# HAVE FUN AND LEARN SPANISH WHILE WATCHING TELENOVELAS

The Library has just received 10 telenovelas. Telenovelas are Spanish language soap operas not only immensely popular in Spanish speaking countries, but in Hispanic communities in the United States, Russia, Eastern Europe, France, Malaysia, Singapore, China, the Philippines, and Japan. The most famous telenovelas have come from Mexico, Brazil, Colombia, and Venezuela. Unlike American soap operas which often last for decades, telenovelas usually span four to eight months. Common themes include class structure, family, legitimacy, privilege and power, good and evil, honor and deception, and integrity and betrayal. Religion plays heavily in many telenovelas as does the supernatural. Characters are usually easily categorized as either very good or very bad. If you would like to learn or improve your Spanish, telenovelas are instrumental in comprehension. Research shows that beginning language learners are best served when they attend to meaning over form. Since soap opera themes are recognizable, viewers can comprehend the story line without having a good grasp of the language. Over the course of the telenovela, comprehension improves and language acquisition begins to take place. Further, telenovelas offer "authentic language" or how the language is used in the real world thereby aiding the learner to comprehend and

JIM GARCIA NAMED INTERIM COORDINATOR OF CHICANO/LATINO PROGRAM Jim Garcia, diversity coordinator at Lane since October 2000, has been named interim Chicano/Latino student program coordinator, effective November 1. The appointment creates a new focus on Chicano/Latino student recruitment and retention at Lane. Garcia's community leadership and recognition is expected to facilitate student recruitment, advance the college's diversity goals, and improve service to the community's growing Chicano/Latino population.

Garcia also will absorb some responsibilities of outgoing Multicultural Center director Connie Mesquita, who is retiring after 26 years at Lane. Mesquita is credited with developing many services at Lane to meet the educational needs of the Chicano/Latino community.

Garcia is well known and highly respected for his work in diversity, equity and human rights, says Barbara Delansky, director of Student Life and Leadership Development. With more than 20 years of service to the local and state Chicano/Latino community, he has received numerous awards, most recently the 2005 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Leadership Award from the City of Eugene Human Rights Program. He earned a bachelor of science degree in history from the University of Oregon in 1977. His extensive teaching and administrative experience includes former positions at the University of Oregon, Oregon State University, Portland State University, Chemeketa Community College, and New Mexico State University. He co-founded the Latino Rites of Passage Program, known as Puertas Abiertas, at Lane. A singer and musician,

Garcia performs at many events. He is a second-generation Mexican American from Corona, California.

"The Chicano/Latino student program coordinator position aligns with the college diversity plan, core values and strategic directions, and the temporary appointment is consistent with employee contracts," says Delansky, "and will allow us to continue to meet student and community needs while we move forward with the good work done by Connie Mesquita and the other staff in providing services and programs." A national search will be conducted for a permanent hire and is expected to conclude sometime winter term. The diversity coordinator vacancy created by the transition will be filled on an interim basis by internal appointment.

# NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE DAY

Today's Native American Word for the Day is "KUN-ta," which in Lakota (Sioux) means "plum." It is pronounced with the stress on the first syllable, "KUN" which rhymes with "bun." This first syllable is also nasalyzed when spoken. If you add the word for "black," yielding "KUN-ta SA-pa," you have the word for a prune! "KUN-ta-sha" is "the moon when the plums are red" and that means "August."

Another derivative is "kun-SOO" (where the stress moves to the second syllable), and this means "plum seeds" or "plum stones." Since folks played games involving throwing plum seeds around, this distributive action became the deciding factor when the Lakota needed to come up with an indigenous word for "playing cards"--it is the same word as "plum seeds," or "kan-SOO." By extension, it can now also be used for any card or ticket as well! Dr. Don Addison, Native American languages instructor at Lane and the University of Oregon, 344-4758.

#### NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE DAY

The Native American Word for the Day is "Kloshe" which is the Chinuk Wawa word for "good." Chinuk Wawa is the language that was used at one time, all up and down the coast as a kind of a "lingua franca" or trade language that many people of many different language-speaking tribes and non-Indians could use with which to converse. It is the language which will first be offered at Lane next term as AIL 101 and is composed of words from a number of different languages, including French and English. The adjective "Kloshe" (good) does not inflect for the comparative degree, such as adding "-er" as we do with many words in English: such as "fine" and "finer." The comparative of "Kloshe" is "Elip kloshe" meaning "better." To say "better than all" or "the best," (what is called the superlative degree), you must add "kopa konaway" meaning "better than all" after the "Elip kloshe" resulting in the long four-word expression ""Elip kloshe kopa konaway" which means "the best." - Dr. Don Addison, Native American language instructor at LCC and the UO, 344-4758

#### TOM ROHR CERAMICS AND ANNA LOGUE SCULPTURES ON EXHIBIT

The Art Department Gallery is proud to present ceramic works by Tom Rohr and sculptures by Anna Logue from November 14 to December 5. An artists' lecture will be given Thursday, November 17, at 2:30 p.m., followed by a reception including hors d'oeuvres. Admission is free.

Rohr views his ceramic pots as figures; alive when held in human hands, anticipatory yet patient in repose and sometimes acting differently when in groups. Anna Louge's sculptures are physical manifestations of spirit and vitality, a metaphor for the interior space enveloped by the pots. Louge's pieces are made from the debris of the ceramic process, entering the studio at the end of Rohr's process, recycling the scraps and extra parts that remain. The exhibition work has been punctuated by two natural disasters, beginning with the day the tsunami hit Southeast Asia and finishing the day Katrina hit New Orleans. While not the original intent of the work, both artists have chosen to display in a way as to address these events, most specifically to examine the role of chance as it relates to our relationship with nature.

# **BOARD REPORT**

The 2006-07 budget development process, principles and criteria, data elements, assumptions, and budget projections were approved by 7-0 vote at the Lane Community College Board of Education November 9 meeting. The board favored short-term, one-time reductions with room for some new initiatives, rather than recurring reductions or tuition increases, by a vote of 5 in favor, 1 opposed (Paul Holman), and 1 abstention (Jay Bozievich). In a work session preceding the meeting, the board was supportive of increasing marketing initiatives to boost enrollment. Current projections show a \$1.6 million deficit in 2006/07. In other action, the board adopted the Talloires Declaration of sustainability by 5-2 vote, with Bozevich and Holman dissenting, after long discussion.

The board approved an inter-fund bridge loan of \$200,000 to KLCC, 7-0, to help the station exercise its purchase option on a new building in downtown Eugene while awaiting fulfillment of fundraising pledges.

The board approved the consent agenda 7-0, including a bidding exemption for Banner software post-implementation assessment from SunGard SCR, not to exceed \$88,000.

The board held second readings of its policies on borrowing, purchasing procedure, and monitoring president's performance, and approved them 7-0, and held a first reading of its policy on personnel services.

Reports were reviewed on the quarterly financial report, grants and contracts by funding source, and progress on the 30th and Gonyea interchange safety review.

The meeting adjourned at 9:06 p.m. The next regular meeting is set for Wednesday, December 14. Submitted by Joan Aschim, public information officer, Marketing and Public Relations.

# LANE FORMS PARTNERSHIP WITH ENERGY STAR

Lane Community College has joined a nationwide effort to eliminate energy waste through the voluntary implementation of improved energy management practices and technologies in a partnership with ENERGY STAR, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's voluntary program that promotes energy efficient solutions to help save money while protecting the environment. In 2004 alone, ENERGY STAR partners saved enough energy to power 24 million homes and avoid greenhouse gas emissions equivalent to those from 20 million cars, all while saving \$10 billion. Lane is the second college in Oregon to partner with ENERGY STAR.

