## CHANGES IN INTERNET CONNECTION

On March 13, the college upgraded our Internet connection. The upgrade included the main campus and our Community Learning Centers. The upgrade gave us

a 50% increase in capacity and the ability to expand capacity as needed. It also gave us a robust infrastructure that will serve us for many years.

What does this mean to our users? Changes noticed should be faster access from off campus to our services (for example ExpressLane, GroupWise, and Lane's homepage), faster access to the Internet from on campus during off-peak times, and faster access from our CLCs to main campus and the Internet.

HIRING COMMITTEE GIVES BIO OF THIRD CANDIDATE

Craig Machado has been in English education since he first went overseas as a Peace Corps volunteer in the 1970s. His career as a teacher, teacher trainer and administrator, has been in high school, university and community college settings, both stateside and abroad. Currently, he is ESL program director at Norwalk Community College in Norwalk, Connecticut, where he oversees a department of 500 students and 26 faculty.

Other career highlights include a Fulbright lectureship in English language and literature in the Czech Republic, foreign student advising seminars in Central America, and teaching in and planning a bi-national summer academic exchange program between a consortium of Oregon colleges and Waseda University, Tokyo. He is the current series editor for a forthcoming three-volume publication entitled "Perspectives on Community College ESL," through TESOL (Teachers of English to Speakers of Other Languages). This February, NCC's ESL Program won a national award of excellence in enhancing developmental English through the National Council of Teachers of English/Two-Year College English Association.

Craig holds degrees from the University of California/Davis and San Francisco State University. He lived in Oregon for over eight years while working at Oregon State University. Craig misses Powell's Books, West Coast espresso and hiking in the Cascades.

#### A SAGA WITH A HAPPY ENDING: STUDENT SUCCESS AND GOAL ATTAINMENT

We know you are interested in seeing students succeed at Lane. So is SAGA, the Success and Goal Attainment committee, composed of members from a variety of departments and programs who are focused on improving the retention and success of Lane students. Some of the strategies in which SAGA is actively engaged include: developing and promoting strategies for student retention and success; identifying literature and research-based strategies to use in improving retention; analyzing and collecting retention data for assessment purposes; providing models to guide campuswide retention strategies; and participating in the evaluation of retention strategies, activities, and processes.

In 2003-04, after completing a thorough literature review, SAGA identified six best practices that have been shown to increase the persistence and success of students: 1) first year experiences; 2) academic advising; 3) learning communities; 4) supplemental instruction; 5) early warning and intervention systems; and 6) campus climate / supportive learner environment.

Tier One/Tier Two 2004 Member Annual Statements will be delayed due to the recent Strunk decision and the forthcoming Lipscomb (City of Eugene) decision. PERS will send annual statements when we can provide accurate account information. We will provide more information as it becomes available.

Although Tier Two annual statements are not affected by Strunk or Lipscomb, final 2004 earnings crediting has not been completed (for both Tiers). At its March 29, 2005 meeting, the PERS Board placed all available 2004 earnings into a Pending Reserve until legal challenges that affect earnings crediting are resolved.

Oregon Public Service Retirement Plan (OPSRP) Pension Program 2004 Annual Statements are scheduled to be mailed to members mailing addresses on file with PERS the week of May 2-6, 2005. This is the first year for OPSRP Pension Program Annual Statements. OPSRP was effective August 29, 2003 and qualifying members are eligible for the plan following a six-month waiting period. ### RENOWNED DIVERSITY SCHOLAR TO SPEAK AT LANE

Noted author and historian Ronald Takaki, author of this year's Reading Together book, "A Larger Memory: A History of Our Diversity, With Voices," will visit Eugene and the Lane campus next week. His schedule includes a lecture, "America in a Different Mirror: Re-visioning Our Nation's Past," on Thursday, April 21, at 10 a.m. in the Performance Hall, Building 6, followed by a book signing from 11:30 a.m.-noon (note complete schedule below).

It is important to teach diversity in today's society, says Takaki, as we have been "swept into the 21st Century with expanding ethnic diversity and our nation's war against terrorism." He says it is necessary to acknowledge and understand our nation's "larger memory." "As Americans, we are the world, and have the unique capacity to relate to the world. Herman Melville discerned this truth about us: 'America was settled by peoples of all nations. Spill the blood of an American, and you spill the blood of the world. We are not a narrow tribe.' To recognize this truth, we need only look at our history, more inclusively and more accurately."

