IT TIP OF THE WEEK: GETTING RID OF SPAM

If you are tired of getting junk mail, and you want a simple way to deal with it, you may choose to junk any mail that comes from an unrecognized address. If you do this, all incoming mail will be screened to see if the sender is listed in your personal or frequent contact address books. If they aren't, the mail will be sent to your Junk Mail folder. If you use this method, you should be sure to check your Junk Mail folder frequently to make sure there aren't any non-junk items from senders who weren't in your address books. If you find any, you can add the senders to your address book or Trust list so that their mail will not be sent to the Junk Mail folder in future. Here is how to configure your GroupWise account to junk all mail from unrecognized off-campus addresses:

1) Click Tools, then click Junk Mail Handling

2) Select Enable Junk Mail Using Personal Address Books

3) Click OK.

All future items from e-mail addresses not in your Frequent Contacts address book and other personal address books will be delivered to the Junk Mail folder. You can specify that the items in this folder be deleted after <n> days. LANE INTRODUCES ART-O-MAT TO OREGON

Clark Whittington, creator of the Art-o-mat, an art vending machine, will discuss the inspiration, purpose and results of his brainstorm during a lecture and reception in the Lane Art Gallery on Monday, October 10, from 12-2 p.m. The event will unveil Oregon's first Art-o-mat, a retired cigarette machine converted to vend art. There are 80 Art-o-mats in use throughout the country, featuring the works of more than 400 artists. The Oregon Art-o-mat will have one slot dedicated to the work of Lane Community College students; the rest of the slots will dispense artwork by artists

from around the country. The pocket-sized artworks range from small paintings, sculptures, poems or any number of concept-driven art pieces.

Rick Williams, chair of Lane's Division of the Arts, says, "We're proud to host this unique concept involving accessible art in an interactive format. The Art Gallery Committee recognizes the educational benefits in featuring artworks by nationally known artists. Art-o-mat provides the added benefit of an opportunity for Lane's student artworks to be included in the project." He also notes that the Art-o-mat is part of the ArtWorks initiative at Lane designed to integrate the arts into daily life in our community.

"We're wanting to reach quality investors who haven't taken art seriously before, and to support artists trying to make a living," says Whittington. He notes that at \$5 per artwork, the Art-o-mat is intended to encourage people to collect and share art. He says he hopes the machines inspire people to make the leap from Art-o-mat's kitschy-cool to serious art collecting. Some machines donate a portion of the proceeds to local charities. Proceeds from the Lane Art-o-mat will support arts programs at Lane.

UNDERSTANDING DIVERSITY: WHAT CAN I DO?

Friday, October 7, 1-5 p.m., Building 19, Room 105

This four-hour workshop provides a broad overview of the nature of diversity, starting with an examination of what we mean by culture and identity. Topics include cultures and identities and how they are "interactive," rather than "additive;" census information about who makes up the U.S., schools, and the workforce, including factors such as race, age, economics, and immigration; and some "diversity definitions," such as stereotype, power, privilege, and prejudice. Elizabeth Woody, an enrolled member of the Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs in Oregon, earned a bachelor's degree in English from Evergreen State College in Olympia, Wash. From 1994 to1996, Woody was a professor of creative writing at the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe. As an artist, Ms. Woody has exhibited regionally and nationally. She is one of the founding members of the Northwest Native American Writers Association.

The Oregon Diversity Institute was started 10 years ago by a group of community colleges including Lane, to bring together educators and others interested in diversity issues in business, education and society.

30TH AND GONYEA ROAD INTERCHANGE FEEDBACK REQUESTED

Some accidents and close misses have happened at the 30th and Gonyea Road interchange. The college and county road department is concerned about this and want to improve the safety of the interchange. There are two specific concerns: The curves of each of the cloverleafs leading to and from 30th and Gonyea Road are sharp, and the vehicles entering the campus from 30th have a very short distance in which to merge with vehicles exiting the campus onto 30th.

At the request of the college, county crews have installed signs warning drivers of the appropriate speed for tight curves of the on-ramp, and the crews have removed the trees blocking the sightlines between 30th and the on-ramp so that drivers on the cloverleaf can see drivers on 30th and vice versa. This allows drivers to adjust their speed to merge safely.

