

1ST STUDENT DIRECTORY OFF PRESS

LCC's first student directory is off the mimeograph and available to staff and students at main offices on the three major campuses.

One thousand copies were run. "We'll give them to staff and students as long as they last," said Mrs. Pauline Dixon, Bethel counselor, who directed publication of the directory.

The book is 7x8 1/2 inches in size and 56 pages long. It contains 2,188 names of full-time students. Because of problems encountered in assembling the data, "we missed a few," Mrs. Dixon said.

Student names are listed, along with addresses, phone numbers and majors.

Production took "probably thousands" of hours over the past six weeks, Mrs. Dixon said. Major helpers included students Donna Roid and Linda Kasper and secretaries Sharon Shorey, Mary Hood and Delores Herman.

Mrs. Dixon said she volunteered to develop the directory after encountering severe problems in trying to locate students scattered about the college's 47 geographical locations.

BOARD SELLS BLDG. BONDS

Cash--\$6 million of it--will be arriving at LCC in the next four to six weeks to help finance the first of 14 Stage I buildings on the new 30th Avenue campus.

The Board of Education last night (Wednesday) voted to sell bonds in that amount to the United California Bank of Los Angeles at an effective interest rate of 3.88034897. Interest over the 20-year repayment schedule will total \$2,868,742.

United California Bank's interest rate was the lowest of nine bank bids submitted, three from Chicago and New York and two from Oregon. The college's excellent credit rating brought the large number of bidders and the very low interest rate, said Assistant to the President Bert Dotson.

The money is part of a \$9.9 million bond issue (\$3.9 million is yet to be sold) approved by college district voters last September for campus building. It will be combined with serial levy and state and federal funds to meet costs of the \$14 million building program to be completed by September, 1968.

In other business, the Board:

*Hired the Northern Bank Note Co. of Chicago to print the bonds for \$501. That firm's bid was the lowest of four, including three from Chicago and one from Portland.

*Agreed that a groundbreaking ceremony on the new campus should be held in early January.

*Approved the addition of four new courses to the curriculum: forestry aide, appliance service, home health aide, and a P.E. course in skiing. "We probably won't be able to offer skiing right away," said Dotson.

*Approved preliminary architectural plans for four 30th Avenue campus buildings: health technology, physical education, forum and learning resource-student center.

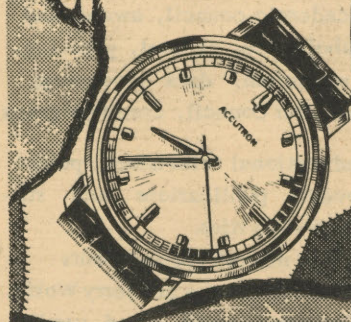

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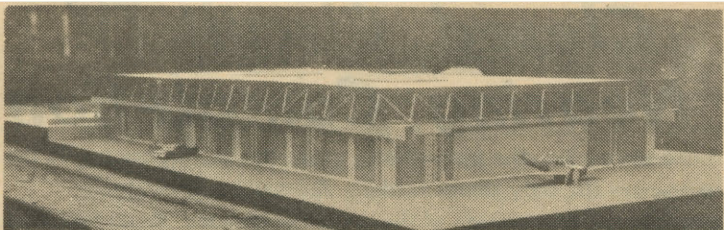
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Air Technology Building

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Body Mechanics Not For M. Mouse

One girls' body mechanics class is practicing arm throwing techniques by batting (pardon the pun) birdies back and forth across the gym. AV MEDIA EXTENSIVE

Instructional audio-visual media has been recommended for installment on the new campus.

These aids are to improve instruction, meet individual study needs of students, and extend and implement the broad and diversified talents of the instructional staff, a college spokesman said.

FM radios and UHF open circuit tv will be used in the training of students. Audio and video study carrels will be provided for students study, review of lectures, demonstrations, films and tapes. A language laboratory is planned for foreign languages and speech study. Dictation laboratories will be equipped with consoles for listening.

Self-contained television units might be used for classroom closeups. Closed circuit cables

would allow films to be shown and programs for video taping for mass group receiving. Audio-visual equipment could be used in conjunction with repair service.

