The Lane Spring Dance Concert featuring the works of Lane dance faculty will be held May 14, 15 and 16 at 8 p.m. in the Performance Hall, Building 6. The Lane Dance Company performs the work of Bonnie Simoa and Kim Vetter. Cheryl Lemmer will present a piece with Lane dancers. Both Simoa and Vetter also will dance new solos. #### ACADEMIC ADVISING: A BEST PRACTICE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

In an earlier edition of The Daily, the Success and Goal Attainment committee (SAGA) outlined the six best practices for increasing student success. These six best practices are: learning communities; first year experiences; academic advising; supplemental instruction; early warning and intervention systems; and campus climate/supportive learner environment. This spring, we have been featuring each best practice in The Daily and offering tips for student retention and success.

Academic advising, this week's featured best practice, is a developmental process that assists students in clarifying their academic goals and in developing academic plans for realizing those goals. It is designed to be an open conversation that is the responsibility of both student and advisor. The advisor helps students coordinate their learning experiences through courses and extracurricular activities and the advisor helps students modify the ir plans as necessary. Best practice academic advising programs are intrusive. In other words, they require students to utilize the guidance of a trained professional when choosing their courses and developing their academic plans. This helps them avoid taking courses that will not count towards their program completion and other potential obstacles to student success.

We want to encourage Lane faculty and staff to remind students that it is time to get advised for advance registration (for summer and/or fall terms) so that they can register for their classes early and have the best selection.

#### ANOTHER LANE STUDENT WINS JACK KENT COOKE SCHOLARSHIP

Graffiti was once his outlet for identity, expression and friendship while a childhood dream of writing lay dormant. Now, Ephraim C. Payne of Eugene is working toward a future as an environmental journalist thanks to Lane Community College and a transfer scholarship from the Jack Kent Cooke Foundation.

Ephraim, 31, is one of 25 students nationwide to earn the scholarship. He was selected from among 791 candidates nominated by 519 two-year colleges. He will receive up to \$30,000 a year for tuition, room and board, books, and other required fees to complete his bachelor's degree. He will graduate this summer and transfer to the University of Oregon to study journalism and environmental studies.

Ephraim enrolled at Lane in September 2003. He became a top student in economics, biology, and English. He participated in the Oregon Diversity Institute and the Reading Together project and was editor in chief of this year's college journal of nature, literature and art, Earth Tithe.

Ephraim's childhood was marked by poverty in rural California and his high school years were dimmed by substance abuse. At age 18 he enrolled in the California College of Arts and Crafts in Oakland. There he explored graffiti art muralism and made friends with students from multicultural backgrounds who shared "commonalties of poverty and alienation from the greater society." He left for lack of finances.

Ephraim got involved in environmental and political activism. He lived in Chicago for a while, where he gave up graffiti and started writing. He got married and had a daughter, which gave him a sense of clarity. Eventually he landed in Eugene and helped found the Eugene Biocarshare Car Cooperative.

"Even as I immersed myself in the art world at CCAC, I brought my typewriter along to write a novel. Here in Eugene, things have come full circle. It took a leap of faith, but I re-enrolled in college to make my dream a reality."

The Jack Kent Cooke Foundation created the transfer scholarship program to "make sure that financial obstacles do not prevent high-achieving community college students from advancing their education."

#### NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American word for the week is "Pastoni," which means "a white settler" in the Abenaki language of Maine. It's no accident that "Pastoni" is so close to "Boston" because that is the direct source that inspired this similar sounding term for Euro-Americans in the Abenaki language. Henry David Thoreau actually made Abenaki "famous" when he met Abenaki-speaking Indians in the woods. Unfortunately Thoreau resorted to an animal metaphor in his description that the Abenaki language "was a purely wild and primitive American sound, as much as the barking of a chickaree, and I could not understand a syllable of it." Chickaree is an old name for a red squirrel and therefore this is not meant to be complimentary. The view of most (non-Native) Americans in Thoreau's time was that Native languages should be pushed aside and replaced with English at all costs, and as soon as possible. Ironically, Thoreau would have probably been impressed that Abenakis had developed such a sophisticated language that six different words for "moose" were in use, compared to our English one, "moose." Today the interest in reviving and supporting endangered Native languages is ever increasing and well-documented and Lane is in the forefront of this struggle among the community colleges of the West Coast. #### ACADEMIC ADVISING: A BEST PRACTICE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS

