane's automotive program in the following program areas: automatic transmission and transaxle, brakes, electrical electronic systems, engine performance, engine repair, manual drive train and axles, suspension and steering, and heating and air conditioning.

NATEF Board of Trustees Chair Al Duebber says, "This is great news for automotive-minded young people and their parents in the Eugene area. Certification of automotive training programs increases cooperation between local education and industry leaders. It also gives added assurance that Lane Community College graduates will be employable entry-level technicians. As a result, the motoring public will benefit since more qualified repair technicians will join the work force."

The program is recertified for five years, after which it will be reviewed to ensure that it continues to meet industry standards and to adjust to the latest technological advances in the rapidly changing automotive world. Contact: Dave Keebler.

REMINDER: BLOODMOBILE RETURNS TO CAMPUS ON APRIL 15

The Bloodmobile will be on main campus Thursday, April 15 from 9 a.m.-3 p.m. If you're interested and are eligible to donate blood during this campus visit, please call or e-mail Judy Ann Fuller, ext. 5564 or fullerj@lanecc.edu and identify the time you prefer to donate. A member of the LCC Blood Drive Coordinating Committee will contact you to confirm your appointment.

The entire process takes only 45 minutes, but your donation will help local people encountering loss of blood products due to auto accidents, burns, surgeries, childbirth and chemotherapy. There is no substitute for human blood, yet only five percent of eligible donors actually give blood each year.

Donors must be 16 years of age or older, be in good health, weigh at least 110 pounds, and must wait eight weeks since the last donation. Certainly, there are reasons a person cannot donate -- for example, a history of hepatitis, being an insulin-dependent diabetic, having certain respiratory or cardiac conditions, or testing positive for the HIV virus. And some medications and antibiotics may disqualify a potential donor. HOW TO FIND THE MAGAZINE YOU WANT

Finding whether or not the library subscribes to a journal or a magazine just got easier with the Magazine/Journal Locator. The Magazine/Journal Locator not only reveals what journals and magazines the library subscribes to in print, it also conveys those titles we have available electronically as part of our aggregator databases such as EBSCO, SIRS, and others. Each entry includes information on coverage (dates) as well as links to the databases through which full-text access is available. For instance, if you want access to the "Journal of Mental Health," you can search the Magazine/Journal Locator by title. You'll find we have it available full-text from February 1992 to 6 months ago via the following databases: Academic Search Premier, Health Source: Nursing/Academic Edition, and MasterFILE Premier. Since we don't subscribe to the print version of this journal, you won't find "Journal of Mental Health" listed in the Library Catalog. Besides title searching, the Magazine/Journal Locator provides a browsable A-to-Z title list and subject browsing. So, if you are looking for full-text journals available in your field, you can use the subject browsing box to view journal titles organized by subject category. KLCC ENDS RADIOTHON WITH LARGEST EVER SINGLE FUNDRAISING DAY

KLCC's 2004 Spring Radiothon came to a hectic conclusion as 734 listeners called in to pledge over \$58,000 during the final day of Radiothon. This was the largest fundraising day in KLCC history. When the phones finally stopped ringing, the grand total of Spring Radiothon came to \$251,205. A total of 3,340 KLCC listeners became members or renewed their membership throughout the spring fundraising campaign, with 1900 of them calling in during the week of Radiothon. In the eight weeks leading up to Radiothon, 1440 "Thon Busters" contributed \$108,800. Every dollar raised from Thon Busters reduced the on-air goal of Radiothon. Thon Busters were eligible for special prizes offered as member incentives. KLCC member contributions help cover the cost of NPR news, nationally syndicated programs, locally programmed music, community information, live broadcasts of special events, and intelligent entertainment all year long. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, instructor in Native American languages at Lane offers the following for our Native American word for the week. This week's word is "ee-tee chan*-NA-hah" and means "car" in the Choctaw language of the Southeast. It is pronounced with the only stressed syllable written in capital letters. The syllable marked with an * [chan] is actually pronounced with a nasal sound and not "chan" as in "Charlie Chan." It is close to "Hong Kong" without the "g" in English, but this is only an approximation. This word must be translated as "car" or "vehicle" in English, but it literally means "a thing that rolls on wooden wheels." The earlier horse and wooden buggy, back in the nineteenth century, is the source of this word, reflecting vocabulary created since the time Europeans had entered the Choctaws' traditional homeland in what is now Mississippi. Those who saw the movie "Mississippi Burning" noticed the Nashoba County Court House, which is named after another Choctaw word, "Nashoba," which means "wolf."