Takaki has been described as a "minority everyman ... a rare hybrid, a multicultural scholar" by the Los Angeles Times. He is a professor of ethnic studies at the University of California, Berkeley, where he has taught for more than 30 years. His foundational work in ethnic studies curriculum and the multi-cultural graduation requirement has served as a conceptual model for developing similar programs in colleges across the country.

Professor Takaki is the author of 11 books, including our 2004-05 Reading Together book, "A Larger Memory: a History of Our Diversity, With Voices." His books have been selected for national recognition, including as a New York Times Notable Book of the Year and the American Book Award.

Born in 1939, Takaki is the grandson of immigrant Japanese Hawaiian plantation workers and has received numerous awards and honors. He advised former President Clinton and Vice President Gore on race and ethnic matters and he has lectured internationally.

### THE SIX BEST PRACTICES FOR STUDENT SUCCESS AND GOAL ATTAINMENT

Learning communities provide coherence for students by creating connections between courses and disciplines; they build an academic and social community for students and encourage continuity and integration in the curriculum. Since Lane students are often busy, learning communities offer the crucial combination of academic and social engagement essential to optimum success.

HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION LIKELY TO DISRUPT CAMPUS COMMUTE

The Oregon Department of Transportation has begun the I-105 Highway Improvement Project. The project includes the construction of four auxiliary lanes between the ramps, upgrades of the bridge rail on nine structures, placing 13 cantilever signs, a shoulder barrier, illumination and other safety improvements. Work will include freeway and ramp closures. Construction work resulting in major traffic impacts is expected to take 66 days and nights, beginning this month and completing by early August. Keep informed of activities that may delay your commute by frequently checking updates at <u>www.keepusmoving.info</u>

Next week, workers will close the ramp from eastbound Interstate 105 to southbound Interstate 5 beginning at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, April 20, through 6 a.m. Thursday, April 21. During the overnight ramp closure period, the traffic detour is as follows:

- Continue on I-105 east to the Pioneer Parkway exit

- North on Pioneer Parkway to I-105 west

- I-105 west to I-5 south

The closure will allow a contractor to pave the ramp from I-105 east to I-5 south.

Plan additional time for your commute, avoid I-105, travel during non-peak hours, alter work schedules, and be patient during this complex staging, says ODOT. Submitted by the editor.

HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION LIKELY TO DISRUPT CAMPUS COMMUTE

The Oregon Department of Transportation has begun the I-105 Highway Improvement Project. The project includes the construction of four auxiliary lanes between the ramps, upgrades of the bridge rail on nine structures, placing 13 cantilever signs, a shoulder barrier, illumination and other safety improvements. Work will include freeway and ramp closures. Construction work resulting in major traffic impacts is expected to take 66 days and nights, beginning this month and completing by early August. Keep informed of activities that may delay your commute by frequently checking updates at <u>www.keepusmoving.info</u>

Next week, workers will close the ramp from eastbound Interstate 105 to southbound Interstate 5 beginning at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, April 20, through 6 a.m. Thursday, April 21. During the overnight ramp closure period, the traffic detour is as follows:

- Continue on I-105 east to the Pioneer Parkway exit

- North on Pioneer Parkway to I-105 west

- I-105 west to I-5 south

The closure will allow a contractor to pave the ramp from I-105 east to I-5 south. Plan additional time for your commute, avoid I-105, travel during non-peak hours, alter work schedules, and be patient during this complex staging, says ODOT. Submitted by the editor.

## THE SIX BEST PRACTICES FOR STUDENT SUCCESS AND GOAL ATTAINMENT

In last week's Daily, the Success and Goal Attainment committee (SAGA) outlined the six best practices for increasing student success. These six best practices are: learning communities; first year experiences; academic advising; supplemental instruction; early warning and intervention systems; and campus climate/supportive learner environment. This spring, well be featuring each best practice in The Daily and offering tips for student retention and success.

Learning Communities, this week's featured best practice, are classes linked by theme or purpose. They restructure students' time and learning experiences to foster intellectual and social connections among students, between students and their faculty, and among disciplines.