In an earlier edition of The Daily, the Success and Goal Attainment committee (SAGA) outlined the six best practices for increasing student success. These six best practices are: learning communities; first year experiences; academic advising; supplemental instruction; early warning and intervention systems; and campus climate/supportive learner environment. This spring, we have been featuring each best practice in The Daily and offering tips for student retention and success.

Academic advising, this week's featured best practice, is a developmental process that assists students in clarifying their academic goals and in developing academic plans for realizing those goals. It is designed to be an open conversation that is the responsibility of both student and advisor. The advisor helps students coordinate their learning experiences through courses and extracurricular activities and the advisor

helps students modify their plans as necessary. Best practice academic advising programs are intrusive. In other words, they require students to utilize the guidance of a trained professional when choosing their courses and developing their academic plans. This helps them avoid taking courses that will not count towards their program completion and other potential obstacles to student success.

We want to encourage Lane faculty and staff to remind students that it is time to get advised for advance registration (for summer and/or fall terms) so that they can register for their classes early and have the best selection.

#### ASLCC ELECTION RESULTS

Jeremy Riel and Sara Sumner were elected president and vice president of the Associated Students of Lane Community College in the May 2, 3 and 4 student elections. They won 52 percent of the vote; Sandin Riddle and Michelle Fisher came in with 45 percent. In ballot measures, students voted to amend the ASLCC constitution to specify membership in the Oregon Student Association by a vote of 93 percent to 7 percent. They supported a fee increase for recreational sports, athletics and a student athletic training facility, by 59 percent to 41 percent. They voted 74 percent to 26 percent to continue fee support for OSPIRG, and to increase that fee by 75 cents by a vote of 66 percent to 34 percent. #### I-105 CONSTRUCTION TO CAUSE MAJOR TRAFFIC IMPACTS

I-105 construction work that will include major traffic impacts is expected to start May 16. Once started, that element of work is scheduled to last 66 days and nights. During this period, the contractor will remove the Portland cement concrete travel way that was built in 1967 and replace it with 12 inches of asphalt. For approximately eight days, the east bound lane of I-105 will be closed for construction, with only west bound traffic allowed; then alternating to the opposite side and closing the west bound lane for about eight days for construction with east bound traffic allowed while working over the I-5 interchange. In addition, the Delta Highway interchange will require a full closure of I-105 for three days, which will be scheduled over a weekend. The Coburg Avenue interchange will also have specific staging for 12 days in each direction where west

bound traffic will be forced to use the ramp; east bound traffic will be restricted to a single lane for 12 days. The exact dates for the closures have not been scheduled yet. As I-105 work continues in May, the contractor will continue working around the clock and the community may experience significant traffic impacts. There is a \$35,000 per day incentive for the contractor to finish the work ahead of schedule. # SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION: A BEST PRACTICES FOR STUDENT SUCCESS BROUGHT TO YOU BY SAGA

This week's featured best practice is Supplemental Instruction (SI) an academic assistance program that utilizes regularly scheduled peer- or tutor-led study sessions specifically linked to targeted, high-risk courses. The purpose of SI is to improve grades and reduce attrition in historically difficult classes. The SI leaders attend the targeted courses, and then work with students outside class in small groups to integrate the course content and to develop learning strategies.

SI was created at the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 1973. This proven practice has been named an Exemplary Educational Program by the U.S. Department of Education. UMKC continues to use supplemental instruction in many of its "gatekeeper" courses. Faculty and staff from hundreds of institutions across the nation have received training from UMKC to implement their own SI programs.

Although Lane does not have specific SI programs, there are current services in place that reflect parts of this model: EL 113 Content Specific Study Skills; study groups in Math and Science; Women in Transition required discussion groups; Women's Studies discussion groups. SI may be a consideration in departments wishing to improve within course retention.

