NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

"Si-ma-no" or "Si-ma-nó-li" is today's Native American Word for the Week. It is a word in the Creek or Muskogean Indian language that comes from the Spanish "Cimarrón" meaning "wild one." (It was not meant to be complimentary.) Linguists call such a phenomenon a "loan word"--here, a Spanish term is borrowed by the Creek Indians to refer to the group that broke off from the Creek, and over time, this term evolved into the "Seminole" of today's pronunciation. The Seminole language was originally a dialect of Creek, and these people were originally a political unit that originated in the mid-18th century where the Creeks and another lesser-known Native American group called the Hitchitis left the Creek Confederacy of the southeast and move south into Florida. "Simanó-li" then referred to the "wild ones" who lived in the "wild territory" of what later became Florida. Today the Seminole Indians consist of two linguistic communities, the majority speaking Mikasuke, the others a dialect of Creek. Some Seminoles were forced from Florida to Oklahoma in the 1830s and today, Creek speakers (presumably including those speaking the Seminole dialects) including children, now number between 4,000 and 5,000 peoples. Some Native American languages survive and their speakers have no intention of letting their language be suppressed or forgotten. They enjoy teaching it to their children. Survival of language means survival of a people and their culture, and this is part of a larger more general positive trend for indigenous peoples today. - Dr. Don Addison, LCC American Indian languages instructor and recently appointed instructor in Navajo at the University of Oregon next term, 344-4758

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is "Kohmagi Mashath" meaning "February" in the Pima and Papago language. Literally this term means "The Gray Month" when vegetation in the southwest is scant and trees are bare. Both Papago and Pima are considered one language, or, more properly, "Papago-Pima" is the northernmost Piman language, and they are of considerable interest to linguists and Native American language scholars, tribal historians, cultural specialists, etc. They exhibit some distinguishing characteristics, but otherwise they constitute a close-knit, well-defined subfamily within the Uto-Aztecan language family--which includes Comanche, Shoshone, Hopi, Ute, and languages in Mexico, hence "Aztecan." Of particular interest is the stand that the Papago tribal government took when tribal

members voted to replace the colonial reference "Papago" with the traditional, historically authentic term "Tohono O'odham" (the desert people). Today it is spoken by 14,000 people in southern Arizona and northern Sonora, Mexico--a splendid example of Native American language endurance and thriving survival. The film was directed and photographed by Kim Bartley and Donnacha O'Briain. Hugo Chavez was elected president of Venezuela in 1998 and is a colorful, unpredictable folk hero, beloved by his nation's working class and a tough-as-nails, quixotic opponent to the power structure that would see him deposed. Two independent filmmakers were inside the presidential palace on April 11, 2002, when he was forcibly removed from office. They were also present 48 hours later when, remarkably, he returned to power amid cheering aides. Their film records what was probably history's shortest-lived coup d'état. SHOW ME THE MONEY

Lane's Learning Community, "Show Me the Money!" is living up to its name. Now in its third successful year, this learning community combines a two-credit scholarship research and application class with a one-credit writing class focused on scholarship essays. Instructors Beth Landy, Mary Parthemer and Daphne Gabrieli help students to think at a deep level about their accomplishments and the linked courses provide the structure and support for students to self-explore, self-assess and effectively write about the kind of personal information required to complete high-quality scholarship

applications. Last year, 38 percent of the 29 Lane students who interviewed for Ford Scholarships had taken "Show Me the Money!" and 20 percent of the learning community students got Ford Interviews (not all students are qualified for the Ford scholarships). Of the 28 TRiO students who completed the learning community, 46 percent were awarded 19 scholarships for 2004-05, and 14 percent were awarded one of the Ford scholarships. EMERGENCY NOTIFICATION SYSTEM TEST UPDATE

As most of you know, the college tested the Emergency Notification System on Wednesday, February 9. This system comes from a debrief of the bomb scare that the college experienced last summer. One of the main issues identified was the need for a way to very quickly notify all employees that we were experiencing an emergency.

One part of this system is the Emergency Telephone Tree (ETT) which starts at the President's Office and follows the organizational structure. Departments and administration have been involved in building their part of the ETT. Another part of the system is sending an all-staff e-mail, which falls to the AVP of Information Technology, Stephen Pruch.

We are now analyzing data from our test. We are looking at when departments got notified and when they completed notifying their employees. Also, what worked and what didn't work. After review of that data we'll look at ways to improve the system.

We are exploring the possibilities of sending out group voice mail. However, our phone system places some limitations on that.

The college does not have an intercom system, so we are working on ways to quickly notify all employees of emergency situations in more detail than just setting off alarms.

