NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Dr. Don Addison, instructor of Lane's Native American language course AIL 100 offers the following: Today's Native American Word for the Week is "Ushi," meaning "little" or "child" in Choctaw, a member of the Muskogean family of languages, and therefore closely related to Creek (also called Muskogee), and Chickasaw. Interestingly enough, as we discuss so often in the AIL 100 Foundations of American Indian Languages, words can become transformed into other words, derived from the same root, with meanings extending into all kinds of surprising directions, as in English. For example, in Choctaw, if one adds "ushi" to names for animals, the younger animal is logically designated. A "little cow" or "wak-u-shi" is a "calf." Also using "ushi," the term "is-su-shi" doesn't refer to a Japanese delicacy, but to a "little deer," or "fawn." Logically following suit then, "is-su-bu-shi," or "little horse," is "colt." All of these terms stem from the "word for the week," "ushi."

Learning Communities are part of a national movement to expand and rethink what constitutes academic education.

Duties of the Learning Communities Coordinator include promoting, coordinating the scheduling process, overseeing the listing and description of Learning Communities, budgeting, reporting, and working with the Leadership Team to support new Learning Communities as well as changes to existing Learning Communities. A complete job description is available upon request. The coordinator receives a .5 workload course reassignment as well as the resources of the new Learning Communities office and support. The term of office is three years with a possibility of renewal.

Applicants should possess strong organizational and communication skills as well as the energy and sense of humor necessary to work with staff and faculty from across the college. Learning Community experience (serving on Leadership Team or teaching in a learning community) is preferred but not necessary.

GRANT WILL FUND EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIPS

The Lane Community College Foundation has received a grant from the John and Betty Gray Early Childhood Fund of The Oregon Community Foundation. The grant will provide \$1,000 scholarships to 20 early childhood education students annually for the next five academic years.

Janet Anderson, director of the LCC Foundation, says, "These scholarships are the stepping stone to higher education for many qualified early childhood education students who otherwise couldn't afford college. The scholarships will benefit not just the Lane students, but the countless youngsters whose lives they'll influence in the future."

Lane's Early Childhood Education Program prepares students to work with young children from birth through five years of age in a variety of settings, including childcare centers, family child care, preschools, Head Start, school age programs, home visiting and parent education. Lane offers a one-year certificate and a two-year degree program that prepares students to work as teacher assistants or teachers in childcare programs or other early childhood settings.

Fourteen Oregon community colleges and their foundations collaborated on the successful proposal to the Oregon Community Foundation, and the resulting \$750,000 grant provides the community colleges with \$150,000 each year for five years to provide scholarships to early childhood education students. The project marked the first time the Oregon community colleges had partnered on a grant project of this size. They agreed to share in the proceeds based on the relative size of their early childhood education programs. LCC will serve as fiscal agent. Lori Bumgardner Steger, grants coordinator at the LCC Foundation, wrote and submitted the proposal.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

[The following includes corrected text from earlier this week.] The Native American Word for the Week is "Ushi," meaning "little" or "child" in Choctaw, a member of the Muskogean family of languages, and therefore closely related to Creek (also called Muskogee), and Chickasaw. Interestingly enough, as we discuss so often in the AIL 100 Foundations of American Indian Languages, words can become transformed into other words, derived from the same root, with meanings extending into all kinds of surprising directions, as in English. For example, in Choctaw, if one adds "ushi" to names for animals, the younger animal is logically designated. A "little cow" or "wak-u-shi" is a "calf." Also using "ushi," the term "is-su-shi" doesn't refer to a Japanese delicacy, but to a "little deer," or "fawn." Logically following suit then, "is-su-bu-shi," or "little horse," is "colt." "The House on Mango Street," by Sandra Cisneros. You have a choice of using one of two editions. One is an inexpensive paperback published by Vintage/Random House, ISBN 0-679-73477-5. The other is a more expensive hardbound but it has an excellent introduction written by Cisneros which discusses some of the issues, challenges, and choices she faced in writing this book. This discussion explicitly addresses the position and legitimacy of a minority culture in relation to the large dominant culture. This edition is published by Knopf/Random House, ISBN # 0-679-43335-X. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