# I-105 CONSTRUCTION MAY AFFECT YOUR COMMUTE

Prepare for delays and closures from I-105 construction, says the Oregon Department of Transportation. The first full lane closure on I-105 that will have major impacts on traffic starts at 6 a.m. Monday, May 16 when the eastbound lanes of I-105 over 1-5 will be closed for construction for 8 days, with only west bound traffic allowed over the I-5 interchange. After construction is complete on east bound lanes, closures will switch to the opposite side, where west bound lanes will be closed for about 8 days. During this phase, the east bound traffic will have regained access over the I-5 interchange.

Following these first two phases, the Coburg Road interchange section of I-105 will experience 12 days of full lane closures in each direction. In phase three, the west bound traffic will be forced to use the Coburg Road exit ramp, while east bound traffic will be restricted to a single lane for 12 days. Then west bound traffic will be returned to the over crossing and east bound traffic will be

forced to use the ramp. The Delta Highway interchange will require a full closure of I-105 on the west end of the project for 3 days, which will be scheduled over a weekend. The exact dates for these closures have not yet been scheduled by the contractor.

Once started, the five closures are scheduled within a consecutive 66 day and night window of time. During this period, the contractor will remove the Portland cement concrete travel way that was built in 1967 and replace it with 12 inches of asphalt. As I-105 work continues into June, the contractor will continue working around the clock and the community may experience significant traffic impacts. There are \$35,000 per day incentives for the contractor to finish the work ahead of schedule.

### FARM INCOME GROWING

Lane County area farm profits jumped 120 percent last year, according to Lane's Farm Business Management Program. Analyses conducted by FBM participants show that average net income per farm grew from \$46,269 in 2003 to \$101,769 in 2004. Figures cover a range of farm types, including fruit and vegetable, field crops, and livestock. FBM Coordinator Gary Valde says the figures are representative of Lane County farm trends specifically and Oregon farms in general. "Ironically, though a number of farms were enjoying increased profits in 2004, they face more challenges for 2005 than in many past years."

For example, hazelnut growers received some of the highest prices on record but are dealing with Eastern filbert blight, a disease that increases production costs, reduces yields, and can eventually destroy an orchard. Cattle prices were also at historical high levels, but uncertainty about imports and consumer demand may cause prices to drop. Milk prices were up in 2004 but have already begun to decline.

"Nursery production has been a shining star for both Lane County and Oregon agriculture for years," Valde adds. "However, growth in nursery production, along with increased shipping and production costs are narrowing profit margins for growers. Christmas tree producers are facing similar problems."

Then, of course, there's the drought. Valde notes that despite the alarm bells, spring rains may still be adequate for non-irrigated crops such as hay and some grass seeds, but farmers who rely on irrigation for their crops continue to have concerns about the availability of irrigation water for this summer.

Each year, farmers participating in the Lane FBM program complete a computer analysis of their farm's performance. These figures are averaged to provide data that can be compared to each individual farm. These analyses,

along with numerous other activities such as planning, marketing, and tax management, are used by participants to help them meet the challenges they face in farming. Contact: Gary Valde, 463-4615.

## NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American Word for the Week is "utsimavaa" which is "she or he knows from experience" in the Inuktitut language of Alaska. This indigenous word for "know" however has many alternative forms depending on distinctions the societies choose to make, and the focus of today's word is to know "from experience," and this seems to suggest giving evidence of how one came to know something. The next focuses upon skill or knowledge of abilities such as "Sanatuuq" which is "he or she knows how to do something." Others can be more general such as "qaujimavaa" which is "she or he knows about something," "nalujuunnaipaa" is "she or he is not ignorant of something," "nalunaiqpaa" is "she or he is no longer unaware of something," and so on. These First Nations peoples carefully distinguish many aspects of "knowing" based upon a whole set of related cultural values which changes shades of meaning in the spoken language and word choice. ### SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION: A BEST PRACTICE

This week's featured best practice is Supplemental Instruction (SI) an academic assistance program that utilizes regularly scheduled peer- or tutor-led study sessions specifically linked to targeted, high-risk courses. The purpose of SI is to improve grades and reduce attrition in historically difficult classes. The SI leaders attend the targeted courses, and then work with students outside class in small groups to integrate the course content and to develop learning strategies.