Marie Matsen, vice president for college operations, believes in the efforts Lane makes to conserve energy benefit the natural environment while strengthening the college's bottom line. "Investing in energy conservation and reducing Lane's use of non-renewable energy sources is a very important component of our long-term financial plan and the core of our overall sustainability efforts. We want Lane to be a shining example of good stewardship of public resources, both environmental and financial," she says. As an ENERGY STAR partner, Lane has committed to monitor and measure its energy performance and to promote increased energy efficiency at its Florence, Cottage Grove and Eugene locations.

Formed in 2004, Lane's Sustainability Department includes three full time staff as well as part-time staff and student workers. #### NATIVE AMERICAN WORD FOR THE DAY

Today's Native American Word for the Day is "la-MET-sin," which is Chinuk Wawa for "medicine." The second syllable is stressed, hence the capital letters. Obviously it is a "loan word" from French and the definite article "la" (marking the feminine case) is retained. However, "la-MET-sin" has no connotation of what is pejoratively expressed as "magic," nor does it have any supernatural overtones. The latter is "ta-MA-na-wis" in Chinuk and refers to what was described by early European settlers in the Oregon territory as "Medicine Men" or "Indian conjurers," who the Europeans saw as quacks. The lexical item "la-MET-sin" illustrates a Native attempt to capture the concept of Western man's medicines with all its pills, shots, salves, and medical procedures, which quickly supplanted many natural tribal medical practices in Oregon.

Chinuk Wawa is the trade language that once facilitated trade and travel among Indians and non-Indians all along the Northwestern coast. Chinuk words come from a wide variety of Native languages, English and French. To call it "jargon" is considered by many to be denigrating.

All language hybrids, pigeons or Creoles have their supporters and those who consider them "unauthentic." No one can deny that languages never stay the same-no matter how hard we try to force them into that mold! Those interested in learning more about Chinuk Wawa will want to enroll next term in Lane's first class in Chinuk, listed under American Indian Languages 101. #### PUBLIC HEARINGS SET FOR PROPOSED INTERCHANGE AT I-5 AND FRANKLIN

The Oregon Department of Transportation will host three public open houses in early December to discuss the possibility of a new interchange at I-5 and Franklin Boulevard in Eugene and Springfield. The open houses are a part of a concept-level planning study undertaken by ODOT in response to local interest in building a new interchange at this location. The study is intended to help stakeholders understand the potential costs and benefits that would be involved in funding and building a new interchange and help them determine whether a new interchange should become a regional transportation priority.

The open houses will provide interested parties with the results of preliminary analysis on a potential interchange, to ask questions of ODOT, its consultant team and local agency staff, and to indicate to elected officials, through comment cards, whether a new interchange should become a regional priority.

Following the open houses, Eugene, Springfield and Lane County elected officials will be asked to give a new interchange a preliminary "thumbs up" or "thumbs down." If "thumbs up," the next step would be to initiate a process to include an interchange project in regional and local transportation system plans. It is particularly important that the book be of a length that reasonably allows it to be incorporated into existing classes. A book that lends itself to being used in parts, such as last year's Reading Together book, "A Larger Memory," by Ronald Takaki, and this year's book of poetry, "Blessing the Boats" by Lucille Clifton, will also meet this criteria.

#### Q. HOW DO I KNOW IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED DUE TO WEATHER?

- \* When bad weather strikes, tune in radio or television news to find out if there are any closures or delays for Lane Community College. When the decision is made to close the college, the college notifies KLCC 89.7 FM and other news media. Stations make announcements as soon as they receive information. Do not call the media directly -- this interferes with their ability to bring you the most current information.
- \* Closure announcements are posted to Lane's home page at <a href="https://www.lanecc.edu">www.lanecc.edu</a> and when possible, to the local school closure web site at <a href="https://www.valleyinfo.net">www.valleyinfo.net</a>.
- \* When possible, a message is sent to employees via all staff e-mail or voice-mail.