Many people are more aware of the same term, "Big Water"--or, "Mnee Tanka"-- also spelled 'minitonka'--which is actually Lakota for the ocean or literally "Water--Big." Many place names surprisingly come from Native words which frequently came into popular usage through a variety of means and often very ironic historical incidents.

BOARD REPORT FOR APRIL 2004

A college governance system was approved by 7-0 vote at the Lane Community College Board of Education meeting on April 14, 2004. The motion read, "The board resolves that the proposed governance system meets the requirements set out in Policy B.025 and authorizes the president to implement the system as proposed, pending final agreement that the grievance procedures of the collective bargaining agreements will not apply to the governance system, and the system will not amend or supersede the collective bargaining agreements." Chair Mike Rose and others acknowledged the occasion's significance following months of work and years of governance debate at the college.

In other action, the board approved second readings of board policies on Delegation to the President, C.020; and Contractual Authority, C.030; and held First Readings of board policies on Treatment of Learners/Consumers, A.020; and Treatment of Staff, A.030.

Accreditation standards three and four were presented by Associate Vice President for Instruction Sonya Christian and other members of the accreditation standards teams.

A benchmark report showed that fewer high school grads are enrolling at Lane. Outreach efforts to boost high school enrollment are underway.

Differential pricing is having a varied effect on enrollment, which is up in some programs, down in others, according to a report. A student survey will be conducted in the spring to add to the data.

Community Learning Center enrollment is down, as expected following budget reductions of nearly 50 percent. Staff are pursing several ideas for better utilization of the facilities.

The board reviewed the Oregon Community College Association legislative agenda. Lanes board favored the higher range of the funding request proposed by OCCA; advised that funds be requested for only one biennium at a time; said equity and growth should be addressed; and supported seeking capital construction funding.

There were no speakers from the audience. The meeting followed a 4:30 p.m. executive session for labor negotiator consultations, and a work session on long-range facilities planning. The next regular meeting is set for Wednesday, May 12, at 6:30 p.m. in the Boardroom, Building 3. Submitted by Joan Aschim, Public Information Officer, Marketing and Public Relations.

IN SYMPATHY

The family of Carol Lynn Morse requests that no flowers be sent but donations may be made payable to the LCC Foundation with a memo indicating the Carol Lynn Morse Memorial Fund. Carol Lynn passed away April 28 after falling ill three weeks ago and being diagnosed with colon cancer.

In all all-staff e-mail yesterday, Associate Vice President for Instruction and Student Services Donna Koechig wrote, "Carol Lynn touched many peoples lives. Her absence at Lane and in the community will leave an enormous void.

"Carol Lynn Morse first joined Lane in July 1978 as a counseling instructor in Continuing Education. Over the years, her teaching and counseling duties grew. Since October 1992, she coordinated and taught in the Center for Family Counseling program (Saturday Circus) and served as a counselor for various academic programs in the Counseling Department.

"She was a licensed and certified counselor. She held a doctorate in psychology from the University of Oregon, where she also earned a masters in counseling and a bachelors in journalism.

"Carol Lynn won many professional honors and awards in her career, including the Distinguished Service Award from the Oregon Counseling Association in 1993. Of course, those of you who knew Carol Lynn well know that she refused to hang them on her wall. What was most important to Carol Lynn was not all the awards she achieved, but knowing that she had helped people. Carol Lynn, over the years you helped more people than you could have ever imagined.

PERS 2003 EARNINGS CREDITING

The PERS Board adopted final 2003 earnings crediting orders at its April 12, 2004 meeting.

Tier One regular accounts will receive no interest for 2003 as a result of legislation which provided that no earnings could be credited to Tier One regular accounts in any year in which a deficit exists. The deficit reserve stood at -\$1.9 billion in 2003. Tier One members who retired on or before March 1, 2004 received 8 percent crediting to the regular portion of their accounts.

Crediting amounts are estimates and actual amounts will be determined when the year-end 2003 annual closing process is completed in early May. Based on current estimates, the Tier Two crediting rate would be 21.49 percent and the variable rate would be 34.66 percent.

The board voted to fund the Contingency Reserve with 7.5 percent of earnings. The estimated funding is \$570.02 million.

The Capital Preservation Reserve was also funded with 7.5 percent of earnings. Dollars earmarked for the Contingency Reserve and all Tier One regular earnings (moneys to the Deficit Reserve) are taken out first. The remaining dollars, allocated at 7.5 percent to the Capital Preservation fund, results in estimated funding of \$420.04 million.

PERS staff will provide a Final Earnings Crediting Report to the PERS Board summarizing the final 2003 earnings crediting rates and amounts after completion of the annuals process and certification of the final 2003 earnings crediting calculations. Submitted by Vicki Ellison.
