

LCC Begins A

How did all this happen?

It's been only a little over a year since Lane Community College grew from a mere idea into a full-fledged institution of higher learning.

First there were committee meetings, studies by educators and planners. Then came the formation of the college district by a vote of the people. The district covers all of Lane and parts of Benton, Linn and Douglas counties, an area with a growing population of over 200,000 people. It is controlled by a seven member Board of Directors. The President is Dr. Dale Parnell.

Actual fiscal operation began July 1, 1965, an important date in LCC history. On that day a dedication ceremony was held on the Eugene campus at which time the Eugene Technical Vocational School became a part of the new college. On that day the twelve month personnel reported for duty and from then on counselors were on hand to talk to prospective students.

On September 20, 1965, students began registering for fall classes and the term officially opened on





the 27th. On its opening day LCC was already the second largest community college in the state of Oregon.

By October Lane had about 1400 day students and 2600 evening enrollees. Besides the Eugene and Springfield campuses, there were classrooms at some fifteen locations throughout the district.

A red-letter day was March 17, 1965, when Mr. Wilfred Gonyea, prominent Eugene citizen, donated a 100-acre tract of land south of Eugene on the interstate 5 freeway to the college for a future campus. A short time later the district added 50 more acres adjoining that property. Balzhiser Seder and Rhodes, local architects, are planning the initial phase of the new campus for which an enrollment limit of 6500 has been set. Present plans call for occupation of the new campus by fall, 1968, and an estimated 3000 students.

During the year an active student body association has been developed at Lane. Three publications - a weekly newsletter, The Titan Round-up, a monthly newspaper, The TORCH, and THE TITAN yearbook have all been started.

From this kaleidoscope of events, the first year students will always remember Lane Community College and be proud that they have been a part of this momentous year.

This publication, the first in the history of LCC, is an attempt on the part of students to depict the people and activities. Congratulations must be extended to those that have labored so diligently to make this a success.








Mobile units used by MDTA classes were constructed on Eugene campus



Both technical and college transfer are offered in this division, which is headed by Mrs. Ruth Thygeson. A course in Salesmanship was included winter term. Accounting and Introduction to Business are the college transfer courses offered. The three basic technical courses are Shorthand, Bockkeeping and Typing.

Toward the end of the year future employers often visit the campus to recruit L.C.C. business education students for immediate employment after graduation. Personnel people from the Seattle Boeing Aircraft Company and others were on the campus this year for several days seeking future employees.

As well-trained business education people are in great demand, the school has little difficulty in placing its graduates.







Headed by Mr. Roger Houglum, manager and chief engineer of Educational Radio Station KRVM, the Electronics Division includes several two-year technical courses.

The Electronic Engineering Technician course prepares students for the important electronics industry. Most electronics graduates are hired by such firms as Boeing Aircraft and the great complex of electronic industries centered in the San Francisco Bay area.

Other offerings in the Electronics Division include the Radio Communications course, which gives basic instruction nec-

essary for entry into the radio broadcasting field.

LCC graduates in radio broadcasting not only find jobs in Oregon but throughout the West Coast area. Many of these have advanced to such key positions as station manager, chief engineer, sales manager and program director.

Radio and Television Repair is another course in the Electronics Division. Graduates of this curriculum are prepared for entry jobs in radio and television repair.

Major and Small Appliance Repair courses are also in this division.



A wide variety of Physical Education courses are listed for both men and women at Lane under the direction of Cecil Hodges, Division Chairman.




The one-year program in practical Nursing which is accredited by the Oregon State Board of Nursing, is included in the Health and Physical Education division. The course prepares students to take the State Board Examinations for licensure in Oregon. Sacred Heart General Hospital cooperates with the college in giving the students the major portion of their clinical practice. Mrs. Ellene Goldsmith is head of this program. With the constantly increasing demand for nursing care, this course fills a vital need in this area.


What is MDTA? This is a frequently asked question by students. This is the answer: It is a program for training unemployed and underemployed workers, which was established by the Manpower Development and Training Act of 1962.

MDTA uses federal funds that are administered at the local level through the combined efforts of the Oregon State Employment Service and Lane Community College.

The purpose of the act is (1) to provide trained personnel for jobs which remain unfilled because too few are trained; (2) to up-date skills of workers whose skills have been out-dated by automation or other economic changes such as foreign competition, relocation of industry or shifts in market demands; (3) to help train the unusually large number of young people who will be entering the work force in the next 10 years.

The following courses are offered: Basic Education, Dental Assistant, Electrical Appliance Repair, Forestry aide, Fry Cook, Gas Engine Repair, General Office Clerk, Sales Person, Stock Clerk, and Clerk Stenographer.

Director of MDTA on the Lane campus is Mr. Robert Marshall. Mr. W. G. Bailey is MDTA counselor.








Students participating in sensitivity experiment






In the Social Science Division the curriculum explains man himself. Each course examines a specific aspect of human existence. 