Learning communities provide coherence for students by creating connections between courses and disciplines; they build an academic and social community for students and encourage continuity and integration in the curriculum. Since Lane students are often busy, learning communities offer the crucial combination of academic and social engagement essential to optimum success.

#### I-105 RAMP TO BE CLOSED FOR TWO NIGHTS

Workers will close the ramp from eastbound I-105 to southbound I-5 for two nights, from 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. on Wednesday and Thursday evenings, April 20 and 21. The closure will allow the contractor working on the I-105 Highway Improvement Project to place continuously reinforced concrete pavement on the ramp from I-105 east to I-5 south. During the overnight ramp closure, the traffic detour is as follows: continue on I-105 east to the Pioneer Parkway exit; go north on Pioneer Parkway to I-105 west; and I-105 west to I-5 south.

Since January, the Oregon Department of Transportation contractor on the I-105 Highway Improvement Project has been working on a variety of tasks associated with the project such as constructing new bridge rails over several structures and the building of new auxiliary lanes between I-5 and Coburg Road and Coburg Road and Delta Highway. Work is being done primarily at night and motorists have encountered multiple lane closures between 7 p.m. and 6 a.m. The speed limit through the area has been reduced to 45 miles per hour. Motorists are reminded to drive with extra caution and watch for lane closure signs and traffic control barrels.

I-105 construction work that will include major traffic impacts is expected to start around May 13. Once started, that element of work is scheduled to last 66 days and nights. HELPING STUDENTS GET FYRED UP: ONE OF SIX BEST PRACTICES FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

The Success and Goal Attainment Committee (SAGA) is working with other groups on campus to develop a first year experience (FYE) for students this fall. The FYRED UP Pilot Project Team is planning courses and services that will help students feel welcome and engaged when they first come to Lane. The national literature confirms that first year experiences are one of six best practices for student retention and success.

The FYRED UP Pilot Project will enhance and formalize first year experiences already in place at Lane. Learning communities such as Transitions to Success and Fast Lane to Success welcome new and returning students and help them achieve their goals; courses such as Effective Learning and College Success help these students get off on the right foot. In the fall, both of these first-year learning communities will also be offering Writing 115 classes. These courses give Lanes busy students rich opportunities for academic and social engagement, both of which are critical for student retention.

The FYRED UP Pilot first year experience will also offer an orientation the week before fall classes for all students. In addition, targeted advising and other student service interventions will help new students stay FYRED UP when they meet the inevitable challenges of college life.

#### BOARD REPORT FOR APRIL

President Mary Spilde presented new budget projections to the Board of Education at its April 14 meeting. Some questions have been resolved, although state funding and the distribution formula are still unknown. Spilde also reported that winter term enrollment was up slightly; the health clinic remodel will lead to some relocations; Lane's nursing students are number one in the state on pass rates; travel procedures will allow a choice of agents effective July 1; the Foundation annual report won first place in a national competition; and Clive Wanstall earned Certified Executive Chef credentials. Winners of Lane's student literary competition were announced: Lara Coley, first place in poetry for "Living Spaces;" Morgan Sky, first place in personal essay for "Ironplow: A Lesson Toward Hope;" Frederick Griswold, first place in one-act play for "Feels So Good;" and M. E. Hardinger, first place in short story for "Gone to the Funeral."

Under statements, Matt Swagerty announced an athletics fundraiser for May 20, and Steve Candee, Courtney Anglin, Stuart Contreras and Sam Hediger advocated for OSPIRG student ballot measures.

The consent agenda passed 6-0. The agenda including purchase of wastewater treatment equipment, and selection of an architect for the health clinic remodel. Roger Hall was absent.

A second reading on contractual authority policy was approved 6-0. A second reading on purchasing procedure passed 5-0; Dennis Shine abstained.

Student ballot measure language for the athletics fee and OSPIRG fee were approved in separate votes, both 6-0.

The board heard a report on the philosophy of athletics, health and physical education at Lane.

A sequence of courses in American Indian Languages was approved unanimously on a tuition basis. President Spilde announced that the endowed chair donation received last year will be used to fund a visiting scholar for AIL.

The board discussed tuition waiver options for people returning from military service in Iraq and directed administration to bring back a recommendation in May.

The board unanimously approved new budget projections.

