JAZZ FESTIVAL ARTISTS HAIL FROM NEW YORK CITY, PORTLAND AND EUGENE

The Second Annual Oregon Jazz Festival on Saturday, January 21, will draw more than 30 middle school, high school and college jazz ensembles from Oregon and Washington to participate in the all-day festival at the University of Oregon Beall Hall and the Lane Community College Performing Arts Building 6. The festival includes a jazz quintet concert featuring guest artists from New York City, Portland and Eugene. This concert, at 7:30 p.m. in the LCC Performance Hall, has limited tickets available to the public for \$18 adults, and \$12 students. Steve Owen (UO) and Ron Bertucci (LCC), producers of the festival, joined forces for the first time last year to produce a very successful first Oregon Jazz Festival with over 25 participating schools and a sold-out evening concert. RECORD NUMBER OF USERS LOGIN TO EXPRESSLANE

ExpressLane, the college's online registration and web services system, served a record number of students on Monday, the first day of classes for winter term. The system served 6,001 individuals, a figure that surpasses ExpressLane's highest single-day usage of 5,800 first-day users in fall term 2005. Now, compare Monday's figure with Lane's long-term raw average of 1,300 users per single day.

"Previous experience tells us that we probably had about 9,600 logins if you count every login," says Associate Vice President for Information Technology Stephen Pruch, noting that some people used the service more than once. There were no system glitches. Over the weekend, ExpressLane served 1,200 visitors on Saturday, and more than 3,000 on Sunday. "We are serving lots of students, even when the college is closed," says Pruch. "Our data suggests that self-service usage continues to increase."

Pruch is grateful to Lane's hard-working staff, some of whom postponed other work to ensure priority student service.

The peak day for ExpressLane usage is always the first day of the term, says Pruch. "The peak is behind us ... until April 3." Submitted by Joan Aschim.
