ONE LESS REASON FOR STUDENTS TO STOP BY STUDENTS FIRST!/ ENROLLMENT SERVICES

Good news! Due to the ever-increasing numbers of enrollment verification inquiries (for employment, housing, insurance, etc.) received by Enrollment Services and with the limited resources available to serve students quickly at Students First!/Enrollment Services, the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) has recently been appointed as our agent for degree and enrollment verifications. The NSC's secured web site now provides a new automated on line process to verify student enrollment status or degrees.

Students can now access the NSC's secure website via ExpressLane to print their own Verification of Enrollment Certificate for free.

In addition all agencies contacting Enrollment Services for verifications, will be referred to the NSC secured web site and/or the NSC phone number. All agencies are still required to have a signed consent from the student, but the agencies themselves will now verify enrollment or degrees online (24 hours a day, 7 days a week)! There will be a \$2.50 charge to anyone other than the student. This link is located on Lane's web page under Enrollment Services.

We are very excited about this new on line automated service, as it should prove to be very beneficial to students needing quick verifications of their enrollment status If you'd like handouts on this process to distribute to students, please contact Kerri Houghton in Enrollment Services.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

This week's Native American word for the Week is a Hopi term, Nami'nangwa, which means love or mutual caring. Hopi is an Uto-Aztecan language, in other words, it is a cousin of Shoshone, Comanche, Ute, and even the Aztec or Nahuatl language of Mexico. Other relatives of Hopi are spoken in California as well. Some 50 Native American language families still exist in the USA, which is quite extensive, when one considers that basically, for all of Europe, only three major language families or language stocks exist: Indo-European, Finno-Ugric, and Basque. Language areal distribution and linguistic relationships of languages are part of the AIL 100 Foundations of Native American Languages class this term. - Dr. Don Addison, instructor, 344-4758

NEW SPYWARE SOFTWARE FROM MICROSOFT

Microsoft has recently begun promoting a free downloadable beta version of a spyware security tool that you may have heard about. From what we have been able to gather, this is an attempt by Microsoft to get Windows users to switch from Symantec and other vendors to paid subscription services that Microsoft plans to offer later this year. While free for the moment, the beta version will expire on July 31 and pricing hasn't been determined yet.

The spyware tool is not fully supported by Microsoft and therefore the IT department helpdesk cannot support it until further review of Microsoft's pricing plans and determination of compatibility with our standard software applications.

Please do not attempt to download and install this software on your own. Our current contract with Symantec is the only supported tool at this time. However, we are evaluating several options and will be working with technicians from IT and other departments to determine future support procedures to minimize the problems associated with spyware and viruses. - Todd Lutz, Technology Support Services

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is "hoop," pronounced exactly like the English word "hope", and it is Hopi for northeast. Interestingly enough, Hopis never use north, east, south, or west for the cardinal directions, as is simply often done in English (with additional exceptions of NW, SE, etc). In Hopi, the cardinal directions are only solstitial, and only recounted in the following manner. On the summer solstice the sun rises in the northeast, "hoop," and sets in the northwest, "kwiningya"; on the winter solstice the sun rises in the southeast, "tatkya," and sets in the southwest, "taavang." They exist only in the pospositionalized form, meaning these terms are always suffixed to other Hopi terms to convey appropriate desired meanings. Each of these Sacred Four Directions symbolize the following colors: NW is yellow, SW is blue-green, SE is red, and NE is white. The famous "Kachina" spirits, represented by the well-known kachina doll art tradition, "live" in certain "homes," with their appropriate names in Hopi for each direction (not listed here). Such world views in both this physical world and the "other worlds" or "beyond," are intermeshed and boundaries or domains of both are not only blurred, but conceptualized and named in Hopi, for easy reference. AIL 100 Foundations of American Indian Languages course introduces such fascinating concepts and language use, one may never have considered previously. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American word for the week is "mato" (pronounced with the accent stress on the second syllable) and means "bear" in Lakota, a language of the Teton or Western branch of what are more typically (and erroneously) referred to as "Sioux." "Mato' kho'ta" is a grizzly bear (but kho'ta literally means gray!) and "Mato' chincha'la" means a "bear's cub." That Native American traditional tribal beliefs and spiritual views of the ecology and the cosmos merge is illustrated by the fact that "Mato' Ti'pila" (or Bear Lodge) is the name for the constellation of eight stars standing in a circle, with the gemini, Castor and Pollux, prominent among them. "Ti'pila" means a little house, and stems morphologically from "ti'pi" which is actually the third person plural of the verb "ti" (to live or dwell at). "Ti'pi" means literally, "they dwell or live at" and is the most wellknown Indian "residential" construction known to the television viewing public, but this is not the end of remarkable parallels in our languages. "Mato' Ti'pila" is ALSO the name for the famous "Bear Lodge" or what is popularly known to climbing enthusiasts and the summer tourist industry as "Devil's Tower"--a controversial climbing site for tourists and an ancient sacred site for worship--a place where sportsmen's interests, commercial pursuits, and freedom of Native American religion issues have clashed and even been argued in the courts for years. These questions can sometimes surface in the AIL 100 Foundations of Native American Languages because of morphological processes and word borrowing across areally diverse linguistic communities. BUS SERVICE UPDATE

