NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

This week's Native American Word for the Week is "shuk-ha a-num-pa," which is the indigenous Choctaw term for a category of literature. Literally, "shuk-ha" means "pig"

and "a-num-pa" means "talk," or something akin to "hog wash." It actually refers, however, to a huge body of oral narratives used in storytelling that is highly revered in Choctaw cultures. This is the only (literary genre) Native term remaining in use today and brings together two seemingly disparate groups of stories within one category: humorous stories and animal tales. Interestingly enough, the Lakota (erroneously called "Sioux" of the Northern Plains) word for "dog" is "shun-ka" but linguists firmly believe only coincidence provides an explanation for this seemingly similar animal term of the Choctaw of the Southeast. HEALTH CLINIC EARNS AWARD

Lane's Health Clinic received the 2004 Golden Gull Award for Clinical Practice from the Pacific Coast College Health Association at its annual meeting in Spokane last month. The award was presented in recognition of the Strategic Breathing Initiative implemented by the clinic last year and spearheaded by Nadine Wilkes. The initiative improved provider training in treating asthma and related breathing programs, improved equipment for handling breathing emergencies, and fostered a collaboration of Lane respiratory therapy students and local allergists to provide free screening for staff and students. The initiative previously won an Eldon G. Schafer Pat on the Back Award. FLU VACCINE UPDATE

Through the efforts of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Lane Health Clinic has received a small amount of flu vaccine to immunize high-risk students and staff. We have received less than 25 percent of our original order quantity. We will comply with the Oregon emergency law that imposes a \$500 civil penalty on anyone who gives shots to those who are not at high-risk. At the time of immunization you will be asked to sign a form stating which high-risk criteria you meet. The high risk criteria are as follows:

- * Children from 6-23 months
- * Adults 65 years or older
- * Adults and children 2-64 years of age with underlying chronic lung or heart disorders including heart disease and asthma; chronic metabolic diseases including diabetes; kidney diseases; blood disorders (such as sickle cell anemia); or weakened immune systems (such as those with HIV/AIDS or on immunosuppressive medical therapy)
- * Women who will be pregnant during the flu season
- * Residents of nursing homes or long-term care facilities
- * Children and teenagers, 6 months to 18 years of age, who take aspirin daily
- * Health-care workers who deliver direct patient care
- * Household members and out-of-home caregivers of infants younger than 6 months

If you meet one or more of the high-risk criteria please call us at ext. 5665 to schedule your immunization. We will reserve vaccine by phone only until our supply is exhausted. We will not have a walk-in clinic for flu vaccine immunizations. In an effort to maximize accessibility we will be administering the vaccine at two different times:

Monday, November 8, from 2-3:30 p.m., and Tuesday November 9 from 9-10:30 a.m. Immunizations will cost \$15 and must be paid for by cash or check. You will not be able to charge the immunization to a Lane L# account. Thank you in advance for your patience and assistance during this difficult time. Contact: Duke Vandervort.

ALUMNI AWARD WINNER TO DISCUSS MONOTROPOIDEAE

Dan Luoma will present on "Mysteries of the Monotropeidae Revisited: 20 Years of Demystification," on Monday, November 22, at 7:30 p.m. in Building 17 (Forum) Room 308. Dan is one of four former Lane students to win a Distinguished Alumni Award presented in conjunction with the college's 40th anniversary year (see the fall class schedule cover story and photo).

Dan now is assistant professor, senior research, in the Department of Forest Science at Oregon State University. In his presentation he will discuss monotropeidae, which is a sub-family within the ericaceae (heath family). Lane forensics students recently have competed in debate tournaments. At the Betsy Karl Designated Tournament in October at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Lane won the Overall Team Sweepstakes Award Third Place, Division III; and Steven "Skippy" Coatsworth won the Novice Impromptu Finalist award. In the 32nd Annual Smelt Forensics Classic in November at Lower Columbia College in Longview, Dallas Brown and Sean Gremer were Semi-Finalists in the Novice Parli Debate; Michael Lichens won Second Place in Open Dramatic Interpretation, and Steven "Skippy" Coatsworth won Novice Impromptu Finalist.