SI was created at the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 1973. This proven practice has been named an Exemplary Educational Program by the U.S. Department of Education. UMKC continues to use supplemental instruction in many of its "gatekeeper" courses. Faculty and staff from hundreds of institutions across the nation have received training from UMKC to implement their own SI programs.

Although Lane does not have specific SI programs, there are current services in place that reflect parts of this model: EL 113 Content Specific Study Skills; study groups in Math and Science; Women in Transition required discussion groups; Women's Studies discussion groups. SI may be a consideration in departments wishing to improve within course retention.

#### **ENDOWED CHAIR POSITION**

Nominations close May 23

Lane Community College is pleased to announce an endowed position to initiate an American Indian Languages curriculum. As you might know, Lane has been making plans for several years to offer students the opportunity to study native languages. The anonymous gift of funds for an endowed chair will finally make this possible. The endowment will rotate among the colleges instructional divisions on a regular basis and the first endowed chair position will be in American Indian Languages.

President Mary Spilde recently announced that for 2005-06, Lane's first endowed chair will be bestowed on a recognized scholar of native languages with an emphasis on the Northwest. The chair position will oversee the development and implementation of a course of study for 100 and 200 level language classes in the division of Language, Literature and Communication. In addition, the chair will join others in leading Lane toward a form of Native American Studies certification and maintain contact with tribal and campus communities throughout the area.

At its April 2005 meeting, Lane's Board of Education approved the offering of an American Indian Language course of study to be offered beginning fall 2005 with the following goals: (1) support the development of a course of instruction in a Northwest Indian language; (2) offer a sequence of classes at both 100 and 200 levels, and (3) establish articulation with the Oregon University System and with tribal benchmarks for student achievement and assessment. The endowed chair will work closely with the instructor of these classes to meet these goals.

Because of the timeline for the position, details of the role and job description will be negotiated by the invited chair and the college.

You can help us with this process, if you would grant us a favor We hope you will let us know of any scholars of Northwest Indian languages whom you could recommend. We would also welcome a brief comment about your nominees qualifications. Based on the nominations received, the American Indian Languages Committee will send invitations to selected candidates to apply for the endowed chair position. The committee hopes to make final recommendations by the end of spring term. You can also help us by sharing this good news with your community. We need to close nominations by May 23.

#### SINGLE LANE RESTRICTION BEGINS TONIGHT ON I-105

From the Oregon Department of Transportation: Starting tonight at 7 p.m., the contractor working on the I-105 Highway Improvement Project will start an around-the-clock restriction to a single lane for eastbound I-105 traffic between the Delta Highway off ramp and the Delta Highway on ramp. Traffic will be shifted to the left lane so Delta Highway on ramp vehicles will be able to enter the right hand lane from a realigned ramp alignment. This lane restriction is needed for reconstruction of the on ramp. The reconstruction and paving should be completed by Saturday night and motorists should expect delays during peak evening and morning periods.

I-105 construction work that will include major traffic impacts is expected to start Thursday at 6 a.m. when the east bound lane of I-105 over I-5 will be closed for construction for eight days, with only west bound traffic allowed.

NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American word for the week is "Tsimshian." This is actually the name for a First Nation tribe in Alaska and it is one of the words they use to call themselves. The Tsimshian name derives from their name for the Skeena River, or "Ksian" which includes the place-name locative "K" which is preceded by "ts'm" which means "inside of an object." Assembling together these parts, "ts'm" plus "k" plus "sian" has, over time, become "Tsimshian," meaning "Inside the Skeena River." Many linguists used to think that the Tsimshian language was a language isolate, meaning no other languages survive which were related to it (like Basque is a language isolate in Europe). The great linguist Edward Sapir, however, proposed that it is a Penutian language, remotely related to the Kalapuya and the Klamath languages of Oregon. The Coast Tsimshian language is called "Sm'algyax" which means "the real language" and refers to the dialect of the lower Skeena River, at the river's mouth. Tsimshian or Sm'algyax is still spoken fluently by between 500 to 800 people today. This language therefore is one of the few Native languages today which has miraculously survived against all odds. - Dr. Don Addison, American Indian language instructor, LCC and UO, 344-4758