The funding level for the PERS reserve was discussed. College Council and its budget subcommittee will review the issue next, then the board will continue its discussion.

The board asked the president and the chair to send a letter to the Lane County Board of Commissioners to consider improvements to the 30th Avenue interchange, by 6-0 vote.

A benchmark on employees of color as a percent of all employees was reviewed.

The meeting adjourned at 9:07 p.m. The next regularly scheduled meeting will be Wednesday, May 9. The Budget Committee also will meet that night. #### TSUNAMI PREPAREDNESS EXPERT TO SPEAK AT WORKSHOP

"The Sumatra Tsunami: Can it Happen Here?" will be presented May 17, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Florence Events Center. One of the presenters will be Darci Connor of Seaside. She is the only full-time employee in Oregon dedicated solely to educating the public about what a tsunami can do. "Seaside is the best prepared, most tsunami-ready community on the Oregon Coast," according to a recent survey conducted by Portland's KATU-TV News.

Connor is funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to identify an effective outreach program for tsunami preparedness. Connor will describe her community's preparations as an example of how Florence can be tsunami-ready.

Connor has a bachelor of science in environmental science and management from the University of Rhode Island. Her professional emphasis is working with communities to understand scientific information and environmental systems.

One of the most important aspects for tsunami preparation is community education, says Conner. "If we educate our entire community on tsunamis and do so on a yearly basis then we are implementing safeguards so that our communities will know how to respond."

Connor tells a story from Southeast Asia of a little girl on a beach who had just taken a class on tsunamis. "She saw the surf go out to sea and instantly knew what was coming," Connors says. "She evacuated that beach. That was one student, on one beach, who saved 100 lives. Imagine what we can do here."

"The Sumatra Tsunami: Can It Happen Here?" is sponsored by Lane Community College at Florence, Port of Siuslaw, Siuslaw Valley Fire and Rescue, KCST radio, PeaceHealth/Siuslaw Region, and other organizations and individuals.

#### NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American word for the week is "Wa-hi-'sereht-óhare-'se." This is a one-word sentence in Mohawk, one of the Six Nations' languages of the Haudeenausaunee or "People of the Long House" of New York State. Mohawk speakers can use this one word to convey what would take a whole sentence in English to translate: "he washed the car for me." A number of other ways can be used by Mohawk speakers to convey the same meaning (such as "the car was washed for me by him"), a pattern called by linguists "incorporation." English is highly restrictive in alternative sentence structures allowed, but Mohawk frequently can build words from a single root in a process called "polysynthesis." Adding a fairly large amount of suffixes is common in Mohawk. About the most famous English example of a similar nature is the word, famous in the 60s, "antidisestablishmentarianism." Words in some Native languages can have up to eight suffixes without any difficulty posed to the speaker or the listener, providing they are fluent in that language. #### EARLY WARNING AND INTERVENTION SYSTEMS

In an earlier edition of The Daily, the Success and Goal Attainment committee (SAGA) outlined six best practices for increasing student success. These six best practices are: learning communities; first year experiences; academic advising; supplemental instruction; early warning and intervention systems; and campus climate/supportive learner environment. This spring, we are featuring each best practice in The Daily and offering tips for student retention and success.

Early Warning and Intervention Systems, this week's featured best practice, detect students who are having academic or personal problems before they begin to fail and respond with a customized plan for addressing each student's unique needs. There are two important goals of an Early Alert Intervention System. First, in advance of their enrollment, a goal is to identify "high-risk" or drop-out prone students who could benefit from institutional intervention. Second, a goal is to identify enrolled students as they begin to experience academic or personal problems that may be reduced through services provided by the college.

Some critical components to an effective Early Alert Intervention System include: utilization of placement test scores, assessment of academic risk factors, assessment of social and psychological risk factors, tracking GPA, tracking course completion rates, tracking attendance, and tracking mid-term grades. Once students who are having problems are identified they can be referred to appropriate services before they fail.

If you are a Lane instructor, it's not too late to let students know how they can still pass your class this term! Since this is about the middle of spring term, we encourage instructors to find a time this week to talk to their students who are in danger of not receiving a passing grade. That way students will have time to make changes that will improve their grades before it is too late. Possible resources to which instructors could refer students include: tutor central, the Math or Science resource center, and/or the Advising/Counseling Center.