After we get the indicated improvements in the system we will test it again. There will be no notice of the next test.

BOARD REPORT FOR FEBRUARY

President Mary Spilde told the Board of Education at its February 9 meeting that budget unknowns still remain. She said presidents and business officers from Portland, Chemeketa, Linn-Benton, and Lane proposed a new distribution formula to the state commissioner and received a favorable reception. Several legislators from both parties have formed a community college caucus to address funding. The colleges agree that \$440 million is the minimum funding necessary to maintain current service levels. The president also reported that reaccreditation by the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities is now official. She also noted that board member Dennis Shine received the 2004 Outstanding Citizen Award presented by the Lane Council of Governments. Shine has represented the board on LCOG since 2001.

During statements, OSPIRG intern Tatiana Efremova asked the board to consider a resolution for affordable student textbooks; later in the meeting, the board agreed to place the resolution on its March agenda.

The board approved the 2005/06 Budget Calendar which includes Budget Committee meetings on May 11, 18 and 25; and the annual budget hearing and adoption of the budget by the board on June 8.

First readings were held for modifications to two policies, and one new policy, all incorporating financial reporting measures recommended by the Sarbanes-Oxley Act.

The board heard a report on the High School and Community Relations program from coordinator Karen Edmonds. Activities include visiting high schools, bringing students to campus, sponsoring events, and participating in community events. Edmonds said work is being done with the Banner system to reach more high school students with e-mail. Upcoming events include a college information night for Latino students at Springfield High School on May 11, and a Professional Technical Careers Exploration Day at main campus on May 6, cosponsored by College Now.

Andrea Newton and Laurie Swanson-Gribskov presented on the work of the Regional Technical Education Consortium, Lane's initiative to increase partnerships with the school districts (see the Register-Guard article at <http://www.registerguard.com/news/2005/02/11/d1.cr.lcc.0211.html>).

STUDY LINKS ENROLLMENT DECLINE TO FUNDING CUTS

Oregon community college presidents held a news conference at the state capitol Wednesday to release results of a research study showing that cuts in state funding have caused enrollment decline.

Researchers used an econometric regression model to predict what would have happened to college enrollments if the legislature had not reduced funding to community colleges. The study shows that if tuition and funding growth had continued at their pre-recession annual growth rates, community colleges would be serving nearly 65,000 more students than they do now.

The study shows that in 2001-02, Oregon community colleges served 406,931 students. By 2003-04, enrollment had dropped to 330,595. If the trend continues, the colleges could see further enrollment loss in the future. Some key findings:

For each 10 percent decrease in state funding, unduplicated headcount is estimated to have decreased by 4.5 percent. Most of this impact (3 percent out of 4.5 percent) is attributable to tuition increases forced by state funding cuts. The remainder (1.5 percent out of 4.5 percent) is attributable directly to program cuts.

Contrary to popular belief, decreases in personal income result in decreases in community college enrollment. Each one percent fall in Oregon personal income (adjusted for inflation) leads to a 1.10 percent fall in unduplicated headcount. - Editor

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is the Lakota word "oon-CHEEN" meaning "you and I want." Both syllables are nasalized with the second syllable (in capital letters) being the one stressed, or accented. "You and I" is usually represented in English as "we" and to say "we want," a Lakota speaker would say "oon-CHEEN-pee." English represents both "we" and "you and I" as one morpheme, "we." In Lakota, by contrast, using "we" requires a predetermined or requisite social understanding that is absent in English. Seven conjugational forms or aspects exist in Lakota (but English has only six): "I, you, and he/she/it" (first, second and third person singular) in the verb forms, and "we, you (all), and they" (first, second and third person plural), AND the "you and I" category. The latter is used when one person addresses one other person in an inclusive manner. It can't be used for more than two persons. In Lakota cultures, individual responsibility is primary. One must be responsible for one's own growth, achievements, and relationships to others--which is often seen as a "personal journey." (This is why "vision quests" really are "individual"--rather than public--ceremonies.) One never commits others to some issue or attempts to speak for others without their consent. With their consent, using "we" becomes appropriate. In the meantime, one must use "you and I" to mark individuality in a duple reference--respect for another's individuality. Therefore "You and I want some of that money" would be translated "Maza ska ki hetan oonCHEEN yelo" but "I want some of that money" would read "Maza ska ki hetan waCHEEN yelo" (and "yelo" glosses as an enclitic for 'male speaker'.) The pronominal difference here between "oonCHEEN" and "waCHEEN" are more than grammatical, they are cultural as well. - Dr. Don Addison, instructor in American Indian language at LCC and the UO, 344-4758