The question is, will these improvements significantly increase the safety of the interchange, or will more have to be done? The college needs to inform the County by December 1 if more needs to be done. We're asking for your help to monitor whether the signs and improved sightlines have increased the safety of the interchange or not. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE DAY

Today's Native American word for the day is 'shunka.' This is the Lakota (Sioux) word for 'dog.' For thousands of years, the dog was the Lakota's valued helper. Around the 15th century, the Spanish brought horses into the Southwest through Mexico, reintroducing horses onto the North American continent. The Lakota of the Northern Plains they were so taken with these horses, that they coined a compound term from 'shunka' ('dog') and 'tanka' for 'big'--meaning 'big dog' to refer to the horse--'shunktanka.' Compounding is a common morphological process linguists have identified to refer to this phenomenon. The Plains people even divided their historical references into 'dog days' and 'horse days' to designate more ancient (former times) and more recent times (since contact with Europeans). - Dr. Don Addison, Native American languages instructor at LCC and UO, 344-4758

KLCC RAISES A RECORD \$271,010 DURING FALL RADIOTHON

KLCC's 2005 Fall Radiothon came to its hectic conclusion as 406 listeners called in to pledge \$37,075 of support during the final four hours of Radiothon. At 9 a.m. on October 13, Radiothon came to an end just \$5,990 short of the \$277,000 goal. The final total of \$271,010 was the largest amount raised in KLCC history. Radiothon began with \$122,700 in the bank, thanks to 1,688 "Thon Busters" who contributed in the weeks before Radiothon. Every dollar that came in from Thon Busters reduced the on-air goal of Radiothon. The remaining \$148,310 came from 1,774 households during the 72 days of Radiothon. KLCC member contributions help cover the cost of NPR news, nationally syndicated programs, locally programmed music, community information, live broadcasts of special events, and intelligent entertainment all year long. IS THE 30TH AND GONYEA INTERCHANGE SAFE? YOU TELL US

Some accidents and close misses have happened at the 30th and Gonyea Road interchange. The college and county road department are concerned about this and want to improve the safety of the interchange. There are two specific concerns: the curves of each of the cloverleafs leading to and from 30th and Gonyea Road are sharp curves and the vehicles entering the campus from 30th have a very short distance in which to merge with vehicles exiting the campus onto 30th.

At the request of the college, county crews installed signs warning drivers of the appropriate speed for tight curves of the on-ramp and the crews have removed the trees blocking the sightlines between 30th and the on-ramp so that drivers on the cloverleaf can see drivers on 30th and vice versa. This allows drivers to adjust their speed to merge safely.

The question is, will these improvements significantly increase the safety of the interchange or will more have to be done? The college needs to inform the county by December 1 if more needs to be done. We're asking for your help to monitor whether the signs and improved sightlines have increased the safety of the interchange or not. NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE DAY

Today's "Native American word for the day" is "O-TE-khee." It provides us with a lesson on how language change expresses social change--positive or negative. This is a Lakota (Sioux) expression which is one possible answer to the familiar question "To-NEEK-too-ka-hwo?" which means "How are you?" If someone were to answer in the formal manner, to say "I'm not well" they would say "o-TE-khee-ye-lo" or informally, "o-TE-kheek-shto." The former is also considered "male speech" (with the male-speaker marker "yelo" taged onto the end) and the latter, "female speech" (used by women speakers who replace "yelo" with "kshto.") However, in the 20th century, with the horrific rise of drug abuse and alcoholism on Indian reservations across the nation, "o-TE-khee"

has begun to take on a new connotation. Unfortunately it now often means "I have a hang-over." Examples like this abound where Native American languages change, as social conditions change, to reflect these developments. On a more positive note, however, more Native Americans are following the positive "Red Road" path to sobriety now more than ever in the past 600 years! - Dr. Don Addison, Native American languages instructor at LCC and the UO, 344-4758

BOARD REPORT FOR OCTOBER

The Lane Community College Board of Education approved the sale of the college's old Cottage Grove building on 5th street to the Old Time Gospel Fellowship for \$165,000, by 7-0 vote at its October 12 meeting. There were no public comments.

Under Statements from Audience, faculty union president Jim Salt asked five faculty members to describe their recent sabbaticals. Merrill Watrous talked about doing a book on teaching writing; Julia Munkvold participated in a nursing consortium and learned about simulation technology; Bob Barber talked about his work on organizational design; Larry Scott described cooperative education in Thailand; and Michael Samano described his doctoral work on faculty workload issues.

Second readings on board policies on global board-president relationship, delegation to the president, and contractual authority, passed unanimously. First-reading reviews were held on board policies on borrowing, purchasing procedure, and monitoring president's performance.

A proposal to adopt the Talloires Declaration on sustainability was tabled. Concerns included how to define sustainability, cost to the college, and how to interpret some of the declaration's language. President Mary Spilde noted that Lane is a leader in sustainability, and is ahead of other colleges. Staff will return with more background information to address board questions.

In other action, the board unanimously approved president's goals for 2005/06.

The board reviewed a report on one-time investments for fiscal year 2004/05, and benchmark reports on unduplicated student headcount and student FTE by reimbursement category.

The next regular meeting will be November 9. The meeting adjourned at 8:23 p.m. Submitted by Joan Aschim, Marketing and Public Relations.