Computers would also be used for instructional purposes and information retrieval. Data processing tab operations would be used for the administration, business office, student records, and inventory. This could be combined with data processing training programs, it was explained.

Automated lecterns, telephone inter-campus communications, public address systems, and counselor closed circuit tv systems are also in the recommendation plans for additional instructional media. --Tom Black

Closed Circuit TV Nearing Completion

"Monitors for the individual rooms are the only things holding up the completion of the closed circuit tv system," said

Jim Brock, instructor in the Electronics Division.

"There are about two weeks work left and then we will have the system in complete operation," he said. "That means we will be ready for any desired programing for the Winter Term."

"We are working now to rebuild some old TV sets, converting them into monitors for use until the ones on order arrive. These have been on order for quite some time and there has been no indication as to when they will arrive."

With thirty minutes notice a program can be sent from the studio to any classroom on the Eugene campus, Brock said.

The local TV stations, KVAL-TV (Channel 13) and KEZI-TV (Channel 9) have donated equipment to LCC, some of which has been much appreciated, Brock said.

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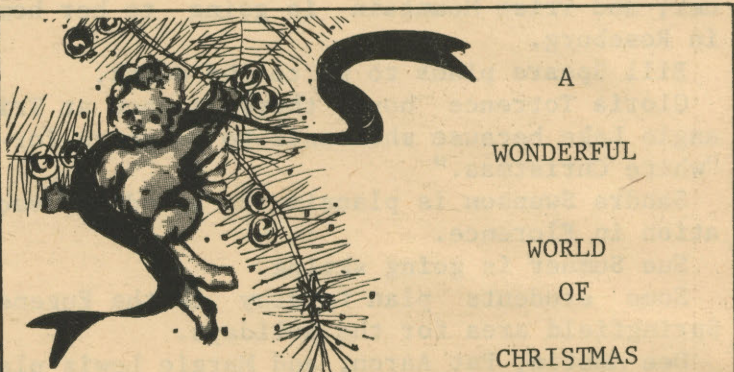
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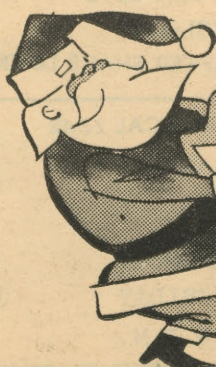
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WINTER TERM TIME SCHEDULE

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES - NEW STUDENTS - WINTER TERM

- At the registrar's office get an admission requirement clearance card which serves as a permit to register.
- Show this card to registration materials desk. Pick up needed registration materials which include:
 - Feed and counseling
 - Personal data card
 - Yellow class schedule
- Fill in each form as completely as possible.
- Meet with counselor to plan class schedule.
- Go to the IBM tub file to secure two IBM class cards for each class scheduled. Please check each card to make sure that the term line number is correct.
- Take these completed materials to the business office. This must be done in order to officially register in class. These include:
 - Completed fee counseling form
 - Completed personal data card
 - Three copies completed class schedule
 - One IBM class card for each class
- You should keep one IBM class card for each class, the back copy of your schedule. These cards are your only admission to class so do not lose them.

REGISTRATION PROCEDURES - RETURNING STUDENTS - WINTER TERM

- Pick up registration packet at registration table on Eugene Campus.
- Check packet to see if it contains:
 - Student IBM header card (identification)
 - Two punched IBM cards for each reserved class
 - A fee card
 - A yellow class schedule
 - Personal data card
- With a counselor, select courses for term and fill in information on yellow class schedule form--include all classes on this schedule--careful to accurately include the term line number. Bring personal data card up to date.
- Go to the IBM tub file and:
 - Pick up two IBM class cards for each added class. Check to make sure your term line number on each card is correct for the class you wish to enroll in.
- Proceed to the business office and turn in:
 - Your IBM header card
 - One IBM class card for each class
 - The IBM fee card
 - Three copies of the completed class schedule
 - Personal data card
 - This must be done the same day--do not take these cards out of the building.
 - These cards must be turned in to the business office to officially register you in classes. Either pay your fees or make arrangements to pay at this time.
 - Retain the back copy of the schedule and an IBM class card for each class. These class cards will be picked up by the instructor at the first class session. Without this card you will not be permitted to attend.

