EARLY WARNING AND INTERVENTION SYSTEMS

Early warning and intervention systems identify students who are having academic or personal problems before they begin to fail and respond with customized plans for addressing each student's unique needs. There are two important goals of an early alert and intervention system. First, in advance of their enrollment, a goal is to identify high-risk or dropout-prone students who could benefit from assistance. Second, a goal is to identify enrolled students as they begin to experience academic or personal problems that may be reduced through services provided by the college.

Some critical components to an effective early alert and intervention system include: utilization of placement text scores, assessment of academic risk factors, assessment of social and psychological risk factors, tracking GPA, tracking course completion rates, tracking attendance, and tracking mid-term grades. Once students having problems are identified, they can be referred to appropriate services before they fail.

We encourage instructors to find a time to talk to their students about academic support resources available to students including tutor central, the Math and Science resource centers, and the Advising/Counseling Center. Place a dab on a piece of cardboard where the ants travel. Once they discover it, allow them a few hours to carry the material back to their nest. Ants no more.``

SUPPLEMENTAL INSTRUCTION IS A BEST PRACTICE

Supplemental Instruction (SI): A Best Practice for Student Success brought to you by SAGA (Success and Goal Attainment committee): This week's featured best practice is Supplemental Instruction (SI)*, which links targeted, high-risk courses to an academic assistance program that utilizes regularly scheduled instructor, peer, or tutorled study sessions or discussion groups. The purpose of SI is to improve success and retention, thus reducing attrition in historically difficult or gatekeeper classes. The SI leaders may attend the targeted courses, and then work with students in smaller groups to integrate the course content and to develop learning strategies.

A new subcommittee of SAGA is working to implement Supplemental Instruction systemically at Lane. Although there is not yet a collegewide SI program, there are services in place that reflect parts of this model: content specific study skills, charlas and visites (interactive labs in Spanish and French), pilot projects in the culinary and music programs, informal study groups in science and CIT, and the women's transition to success programs required discussion groups. In addition, the SI committee has received funding through the Strategic Learning Initiative (SLI) to develop two pilot projects this term. *SI, which is a proven strategy for improving course retention and student success, was created at the University of Missouri-Kansas City (UMKC) in 1973. This practice has been named an Exemplary Educational Program by the U.S. Department of Education. UMKC continues to use supplemental instruction in many of its gatekeeper courses, and faculty and staff from hundreds of institutions around the world have implemented their own SI programs.

LEARNING COMMUNITIES OFFER CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT FUNDS

For the past two years, Lane faculty and staff have been developing a First Year Experience program for new credit students. First year experiences provide a welcoming and supportive academic and social climate by combining Learning Communities with advising, mentoring and other support services. First year experiences are one of the six best practices for success and retention. This year, the goal of the Learning Communities Leadership Team is to offer learning communities options to first-year students for a full academic year in 2006-07. To develop this program, we are providing curriculum development support for winter term 2007 Learning Communities that fulfill freshman-level AAOT and other degree requirements. (This would complete the structure of the first year.)

We invite applications from faculty who are interested in developing a first year Learning Community for winter 2007. We want to encourage first-year students to fulfill their requirements in general education, distribution areas and/or the ethnic, gender and cultural diversity early on in their program. BOARD REPORT FOR APRIL

Budget proposals for 2006/07 were presented to the Board of Education at its April 12 meeting (see http://www.lanecc.edu/budget/0607/index.htm). President Mary Spilde said the proposal process had been excruciatingly painful and emphasized that "behind every reduction is a face." Proposals go to the Budget Committee next (see meeting schedule under EVENTS heading below).

In statements, student Sandin Riddle advocated for a longhouse fee, and student Happy Mathews advocated for an ASLCC fee, both for the student ballot in May.

In action, the board approved the student fee ballot requests; awarded a contract for marketing services to Funk/Levis Associates; and approved its policy on expanded options.

In reviews, the board considered ballot language for the local option levy in November and agreed to state a total dollar amount of \$1.37 million rather than a rate, and to ask for a five-year term. They also reviewed a benchmark report on employees by color as a percent of all employees, and held a first-reading review of board policy on conflict of interest. WASTE AUDIT RESULTS

On Thursday, April 20 Lane Recycling and six volunteers from Lane County Master Recyclers and OSPIRG sorted about 500 pounds of the college's trash that was headed to the landfill. The breakdown included: paper 10.8 percent, glass 4.18 percent, metal 4.42 percent, plastic 5.42 percent, food waste (postconsumer) 28.75 percent, paper towels and napkins 11.55 percent, disposable paper cups 10.07 percent, disposable plates and utensils 4.67 percent, clear plastic bags and wrap 5.41 percent. Actual waste was 14.74 percent. What does this tell us? That a lot of the trash we send to the landfill is avoidable, like paper cups (bring your own!) and disposable plates (the cafeteria has reusable plates) and that Lane does a great job recycling metal, plastic, glass, and paper.