According to The Register-Guard and other news sources, Lane Transit District and the Amalgamated Transit Union Local 757 did not reach agreement in a mediated bargaining session yesterday, and a 10-day notice to strike is expected to be announced today. Bus service would be interrupted effective January 30 unless agreement is reached before then. A college committee appointed to review the impact of interrupted bus service on Lane recommends that students and employees stay informed by following news reports. E-MAILING STUDENTS AND COMPLYING WITH FERPA

An important reminder for a staff who are using e-mails to communicate to students regarding the use of the BC: (Blind Copy) function when e-mailing more than one student, as opposed to using the TO: (To) field. This is true when using GroupWise, or the "E-mail Class" function from class lists in ExpressLane, or any e-mail system.

In order to protect the privacy of a student's e-mail address never put more than one e-mail address in the TO: field. The way around this is to address the e-mail to yourself in the TO: field, and then load multiple e-mail addresses into the BC: field. This way, students receiving the e-mail will not be able to view each other's e-mail addresses.

The current "E-mail class" function in ExpressLane where class lists are displayed for faculty members defaults to the TO: field. We are encouraging faculty to either not use this feature, or, if they do, to please cut the e-mail addresses out of the TO: field and paste them into the BC field so they only display there.

As a reminder, if you and/or your department would like to have a quick and easy refresher on this and other FERPA issues, please invite Helen Garrett to come to a meeting at your convenience. Helen will review the "Top Ten Most Important Things to Know About FERPA" at Lane and respond to any questions you have.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

This four-hour workshop will be a broad general overview looking at the nature of diversity and our part in it. We will start by examining what we mean by culture and identity. RESTRICTIONS ON POLITICAL CAMPAIGNING BY PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

Each legislative session, the Elections Division of the Secretary of State's office reminds us that certain activities are prohibited by public employees. Generally, ORS 260.432 states that a public employee may not, while on the job during working hours, promote or oppose election petitions, candidates or ballot measures. Additionally, no person, including elected officials, may require a public employee at any time to do so. Some of the prohibited activities outlined in the statute state that a public employee, while on the job during working hours:

- May not prepare or distribute written material, post website information, transmit emails, or make a presentation that advocates a political position;

- May not make outgoing calls to schedule or organize campaign events or other political activity on behalf of an elected official or political committee;

- May not grant unequal access to public facilities to candidates or political committees. See http://www.sos.state.or.us/elections/other.info/stat.htm for more information.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is "eet-KA" which is Lakota (often incorrectly identified as "Sioux") for either "a blossom, an egg or any type of a seed." "Eet-KA" (with the accent or stress on the syllable in capital letters) can even mean "a capsule," because of the association of a small round object such as a seed or egg. The

term for "egg white," naturally, would be "eet-KA-ska" with "ska" being "white"--in the same order for both English and Lakota. "Ska" is an adjective meaning "white" and it is simply affixed to the end of the word for egg. "Yu-ZEE-ca", however, means "to stretch," for example, like a skin, balloon or piece of rubber. So "egg yolk" becomes "eet-KA-zi-ca" because the "yu" is dropped from the verb "to stretch" so an egg yolk is identified more with its tight yolk "stretched skin" rather than its yellow color (if a chicken's egg, etc.). Identification by color or surface qualities, or other descriptive aspects or characteristic attributes may change remarkably even within the same typology (or category of morphemes). - Dr. Don Addison, instructor Native American languages, 344-4758

BOARD REPORT JANUARY 2005

President Mary Spilde presented budget projections to the Board of Education on January 12. "It is clear that Lane will be in for another very challenging two years relating to our budget," Spilde said. "There are many unknowns in the budget at this time. We will need the Legislature to treat community colleges fairly, which the governor's budget does not do. We will need to expand our efforts to increase enrollment. We will need to develop a short-term strategy to align revenues and expenses for '06 while at the same time develop a plan for making some very difficult decisions regarding reductions and decisions for the '07 year. Obviously, this will be back on the agenda next month so that the board can approve a definite plan for dealing with the budget." The president's presentation and budget projections are available at

In action, the board approved obtaining design services to expand the campus health clinic, by 5-0 vote. Roger Hall and Mike Rose were absent. Health Director Duke Vandervort talked about basic health services provided at the clinic and the benefits of a larger clinic. He said the prime directive is to do no harm to student services. He said a new facility should enhance services to students.

The board reviewed recommendations from the National Association of College and University Business Officers and the Association of Community College Trustees for compliance with certain provisions of the American-Competitiveness and Corporate Accountability Act of 2002. The board will hold a first reading in February for a policy based on the recommendations.

In other reports, the board reviewed a summary of November work sessions on local population and enrollment trends; benchmarks on gender and race/ethnicity status of graduates; and accountability reports on compensation and benefits, and asset protection.