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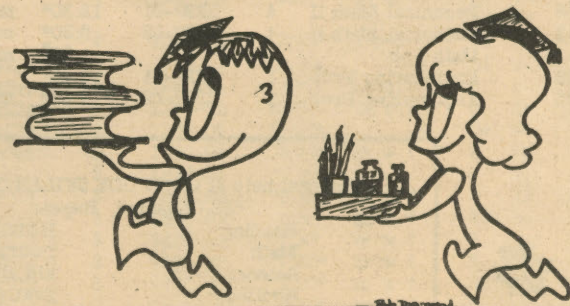

Col. Jenkins, 69, Seeks Third Career As Lawyer

Sixty-nine year old Col. Sidney C. Jenkins is pursuing a third career and picking up the threads of a neglected education as he studies a pre-law course on the Springfield campus of LCC. He is a freshman and started school last summer term.

Born at Olympia, Wash., in 1897, Jenkins was raised in Bellingham and Seattle until the age of 14 when, after having

flunked out of high school, he joined the U. S. Revenue Cutter Service and went to sea. The R. C. S. was part of the Treasury Dept. but was administered by the Navy. It was the beginning of what is today our U. S. Coast Guard.

In the R. C. S. Jenkins served as an enlisted man on the cutter Tahoma and transferred to the Cutter Unalga from which he landed along with about a

hundred other sailors, and marched southward from San Diego taking part in the Mexican Campaign of 1913.

Early in 1915 he left the R. C. S. and returned home to go back to high school. This time he didn't do so bad at school, but he quit after one year and went to Canada. In Canada he joined the Scottish Highlanders Regiment and went to Belgium in the First World War. Sent home with a nervous disorder, he was discharged and returned to the U. S.

Once again at home, Sidney Jenkins tried to enlist in the Navy but was rejected. A Navy doctor said he was color blind, so he walked across the street and enlisted in the Army. He later learned that the Navy doctor who gave him the test was color blind.

At sea on the way to Europe, when the armistice was signed, in 1918, he returned to Camp Upton, N. J. and was discharged.

These three experiences were the beginning of his military career. In 1918, returning to Canada, he went to work on the Vancouver Daily Province, Vancouver, B. C. as a police-reporter, which was his start in the journalism field. After one year there he came back to the States and worked on the Bellingham Herald, then to The Walla Walla Union where he became City editor. Next came a move to Oregon and a job on the Dalles Chronicle.

While in The Dalles, he met the girl he was to marry, Miss Blanche Zachary, whom he had to convince that the tales he told of his time at sea were true before she would consent to become Mrs. Jenkins. Since that time Mrs. Jenkins has lived with him through many experiences which are just as vivid and would have been just as unbelievable to her as his sea stories in 1924.

In that year Jenkins was invited to come to Eugene to work on the Morning Register, which was published in the basement of an old saloon on Willamette Street. He worked there until 1926 when he went to the Eugene Daily Guard.

While working on the Guard, Jenkins was still in the Navy Reserve and was First Sergeant

of his company. He 1926 he was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Army. For this promotion he took a trip to Portland where a board of three officers was convened. There were two reserve officers and one regular army officer, and as Col. Jenkins said, "I was asked only one question, 'Who is going to win the world series?' My answer was, 'The Yanks,' to which the regular army officer replied, 'You are now a Second Lieutenant in the Army of the United States.'"

Moving again in 1927, he went to Portland where he worked on the Telegram and The Oregonian. Leaving there in 1933 he returned to the Army and stayed until 1937 when he got out and went to work for Weyerhaeuser Co. at Lewiston, Ida. He was a public relations man for them until 1941.

On Dec. 7, 1947 Lt. Jenkins applied for reinstatement in the Army and was sent to a refresher school. After the school he made a flight to Casa Blanca in North Africa and returned with a group of German POW's to Fort Custer, Mich.

A period of study followed for the Lieutenant. He went to the University of Virginia and studied the area and customs of the Japanese and then to Yale University where he studied and learned the Japanese language. After his studies were completed, he was sent to the Far East in Oct. of 1944.