#### FREE PUBLIC LECTURE ON "OUR MYSTERIOUS UNIVERSE"

A lecture, "Realizing Einstein's Dream: Exploring Our Mysterious Universe," by Jim Brau, director of the Center for High Energy Physics, University of Oregon, will be held at 7 p.m., May 19, 100 Willamette Hall, 1371 East 13th Avenue. Brau will explore some of the puzzles of our universe, including an unidentified, invisible form of matter, "dark matter," and an enigmatic force, "dark energy," that is pushing our expanding universe. He will also discuss how particle accelerators, laser interferometers, and other tools are used to explore the cosmos. Such instruments may help to reveal the meaning of these mysteries, realizing Einstein's dream-to understand the workings of the physical universe. Brau experiments with elementary particle interactions to test and extend our understanding of the fundamental laws of the physical universe. He teaches physics and astronomy. His research is funded by the U.S. Department of Energy Office of Science and the National Science Foundation. # CAMPUS CLIMATE/SUPPORTIVE LEARNER ENVIRONMENT: A BEST PRACTICE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS BROUGHT TO YOU BY SAGA.

Colleges can improve retention by providing a student-friendly environment. Some of the key areas in this best practice are: admissions, registration, the library, financial aid, the quality of teaching, advising, counseling, food service, building and grounds maintenance, safety/security, the bookstore, health services, computer labs, disability services, multicultural and women's centers, and student life programs such as clubs, recreational sports and student government.

Because there is a strong correlation between student satisfaction and persistence, improving student success begins with evaluating and improving the colleges service systems, policies, and processes. Lane has several initiatives that reflect this best practice of evaluation and quality improvement of the campus climate such as: the establishment of the Success and Goal Attainment (SAGA) committee, IRAP's administration of the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE) and the ACT student opinion survey, strategic learning initiatives (sli), the diversity plan and coordinator, diversity training, establishment of learning-centered college principles, and the strategic directions, especially the directions to enhance the college climate and to build an infrastructure that mainstreams innovation.

This summer Lane will get the results of the CCSSE survey conducted in 90 classrooms during winter 2005. The CCSSE generates a retention index for each college to gauge its overall performance. The retention index combines a colleges

scores in three key areas of student engagement: 1) active and collaborative learning, 2) student-faculty interaction, and 3) support for learners. The SAGA committee will use the survey as a benchmark to evaluate the effectiveness of our efforts to improve retention.

The radio message can be quickly updated from the ODOT dispatch center in Salem. Eventually, there will be several HAR transmitters installed in the Eugene-Springfield area to give full coverage of the metro area. # **BOARD REPORT**

President Mary Spilde reported to the Lane Community College Board of Education at its May 11 meeting that the state funding outlook has improved and that the proposed funding formula is agreeable to Lane. She said the college's proposed budget for 2005/06 is basically status quo. Lane's Budget Committee held its first meeting earlier that evening.

Spilde commended Tony McCown for being named an Oregon Community College Association Outstanding Student Scholar; and presented an award of appreciation for his past year of service as student body president.

The president introduced Paul Binney, visiting administrator from Northland Polytechnic in New Zealand. He gave a presentation on the status of community colleges in his country.

Under statements from the audience, student Brandy Minogue encouraged board approval of the OSPIRG vote results in student elections; and newly-elected student

body president Jeremy Riel advocated affirmation of all election results (read more about Jeremy at <a href="https://www.lanecc.edu/mpr/success/story33.htm">www.lanecc.edu/mpr/success/story33.htm</a>).

