I.T. QUESTION OF THE WEEK: WHAT'S UP WITH SPAM E-MAIL?

The Information Technology Department is doing several things to try and minimize the impact of "spam" (unwanted or junk e-mail) on you and the LCC e-mail service. As you've certainly noticed, the Internet has been plagued with quasi-commercial and often illegal activities that generate a huge quantity of spam. The GroupWise administrators run several programs that attempt to intercept the obvious spam messages. This is a difficult task and spam does occasionally get through these systems as the spammers are getting more sophisticated in their efforts to avoid

interception. You can also protect yourself somewhat by only using your LCC e-mail address for work related purposes. This will lower your exposure to the spammers and their efforts to collect your e-mail address. In addition, you can also use the GroupWise Junk Mail features to further protect yourself from spam. JULY FORECAST: RAIN (AS IN "SINGIN' IN THE RAIN")

The Lane Summer Musical Theatre production of "Singin' In The Rain" to be held this July at Lane Community College sparkles with all of the marvelous songs and dance from the 1952 movie musical. (See <http://www.lanecc.edu/perarts/singing/index.htm>)

"The final scene of Act I, the 'Singin' In The Rain' number, is certain to thrill our audience", says co-producer Ron Bertucci. How will LSMT recreate on stage the classic image from the 1952 film with Gene Kelly holding his palm up to a downpour while twirling his umbrella? "Let's just say that our technical staff has to keep the 33-member cast and 24-member orchestra dry enough to dance, sing and play their way through the rest of the show!"

This will be the Eugene area's first production of "Singin' In The Rain." Bertucci and co-producer Jim Greenwood are music instructors at Lane. A few years ago they teamed up to revive local interest in summer musical theatre, create summer theater opportunities for local talent, and raise money for scholarships for Lane music, dance and theater arts students. "Singin' In The Rain is their third show, following "Fiddler on the Roof" in 2004 and "West Side Story" in 2002.

LSMT's production staff for "Singin' In The Rain" includes director Jack Watson and choreographers Teri Page and Marco Davis. The cast features community talent including students from Lane, the University of Oregon and local high schools. Joseph Oyala plays the role of Don Lockwood, Julianne Graper is Kathy Seldon, Chris Carwithen is Cosmo Brown and Emily Peterson is Lina Lamont. Facilities are provided by Lane Community College and Weyerhaeuser is the title sponsor.

"Singin' In The Rain" will be performed 12 times, on July 14, 15, and 16; 21, 22 and 23; 27, 28, 29 and 30; at 7:30 p.m. There will be 2 p.m. matinees on July 17 and 24. Performances will be held in the Performance Hall, Building 6. Tickets are \$22 for the general public and \$18 for students and may be obtained through the Lane Box Office at 463-5202. LANE NAMED RECYCLER OF THE YEAR

Lane Community College has been named Recycler of the Year by the Association of Oregon Recyclers. "This is a great accomplishment for Lane Recycling and the college," says Recycling and Surplus Property Coordinator Mike Sims. "Congratulations to everyone involved and thanks for recycling!"

AOR membership includes recycling professionals from profit, nonprofit and governmental organizations. AOR President Alex Cuyler, recycling analyst for the City of Eugene, will present the award to Lane at Wednesday's Board of Education meeting.

Sims notes that students began the recycling effort at Lane in 1978 by collecting paper. Records show that 5 tons of paper were collected in 1988. Today, 52 percent of all college waste is recycled or reused, accounting for more than 343 tons of batteries, food waste, sawdust, paper, metal, glass, motor oil, and other materials.

The AOR award is the second regional recognition earned by Lane for its sustainability efforts. In March 2005, the college was commended for its sustainability program by the Education for Sustainability Western Network (www.efswest.org).

CARL HORSTRUP NAMED TO APPRENTICESHIP HALL OF FAME

Carl Horstrup, Continuing Education program coordinator, was among 37 U.S. Apprenticeship Association Hall of Fame Recipients honored by Congressman Peter DeFazio on June 27. The Fitzgerald Act, signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1937, set standards for federal cooperation among the states through the formation of voluntary apprenticeship committees. In 1992 the U.S.A.A. created the Donald Grabowski Hall of Fame, honoring individuals who have served at least 25 years promoting the growth and development of apprenticeship programs. The LCC Novell environment runs on an integrated collection of about two dozen file servers. In order to keep our Novell products (GroupWise for e-mail and calendaring, NetWare for file access, Zenworks for workstation maintenance) in optimal working condition we need to constantly repair, replace and upgrade the hardware and software on each of the servers in the system. With so many servers, it can take a long time to perform this routine maintenance. We try to schedule these interruptions for holiday weekends for two reasons: usage is low, and the long weekend gives us an extra day to complete all of our work. - Stephen F. FORMER LANE PRESIDENT FEATURED IN ARTICLE

Larry Romine, Lane Board of Education member and former director of public relations at Lane from 1966-92, has published an article in the summer 2005 issue of the Lane County Historian. "Robert Hamill: LCC's Forgotten President, 1968-69" remembers Hamill, who was appointed when founding President Dale Parnell left to become state superintendent of education. Hamill was known for his warm personality and strong belief in shared decision-making. He lost the bid for the permanent presidency but went on to a full career in community college leadership elsewhere.

Romine wrote "The Parnell Years," a monograph about Dale Parnell published by the college in 1998. The Hamill article was written in 1992. "It took 13 years to find a publisher," says Romine.

BOARD REPORT

New board members Susie Johnston and Pat Riggs-Henson, and re-elected board member Paul Holman, took the oath of office at the July 13 Board of Education meeting. Holman received accolades for his past year as chair. (See photos at www.lanecc.edu/mpr/photogallery/boardmtgs.htm) Riggs-Henson participated by speaker phone.

Roger Hall was elected 2005/06 chair, and Mike Rose was elected vice chair.

During the president's report, staff accepted the Recycler of the Year Award from the Association of Oregon Recyclers (see www.lanecc.edu/mpr/news/rel00698.htm .)

A public hearing was called at about 7 p.m. regarding the proposed sale of Lane's old building in Cottage Grove. No public comment was offered.

Under statements from the audience, ASLCC Vice President Sara Sumner supported reviewing the tuition policy in the governance process. Former board member Dennis Shine congratulated new and re-elected board members, and thanked the board, president, staff, and community for his term of service on the board. Student Lisa Nelson

objected to summer Friday closures, citing a need for more access to computer labs and tutoring.

The consent agenda passed, including paving the southwest gravel parking lots, and hiring Stastny/Bunn of Portland as longhouse architects. In other action, the board approved the president's fourth straight outstanding performance evaluation (see story above); approved the second reading of the tuition policy; passed a resolution advocating better state funding to minimize tuition increases; approved the results of the May board election; made annual board appointments to community organizations; and authorized the president to initiate fall term strategic investments to boost enrollment.

The board reviewed notes from last month's conversation with local economic development leaders; heard about the progress of College Council in planning the budget development process for 2006/07; reviewed a benchmark on staff and student FTE; heard a monitoring report on the treatment of staff; and heard a report on Community Learning Center enrollment, which is strong at Thurston and Willamette, and slow in Oakridge and McKenzie.

All action was unanimous. The board's next regular meeting is September 14. -