Two beachhead landings under fire and having only one ship shot from under him were among his experiences. He served

on General MacArthur's staff in the civil affairs section in New Guinea and then went to the Philippines. After some time in the Philippines he was sent to Korea and finally returned home in 1947. This was three and one half years since he had seen his wife and their son, who had returned to Eugene to live while he was overseas.

A three-year tour of duty as an inspector general on Governors Island in New York Harbor followed. In 1950 he was sent back to the Orient as the commanding officer on the Okinawa military government team.

Here Col. Jenkins wrote the initial proclamation which established the government of the Ryuku Islands, which is governed today by an American civil administrator.

Col. Jenkins returned to the states in 1953, after his son was killed in action in Korea. Subsequently he made another tour of duty in Korea and was retired after that tour on June 30, 1957 at the Presidio of San Francisco, with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and 34 years of service credit.

Since retirement Col. Jenkins has lived in Eugene with his wife. The nine years that they have been here is the longest period Jenkins has resided in one place in his life. Their home in the northwest section of Eugene, off River Road, is in a quiet, very pleasant, residential area on Escalante Street.

Last Year Col. Jenkins took the GED test at LCC and got his equivalency certificate for a high school diploma. It ended 54 years without any formal education except his Japanese studies in the Army.

Col. Jenkins concluded, "I have always wanted an education but there were too many wars and police actions in between. So now I am trying to complete my education. If I make it through and get a law degree, I will be pretty close to 77."

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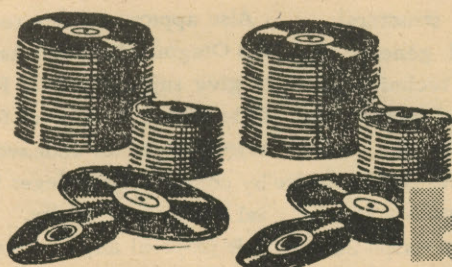

Fire Drills Not Good

"The Nov. 22 fire drills were not very good," said William Cox, dean of business services.

The Eugene campus was cleared in 45 seconds, except for the dental assistant class which did not hear the fire bells. The best was the Bethel campus which was cleared in 50 seconds in a satisfactory and orderly manner. Springfield campus was very poor, Cox said. It took two minutes and 45 seconds to clear the building and it appeared that no one knew what he was doing, he said.

The following instructions are posted on all the campuses and there should be no reason for

not knowing what to do in case of fire or a fire drill, Cox said. The procedures below should be followed:

When a fire is discovered, the person discovering the fire should ring the fire alarm, and notify a school employee, who in turn will phone the fire department and notify the main office. The staff members must see that the students evacuate the building in a safe and orderly manner, and that employees should fight only if it is small and can be extinguished by hand extinguishers.

The evacuation procedures on all the campuses: Students and staff evacuate by the nearest exit. The instructors should see that the students evacuate at least 20 feet from the buildings. The instructors, if at all possible should have available a roll of students in the class and check to see that all are evacuated.

The alarms, in the case of a fire drill, will sound, shut off for one minute, and will then be followed by a short blast for all clear. --Don McMunn

UA Drive Falls Short

LCC's staff reached only the 70 per cent mark in the recent United Appeal drive.

About 25 per cent of the staff contributed, according to the UA chairman Bert Dotson, administrative assistant to the president. A \$10 contribution from only half the staff would have put the college over the \$1,000 goal, he indicated.

Dotson described the campaign result as "not good. Our quota was low to begin with."

The University of Oregon and the Intermediate Education District led the Education Division by topping 100 per cent. LCC trailed Eugene Public schools, parochial and private schools, Bethel Schools, and narrowly edged Northwest Christian College.

Blood Attends DCC Meeting

Industrial Technology Division Chairman Carl Blood attended a meeting of the legislative committee, Department of Community Colleges, Nov. 18 in Portland.

The committee discussed the possibility of promoting legislation to have community colleges covered by the provisions of HB 186. Passed by the last legislature, it provides for establishment of a professional policies committee for public schools to work with local school boards. (LCC presently has this already)

The committee also proposed a fair dismissal act rather than permanent tenure for instructors. This probably would involve a one-year continuing contract, Blood said.