The board approved ASLCC election results (see <a href="https://www.lanecc.edu/aslcc/elections.html">www.lanecc.edu/aslcc/elections.html</a>) by 6-0 vote; board member Larry Romine was absent. In other unanimous action the board approved a resolution calling for more affordable textbooks; a one-term six-credit tuition waiver for Oregon veterans involuntarily activated since 9/11/2001; the same evaluation process for the president as last year; and authorized Chair Paul Holman to send a letter to the State Board of Education supporting the community college funding formula.

The board heard reports on successful community fundraising for athletics; the quarterly financial statement; and a benchmark on the percentage of high school graduates attending Lane.

The meeting adjourned at 8:51 p.m. The next meeting on June 8 will include the annual public budget hearing and budget adoption. Board minutes are posted after approval at www.lanecc.edu/presoffc/board/minstoc.htm

# CAMPUS CLIMATE/SUPPORTIVE LEARNER ENVIRONMENT: A BEST PRACTICE FOR STUDENT SUCCESS BROUGHT TO YOU BY SAGA

Colleges can improve retention by providing a student-friendly environment. Some of the key areas in this best practice are: admissions, registration, the library, financial aid, the quality of teaching, advising, counseling, food service, building and grounds maintenance, safety/security, the bookstore, health services, computer labs, disability services, multicultural and women's centers, and student life programs such as clubs, recreational sports and student government.

Because there is a strong correlation between student satisfaction and persistence, improving student success begins with evaluating and improving the colleges service systems, policies, and processes. Lane has several initiatives that reflect this best practice of evaluation and quality improvement of the campus climate such as: the establishment of the Success and Goal Attainment (SAGA) committee, IRAP's administration of the Community College Survey of Student Engagement

(CCSSE) and the ACT student opinion survey, strategic learning initiatives (SLI), the diversity plan and coordinator, diversity training, establishment of learning-centered college principles, and the strategic directions, especially the directions to enhance the college climate and to build an infrastructure that mainstreams innovation.

This summer Lane will get the results of the CCSSE survey conducted in 90 classrooms during winter 2005. The CCSSE generates a retention index for each college to gauge its overall performance. The retention index combines a colleges scores in three key areas of student engagement: 1) active and collaborative learning, 2) student-faculty interaction, and 3) support for learners. SAGA will use the survey as a benchmark to evaluate the effectiveness of our efforts to improve retention.

FLIGHT PROGRAM GETS GRANT FOR HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE OUTREACH Flight Technology recently won a \$4,720 National Aeronautics and Space Administration grant from Oregon State University to deliver aviation career presentations to high school and university students. Program director Harvey Birdseye said funds helped purchase laptop/projector sets for presentations and brochures. The program now has kiosk space in the main terminal at Eugene airport and at the Evergreen Aviation Museum. Flight training classes are available to high school students in college facilities for dual credit this spring and summer. Fall plans call for developing instructional materials in several aviation specialties: professional pilots, aviation maintenance technicians, avionics technicians, air traffic control, line service technician and large volume fuel handling systems, aviation education, aviation related materials sciences, aviation related business, finance and insurance, and engineering related professions. The grant is part of an ongoing partnership with OSU to develop career pathways in the increasingly sophisticated and rapidly expanding air transportation industry. Lane is the vital link between the area high schools and the universities, says Birdseye. - Editor

"This event will introduce the girls to Lane and show them that many women indeed enjoy science and excel at it," says Lacy. "We hope that our students will be role models to these middle school girls and encourage them in science." # E-MAIL RETENTION PERIOD EXTENDED

When the college installed the Novell GroupWise product in 2000, there were only two options for automatically deleting e-mail, appointments, tasks or notes: delete after 250 days or retain forever. The college chose to auto-delete after 250 days. In the last four years the GroupWise database size has grown by 3000 percent. A recent upgrade to the GroupWise software allows us to increase the retention period to 365 days. This means that any mail you receive today will automatically be deleted from your mail box in one year. In order to keep mail longer than 365 days you need to archive it. # NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE WEEK