Instructor/coach Andy Kemp writes, "These students are getting their acts together quickly, especially for such a young squad (coach included). Although I am decidedly satisfied with our beginnings and optimistic about our future together, we have begun to learn about ourselves, the LCC Forensic Titans. In the first two tournaments we have learned not to open the van door while the coach is driving (even if you "really want to go say 'Hi' to that girl from the speech tournament), we've learned that lunch never goes as quickly as it needs to, that we still need to work on remembering all of our basic argumentative tools, that we need to work on organizing our comments and assertions, and that we need to work on cooperating more efficiently during the brief preparation time before our debates, and that we need to use our class time more productively. WHAT DID STUDENTS TELL US?

The spring term 2004 ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes told us this:

1. 96 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's general environment is welcoming and accepting to all students, regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.
2. 96 percent of the respondents agreed that Lane's instructors strive to create a classroom environment that is comfortable and fair to all students regardless of their race or national origin, gender, religion, physical ability, age, or sexual orientation.
3. 50 percent of the respondents reported that a major reason they chose to attend Lane was because Lane "offered the courses they wanted" (compared to 51 percent of all Oregon community college respondents).

NEW BUILDING BY THE TRACK IS A REPLACEMENT

The new wood-frame building going up near the main campus track is a long-planned replacement of the former modular building used by PE and Athletics for storing track and field equipment such as hurdles. Construction technology students in Leonard Keene's class are doing the framing and sheeting for class credit under the supervision

of Facilities staff. The project has long been planned by the Facilities Management Team. FMT allocated about \$54,000 from the capital repair and improvements fund in May to replace the modular, which was rotting. It was demolished about a month ago. The new building should be completed this term.

Nearby, two old child care moduls (buildings 30 and 31) recently were removed. One of those sites is being prepared in anticipation of the long house project next summer, contingent upon fund-raising. Finally, another storage building is being built by Facilities staff in Florence to replace the old Quonset hut storage building.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is "Ee-TO-ka-gha-bla" which means in Lakota (Sioux) "I am going south." This phrase actually comes from the infinitive "Ee-TO-ka-gha-ee-YA-ya" which literally means "to have gone south." (Capital letters stand for accented syllables in spoken Lakota.) Ironically "going south" (as in English) can also be understood metaphorically as "to have died." A soul was supposed to travel to the spirit land by way of the Milky Way, from north to south. Its fate was determined where the Milky Way divides into two branches in the south. One can fairly accurately assume some Christian/European influence has crept into this explanation. In traditional Lakota thought the term "Ee-to-ka-gha" literally means "the place where they make faces"--"ka-gha" meaning "to make"--and therefore is a much more ancient meaning than the references to the Milky Way, and the implications of a "fate" divided into "two directions" (probably a heaven and a hell concept) none of which is Native in origin. This discussion, however, clearly illustrates how languages change over time and as Europeans arrived

on the Great Plains, their influences on Native languages became considerable. The class AIL 100 Foundations of Native American Languages continues this term. Dr. Don Addison, 344-4758.

LANE FLIGHT GRAD AND INSTRUCTOR TO TEACH CHINESE PILOTS

Thaddeus Beebe, Lane flight instructor for the past year and a half and a graduate of the flight technology program, leaves for China this month to become a flight instructor at a new Pan Am flight training facility in the city of Shijiazhuang, capital of the Hebei province. Beebe will train pilots who will fly for Air China and Hainan Air.

Beebe interviewed for the job this summer after hearing from friends that Pan Am was starting the new company and was hiring. The former worldwide airline has continued to offer flight instruction.

Beebe, 28, earned an associate of applied science degree in flight technology at Lane in 2001, and a bachelor of arts degree in Chinese language and literature from the University of Oregon in 2003. His studies included a year abroad in Beijing where he made many friends in the aviation industry.

Training will be conducted in Diamond DA40 and DA42 four-seat aircraft that have glass cockpits similar to modern jet airliners. Beebe will teach four students per term. They will train Monday through Friday for about a year.

WHAT DID STUDENTS TELL US?

On the spring term 2004 ACT Student Opinion Survey of students enrolled in credit classes, we found:

- * 90 percent of the respondents reported they have access to a computer when they are away from Lane.
- * 89 percent of the respondents thought Lane provides students adequate access to computers and related equipment on campus.

NEWS**PRESIDENT MARY SPILDE HONORED FOR DIVERSITY LEADERSHIP**

Lane Community College President Mary Spilde received the 2004 Tenison Haley Outstanding Individual Contribution Award in recognition of her leadership in diversity, at the 10th Annual Oregon Diversity Institute held November 5 and 6 at Lane Community College.