Also approved was a request to the Oregon Education Association to give support to LCC President Dale Parnell's proposal for retroactive credit for endeavor shown by community colleges in initial building programs. Under this proposal any completed construction could receive credit at a future date.

FM LICENSE PENDING

"There has been no indication as to exactly when the license for the FM station will be granted," said Roger Houghlum, chairman of the Electronics Division.

"We are hopeful that it will be soon," he said. "The last word we have is a letter from the office of Benedict Cottone, a Washington, D. C., lawyer retained by LCC to handle the licensing problem."

The letter stated, he said, that they had checked with the Federal Communications Commission and were told that the application had been forwarded with recommendation for approval and that action should be taken shortly.

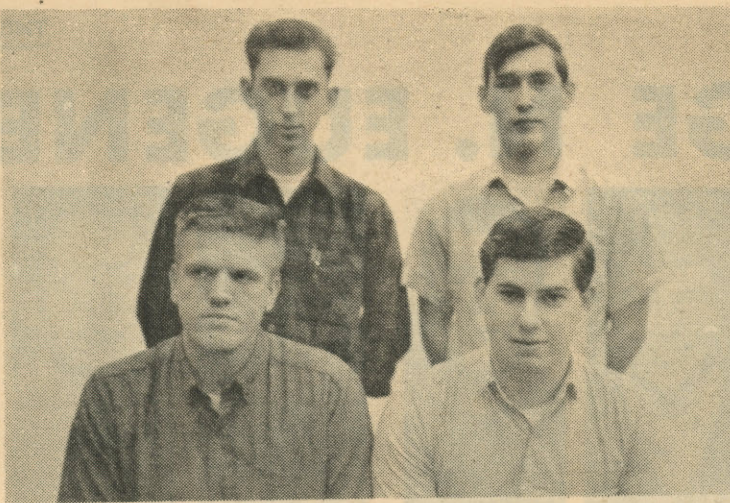

Gymnasium Complex, Lecture Halls Planned

A 3,000-spectator gym and lecture halls seating 150 people are among the facilities being considered for the physical education and forum building on the new 30th Avenue campus.

Architect Al Seder of Balzhiser, Seder and Rhodes described current thinking about the two structure in a planning session in the Eugene campus studio last Friday.

The P.E. building will be part of a two-story complex, with basements which will be built in conjunction with a medical-dental classroom structure. The gym will be divisible in the middle with rolling partitions to make two full-size

basketball floors. A third auxiliary gym is to be in the same building on the basement level.

Though not designed as an auditorium, the main gym will serve as such when the campus is first occupied. A formal auditorium may be added later, it was explained.

There will be a large lobby with ticket and concessions areas. Ping pong, shuffleboard and similar recreation activities probably will be conducted in the lobby to relieve pressure on the nearby student center, Seder said.

On the second floor of the two-building structure will be medical-dental and home arts classrooms and offices for faculty. The basement will include dressing rooms, first aid and therapy rooms, physical education classrooms, weight room and auxiliary gym.

Covered tennis and handball courts are to be built adjacent to the building.

The forum building, which is to be 80 feet north of the student center, will have an L-shaped tv studio on the first floor. There will also be radio booths, storage areas, offices, work rooms and audio-visual storage rooms. The studio will have a 20-foot ceiling with tv controls on a mezzanine.

On the upper floor will be the two 90-seat and two 150-seat lecture halls, plus a number of seminar rooms.

Facilities to receive color tv may be installed in the lecture halls, officials said. It so, this would be the only such installation on campus, because of the cost.

The Board of Education was to review planning for the buildings, along with the student center at its session last night.

SSC Boasts Art Gallery

If it seems that the Study Skills Center is becoming the cultural center of the campus, it is because of the growing collections of paintings currently on loan to the SSC by two local artists.

Mrs. Ellen Hein, wife of the dean of instruction, has created two paintings especially for the SSC. In one scene she pictures the nostalgia of a rural community. The other is a restful boatscape. A third work is completed, but is awaiting the construction of a frame.