Today's Native American word for the week is "Poochishkaawik tii sooyii" and is a phrase in the Michif language of Canada telling someone to wear her shoes. It is no accident that "tii sooyii" sound vaguely similar to the French words "tes souliers," "your shoes," because that is their source. Linguists call them loan words and all languages have at least some. Michif, however, has more than just a few loan words because this is the hybrid language of the Métis people, descendants of Cree women who were married to French trappers. This language, admittedly difficult to master, emerged early in the nineteenth century from the Great Lakes to the buffalo hunts and winter camps on the Plains. Michif contains two sound patterns, two sets of word endings, and two systems of syntax. This is because most nouns in Michif come from French and verbs, from Cree (a Native language of the Algonkian language family)! #### **DISABILITY SERVICES AWARENESS TIP #6**

Here are some tips to use when working with someone who has a visual impairment:

\*Use a normal tone of voice; don't raise your voice unless you are requested to do so.

- \*Offer to read written information and wait for permission to do so.
- \*Don't assume the person will recognize you by your voice even if you have met before. Always identify yourself.
- \*Offer to orient the person to the area and wait for permission to do so. Describe the location of major furniture and doors (opening in or out). If the person has been there before, you should inform them of any changes or new obstacles.
- \*If the person asks for assistance in traveling, offer your bent arm. The person will typically grasp your arm lightly just below the elbow. Walk in a relaxed manner and they will be able to follow the motions of your body. Give a warning when you approach steps (up or down), doors (opening in or out), or other obstacles. When walking with the individual, be the assistant, not the director.
- \*When giving directions, use specific terms such as "straight ahead" or "forward". Avoid vague terms such as "over there".
- \*If the person uses a cane, never move it yourself. You may ask them to move it if it's in the way. Submitted by Leigh Alice Petty.

# BEST PRACTICES FOR ACHIEVING STUDENT RETENTION

The SAGA (Success and Goal Attainment) committee is excited about the progress being made on campus to improve student retention. SAGA recently reviewed in The Daily the six best practices for achieving student engagement and retention.

These best practices include first-year experiences which help students feel welcome and engaged when they first come to campus. Lane offers such experiences through Transitions to Success and Fast Lane to Success.

Academic advising is a developmental process that assists students in clarifying their academic goals and in developing academic plans for realizing those goals.

An early alert system is a best practice designed to detect students who are having academic or personal problems that may be negatively impacting their academic progress and provides a plan for addressing these problems before the student has failed academically, lost their financial aid, or dropped out.

Supplemental instruction uses regularly scheduled peer or tutor-led study sessions linked specifically to targeted high-risk courses. SI staff attends the targeted courses and then works with students outside of the class individually and in small groups to assist with student understanding and integration of course content and to develop learning strategies that will improve the student's grades and reduce student attrition.

A fifth best practice is campus climate/supportive learner environment. The literature on the impact of campus climate and supportive learner environment recommends that improving student success begins with evaluating and improving the college's service systems, policies, and processes, many of which were mentioned in last week's SAGA article in The Daily. A major effort this year to determine student engagement in current support services offered at Lane was the administration of the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE). During summer 2005, the results of the survey will be analyzed, and will hopefully provide benchmarks for interventions called for in the survey results. The SAGA committee wants to thank the students and faculty, in whose classes the survey was administered, for their tolerance and support which allowed the survey to be given in 90 classrooms.

Learning communities are the sixth best practice reviewed. LCs are classes linked by theme and purpose. They restructure students' time and learning experiences to foster intellectual and social connections among students, between student and faculty, and among instructional disciplines. LCs build an academic and social community for students and encourages continuity and integration in the curriculum.

Other activities currently being planned through the SAGA committee include a major kick-off new student orientation planned for September 22. We are also gathering retention tips from faculty to be shared with other faculty. To assist both students and staff become familiar with the literature supporting the goals of SAGA, a website has been developed by the director of Library Services which contains these supporting references. We will soon launch the SAGA website which will capture current and future activities planned to enhance student success and goal attainment.