- Q. WHAT IF I AM HEARING IMPAIRED?
- \* Hearing impaired people should watch TV news broadcasts or check the Lane Community College website at www.lanecc.edu.
- Q. WHAT ABOUT COLLEGE LEARNING CENTERS AT HIGH SCHOOLS?
- \* The college's Community Learning Centers at high schools follow the host high school's closure schedule.
- Q. WHEN WILL WE KNOW THAT THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED?
- \* Weather closures or delays can be announced at any time as conditions worsen; however, every effort is made to report early morning closure/delay information by 6 a.m., and evening closure information by 3 p.m. Evening classes are those that begin at or after 5 p.m. Because conditions can improve during the day, sometimes the college will close during the day but will open for evening classes, so it is important to stay tuned to the media.

#### O. WHAT DO DELAYS MEAN?

\* If the opening of classes is delayed, students and faculty should report to the class or lab they would normally have been attending at the new starting time, if at least 50 minutes of class/lab time remains. For example, if opening is delayed to 10 a.m., classes and labs that normally begin at 10 a.m. or are already in session at 10 a.m. would meet, but only if the normal ending time for that class or lab is 10:50 a.m. or later. The remainder of the day would continue on the regular schedule.

## Q. IF THE COLLEGE IS CLOSED, SHOULD STAFF REPORT FOR WORK?

\* When the college or a college center is closed, classes and activities at the facility are canceled and staff who work there should not report for work or come to the work site, unless they receive specific instructions otherwise from their supervisor or hear such instructions in the news announcements. If one or more facilities are closed and

others are open, staff who work at the open facilities should report to work as usual.

### Q. ARE THERE TRANSPORTATION ALTERNATIVES?

\* When 30th Avenue is icy, some people drive in from the east via Franklin, or ride the bus. In general, LTD operates buses to Lane when the college is open; however, drivers may choose alternate routes. An LTD route change does not necessarily indicate a college closure.

## Q. WILL STAFF GET PAID?

#### LANE TO SIGN INTERNATIONAL DECLARATION FOR SUSTAINABILITY

Lane Community College will become part of a worldwide effort for a sustainable future when President Mary Spilde signs the Talloires (pronounced "tal-whar") Declaration on Wednesday, December 7, in a signing ceremony from 2:30-3 p.m. in the lobby of the Center for Meeting and Learning, Building 19.

The declaration is a 10-point action plan for teaching and operating in ways that help achieve environmental literacy and sustainability. It was created in October 1990 when 22 presidents, rectors and vice chancellors of colleges and universities from all over the world convened in Talloires, France to voice their concerns about the state of the world and create a document that spelled out key actions colleges and universities must take to create a sustainable future. More than 300 colleges and universities have

signed the declaration. Lane will be the second institution of higher education in Oregon (following Lewis and Clark College) and the first community college in Oregon to sign the document.

In signing the declaration, Lane pledges to: 1) increase awareness of environmentally sustainable development; 2) create an institutional culture of sustainability; 3) teach environmentally responsible citizenship; 4) foster environmental literacy; 5) practice institutional ecology; 6) involve all stakeholders; 7) collaborate for interdisciplinary approaches; 8) enhance the capacity of primary and secondary schools; 9) broaden service and outreach nationally and internationally; and 10) maintain the movement.

As part of Lane's commitment to "greening" higher education, the college began purchasing 10 percent wind power from EWEB in November 2005. Lane is EWEB's largest wind power customer. Other steps that the college has taken: hosting the second annual Oregon Bioneers Conference in October; offering more than 30 courses that address sustainability issues; supporting a student project to make and use biodiesel on campus; collaborating with the Mayor's Roundtable on Public Education for Sustainability; and operating an award-winning recycling program that recycled over 55 percent of the college's waste in 2004/05.