Mrs. Jo Fletcher's four works portray the upper McKenzie River, a Montant winter, Lost Lake, and an old Homestead. Mrs. Fletcher became acquainted with the SSC through one of its clients and placed the oils on loan.

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ALL-STARS EDGE N. EUGENE 27-26

Ron Willoughby passed the All-Star football team to a 27-26 come-from-behind victory over league champion North Eugene Saturday. The winning score came with only 10 seconds left in the game.

The contest, which dripped with drama and excitement, was very close throughout and appeared destined to go overtime late in the fourth period. The team captains had even agreed on a sudden death overtime in the event the tie did materialize.

Heroes were a quantity in abundance for both teams. The All-Stars got stalwart performance from Willoughby, Richard Moore, Bob Counts, Nate Bales, and Terry Myers. North Eugene had such stars as Jeff Etchison, Gordon Kaufman, Steve Newell, Mike Pendleton and Jim Hurst.

The All-Stars won the flip of the coin and chose to receive to start the game. After four unsuccessful plays, they had to punt.

North then put together the first sustained drive of the game, reaching the All-Star one yard line. Short, hard passes from quarterback Jeff Etchison provided the bulk of the yardage. An end sweep by Etchison on fourth down fell one yard short of the goal.

The All-Stars again were unable to move the ball and had to punt for the second time. North moved the ball deep into enemy territory once again. This time they scored, however. A 19 yard pass from Etchison to Jim Hurst culminated the drive. Gordy Kaufman threw across field to Jeff Norman for the extra point.

The All-Stars snapped back for their drive of the day after being penalized 15 yards on the kickoff for clipping. They drove from their own 25 yard line to North's 25 before defensive standout Mike Pendleton intercepted a pass in the endzone for a touchback.

North drove to midfield after taking over on the 20 yard line. Then tiny All-Star Nate Bales intercepted an aerial on his own 25 yard line and scooted 45 yards for a touchdown. The Willoughby to Counts pass combination provided the extra point to tie the score 7-7.

North bounced back with a new scoring drive to end the half. The drive was marked by two long gains. The first was a 15 yard run by Etchison and Hurst. Etchison ran 10 yards, then lateralled to Hurst who went the final five yards to pick up an important first down.

The second play was a 30 yard pass from Etchison to Jeff Norman. That play left the ball on the one yard line. From there Etchison again teamed up with Norman for the North score. The PAT was good on a Kaufman to Don Richardson pass. The first half then ended at 14-7 in favor of North.

North Eugene received the second half kickoff; but after three plays Bob Kickner intercepted a pass on the 35 yard line. The All-Stars quickly took advantage of their fortunate break. On the first play, Richard Moore ran 20 yards, then lateralled to Counts who ran 10 more yards to within five yards of paydirt. Then Moore arched a perfect spiral to Rod Myrick for the six points. The PAT was no good.

On the first play after the kickoff, Etchison rolled to his left, couldn't find an open receiver, then took off running down the sidelines. He deftly maneuvered away from the outstretched hands of several All-Star defenders. That made the score 20-13.

A few minutes later a Willoughby to Counts pass play put the ball on the six yard line for the All-Stars. From there Moore ran the remaining distance for the score, after taking a lateral from Willoughby. He dived into the endzone from three yards out. Willoughby threw to Myrick for the extra point that made it 20-20. At that point it looked like a tie was in the making.

After receiving the kickoff, North's offense sputtered and stalled. On the punt Steve Newell was downfield quick to cover. When the All-Star receiver dropped it Newell fell on it for North. Then the All-Star defense again rose to the occasion and shut off North completely. In four plays they moved the ball only one yard.

With time waning Willoughby threw three straight pass completions to set the ball on North's 19 yardline. But another great defensive effort by Pendleton killed the scoring drive.

Then North turned the tables and, with the help of a 15 yard penalty for tackling, drove deep into All-Star territory. But they had to give up possession of the ball on the 25 yard line. Willoughby took charge and again maneuvered his teammates down to North Eugene's 19 yard line. But from there his patented offense blew up. As he dropped back to pass his protection fell apart and he was rushed. In a hurry to get rid of the ball, he threw it into the waiting arms of Newell. With the help of a great block from