A challenge facing SAGA and other groups involved in the implementation of new policies and procedures designed to improve the overall experience for both students and staff at Lane, is to assure that there is coherence and alignment between the new innovations and the vision, mission, and goals of the college. Our new unit planning process provides a structure for achieving that coherence and alignment as well as for the allocation of financial and instructional resources. It is through the UPP that the interface between college financial, human, and material resources comes together for the implementation of services/activities that directly impact our students. Hopefully the six best practices reviewed here will find their way into the unit planning process and be implemented at both the campuswide and program levels.

# STUDENT TECHNOLOGY FEE FUNDING ANNOUNCED

The student technology fee is assessed at \$3 per credit hour. The fee is estimated to generate about \$875,000 in revenue for FY06. Funds are allocated by the associate vice president for Information Technology, with advice from TACT (Technology Advisory and Coordinating Team) based on initiatives submitted through the unit planning process. This year we reviewed over 100 initiatives with requests totaling nearly \$2,000,000. Initial allocations for FY06 are posted at <a href="http://www.lanecc.edu/tact/0505alloc.htm">http://www.lanecc.edu/tact/0505alloc.htm</a>. College policy requires that the fund be assessed a 4.5 percent "provision for bad debt". TACT also sets aside 5 percent of estimated revenue as a contingency fund available to meet emergency technology needs that arise during the academic year. # BEST PRACTICES FOR ACHIEVING STUDENT RETENTION

The SAGA (Success and Goal Attainment) committee is excited about the progress being made on campus to improve student retention. SAGA recently reviewed in The Daily the six best practices for achieving student engagement and retention.

These best practices include first-year experiences which help students feel welcome and engaged when they first come to campus. Lane offers such experiences through Transitions to Success and Fast Lane to Success.

Academic advising is a developmental process that assists students in clarifying their academic goals and in developing academic plans for realizing those goals.

An early alert system is a best practice designed to detect students who are having academic or personal problems that may be negatively impacting their academic progress and provides a plan for addressing these problems before the student has failed academically, lost their financial aid, or dropped out.

Supplemental instruction uses regularly scheduled peer or tutor-led study sessions linked specifically to targeted high-risk courses. SI staff attends the targeted courses and then works with students outside of the class individually and in small groups to assist with student understanding and integration of course content and to develop learning strategies that will improve the student's grades and reduce student attrition.

A fifth best practice is campus climate/supportive learner environment. The literature on the impact of campus climate and supportive learner environment recommends that improving student success begins with evaluating and improving the college's service systems, policies, and processes, many of which were mentioned in last week's SAGA article in The Daily. A major effort this year to determine student engagement in current support services offered at Lane was the administration of the

Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE). During summer 2005, the results of the survey will be analyzed, and will hopefully provide benchmarks for interventions called for in the survey results. The SAGA committee wants to thank the students and faculty, in whose classes the survey was administered, for their tolerance and support which allowed the survey to be given in 90 classrooms.

Learning communities are the sixth best practice reviewed. LCs are classes linked by theme and purpose. They restructure students' time and learning experiences to foster intellectual and social connections among students, between student and faculty, and among instructional disciplines. LCs build an academic and social community for students and encourages continuity and integration in the curriculum.

Other activities currently being planned through the SAGA committee include a major kick-off new student orientation planned for September 22. We are also gathering retention tips from faculty to be shared with other faculty. To assist both students and staff become familiar with the literature supporting the goals of SAGA, a website has been developed by the director of Library Services which contains these supporting references; see <a href="http://lanecc.edu/library/staff/david/saga.htm">http://lanecc.edu/library/staff/david/saga.htm</a>. We will soon launch the SAGA website which will capture current and future activities planned to enhance student success and goal attainment.

A challenge facing SAGA and other groups involved in the implementation of new policies and procedures designed to improve the overall experience for both students and staff at Lane, is to assure that there is coherence and alignment between the new innovations and the vision, mission, and goals of the college. Our new unit planning process provides a structure for achieving that coherence and alignment as well as for the allocation of financial and instructional resources. It is through the UPP that the interface between college financial, human, and material resources comes together for the implementation of services/activities that directly impact our students. Hopefully the six best practices reviewed here will find their way into the unit planning process and be implemented at both the campuswide and program levels.