The Native American Word for the Week is "BooBoo," in the Dakota Sioux language. It is a word that describes in its own sound, the "sound" the drum makes, so it is used as one word for "drum," and is therefore a good example of "onomatopoeia." (Tomtoms, on the other hand, are used in India, and not among Native Americans, although "tom tom" is often confused by non-Indians of the US with Native American drums.) In the Dakota language, "Chan-che-ra-gheen-ka-boo-boo-bee" means "They are playing the drum." In English, "boom, boom" are the descriptive syllables representing a drum beat, but "boo, boo," has a slightly humorous non-musical connotation. Interesting play on words surface in the Foundations of American Indian Languages class (AIL 100)

which will be offered in the first four weeks of the summer term as well. Contact: Dr. Don Addison, English, Foreign Languages and Speech.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

The Native American word for the week is "ic'i," which includes a glottal stop after the "c." (It sounds as if it were written "eech-ee," with a very hard "ch" sound, and a very clear break in the breath cutting the two syllables completely apart.) It means "harness" in Lakota (Sioux). Various related words use this root in other interesting terms, based on this notion. For example, "ic'i-ble-ble-cha" means "to shake one's self," and includes an example of onomatopoeia with the "ble-ble" describing in sound the actual shaking of the body. The word "ic'i-cha-gha" means "to make something for one's self," indicating a type of reflexive voice. BOARD REPORT FOR MAY

A reserve fund for potential PERS liabilities was established by 6-0 vote at the May 12 Board of Education meeting. Board member Paul Holman was absent. The fund will include 3.7 percent of wages and salaries, about \$1.5 million this year, and about \$1.6 million next year.

A schedule for KLCC capital campaign naming opportunities was approved 6-0. The president also shared a draft administrative policy to support board policy on naming.

The board approved budget transfers for FY 2003/04 by 6-0 vote.

Second readings of board policies were approved 6-0 for A.020 Treatment of Learners, and A.030 Treatment of Staff.

First readings of existing policies were approved 6-0 for A.080 Compensation and Benefits, C.040 Borrowing, C.060 Monitoring President's Performance, D.010 Personnel Services, D.040 Gambling, and D.060 Equality of Opportunity. As there were no changes to these policies, there will be no second readings.

First readings of existing policies with slight modifications were held for C.050 Purchasing Procedure, D.050 Use of Intoxicants and Controlled Substances, and D.070 Equality of Opportunity in Admissions.

First readings were held for new proposed policies, E.090 Interfund Loans, and E.100 Debt Issuance and Management.

A proposal was presented that the Bookstore and Food Services transfer 50 percent of their year-end fund balance to the general fund, instead of the current 8 percent of gross revenues. No action was taken.

The year-long, collegewide Reading Together project was presented by instructor Ellen Cantor. She covered the project's history and current status, and shared testimonials from enthusiastic supporters.

The self-support success of the Flight Technology program was explained by Harvey Birdseye and Dave Keebler. The program has moved from a deficit to better than breaking even, despite salary and OPE increases and student fee adjustments. They also reported that the Seminole plane purchased last year has been fitted with new GPS-based avionics.

Craig Taylor presented a benchmark on employees of color as a percent of all employees, up slightly among all employee groups combined.

Earlier in a work session, Sonya Christian presented an update on accreditation. She was assisted by Chuck Appleby, Stan Barker, Russell Shitabata, Anne McGrail, and Dave Keebler.

There were no statements from the audience.

The next meeting will be Wednesday, June 9, in the Boardroom and will include the annual public budget hearing and budget adoption. Submitted by Joan Aschim.

This term actually represents three different older words that were assembled in the following way: "Mni" literally means "water," "sapa" means "black," and "wicazo" is "pencil." A "pen" then is a "pencil" that writes with "black water." The influence of European academic and cultural paraphernalia generated an interest among Indians to adapt new words, for new terms, out of already existing words. In AIL 100,

students explore this process of legitimate tribal adaptations of old words into terms for items that were new to the peoples, a process which also says much about the cultural values and creative impulses of a people.