Spilde was commended for "distinguished achievement and inspirational leadership in championing access, social justice and equity with courage, intelligence, empathy and commitment" and for "fair and principled leadership [that] has influenced the lives of students, staff and community members in building bridges and celebrating the richness of our college, community and the state of Oregon."

The president continually affirms diversity as a core value at Lane in her presentations, conversations and writings. For example, when incidents of offensive leafleting and hurtful slurs occurred, Spilde immediately called an all-staff meeting to air the incidents and concerns, call for action, and reiterate Lane's core values and harassment policies. She implemented a response team to investigate the incidents, and shared the team's report with all staff. Another example is that Spilde helped create an ethnic studies coordinator position at Lane, the first such at the college. In addition, she has long supported the advancement of women in leadership through participation in the American Association of Women in Community Colleges and other avenues.

Dr. Tenison Haley was a diversity advocate and founding organizer of the Oregon Diversity Institute. He also was a founder, student services dean, and foundation director at Rogue Community College. Contact: Editor.

BOARD REPORT

Dr. Mary Spilde has been asked to consider staying on as president for at least another five years, Lane Community College Board of Education Chair Paul Holman reported to the board at its November 16 meeting. He said the board is considering offering incentives to that end, such as deferred compensation or a retirement annuity. He also urged the president to accept a salary increase, which she has not done since becoming president in 2001. Holman and Vice Chair Kathleen Shelley were directed by

the board in September to work on contract details, after the board gave Spilde an outstanding performance review for her third straight year.

The board policy on firearms passed unanimously. A related resolution asking the legislature to change Oregon statute to allow colleges to fully ban firearms on campuses passed 5-2, with Holman and Jay Bozevich opposing.

The board approved budget assumptions for 2005/06 by unanimous vote. The assumptions included four scenarios that will be updated as information is received from the state level.

John Hamilton was appointed to the Budget Committee At Large Position 6, and Stephen Alison was appointed to At Large Position 7; by unanimous vote.

Lane's annual audit produced a "clean opinion," the highest rating possible.

Presentations included the Success and Goal Attainment Report, and a benchmark report on grants and contracts.

There were no statements from the audience.

The meeting adjourned at 9:20 p.m.

MICROSOFT WINDOWS XP SERVICE PACK 2

The Information Technology Helpdesk Team recommends downloading and installing Window XP service pack 2 (SP2) when it becomes available through Windows Automatic Update. However, there are precautions to take before the download. After the download and install, turning off the firewall will ensure that your network and desktop applications continue to function.

There are two main precautions to take. First, if you have ever had a problem with popup advertising or ad-ware, have your pc checked either by someone from your departmental technical support or from the LCC IT Helpdesk before you install SP2. Second, back up any critical data to your network shared drive or removable media such as a floppy disk, zip disk or cd-rom before downloading SP2.

The download and install of SP2 is lengthy. Expect to reboot your system at least once. After the install is completed, your pc will have an active personal firewall. Because the firewall prevents GroupWise and other applications from working properly, we recommend disabling the firewall.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

The Native American Word for the Week is "Kongyahompi" which is Hopi for a hand-woven basket in which food items can be carried. This is actually a special wedding gift made by the bride's family for the groom, and presented to him at the time of the wedding ceremony. After the couple sets up their new home, the basket is often hung on the wall in a place of honor. Some Hopis say that when the groom grows to old age and passes on, his spirit is symbolically thrust up into the sky and on its path to his next existence, by this basket. In exchange during the wedding, the groom's father or uncle or another elder male will have woven for the bride a "wukokwewa" or an all-white sash with long fringes (or tassels symbolic of the life-giving corn ears). The wife is presented with this gift from her groom's family, and a very few pieces of red yarn are added off to one side, in an inconspicuous part of the sash--symbolic of the life-giving blood of the uterus, and the next generation of children the couple will bring forth. After a comparable long life, this wife's loom-constructed sash will be used as her shroud upon her death and burial. In Hopi, one can say, "Mo'wit engem wukokwewa yukiwngwu" meaning "An all-white sash is made for the bride". Even a few katsina dolls display sashes and baskets for a limited number of characters, portrayed by the dolls--which are symbolic of the rain clouds. The basket of the groom and the sash of the bride, therefore, are associated with ritual symbolism that will sustain the couple into old age, and see them on their transition into their after-life. Such cultural practices, discovered upon learning introductory information about selected Native languages, are pointed out in Lane's AIL 100 class, Foundations of American Indian Languages.
