COLLEGE DESPERATE FOR FUNDS

Administrators fall back on time-tested fund raising methods

College administrators raised close to \$150 at a combination bake sale/car wash over spring break. The money will be used to "buy back" class sections eliminated spring term as result of revenue shortfalls from the state, said President Mary Spilde.

"We know the state's financial picture is just going to get worse, so we decided to take things into our own hands."

Spilde, who's homemade shortbread raised \$25 at the week-long event, said the administration set a fund raising goal of \$500,000. Administrators expect the car wash, which only brought in \$25, to pay bigger dividends once the weather warms up.

"We know we've set our sights high," Spilde acknowledged, "But this is just one piece of a larger fund raising strategy."

In a memo sent out earlier this year and obtained by a TORCHED reporter Spilde encouraged college administrators to "establish regular can collection routes on campus and, when possible, in the community."

Assistant to the President, Tracy Simms, said, "We don't want to step on any toes. But we've got to be aggressive if we're going to meet our goal."

Marie Matsen said her staff got a jump start on the fund raising effort by collecting \$3.75 from pay phone and vending machine coin return slots in the cafeteria.

"We draw the line at 'spare changing," said Matsen, "but we're not above scrounging."

In other efforts to relieve the college's budget shortfalls the LCC Board of Education has directed administrators to explore the revenue potential of harvesting and selling plasma. "It's a variation on the blood drive," said board chair Roger Hall. "We know we can't keep raising tuition forever. This is one way for students to give more that doesn't cost them anything."

But others feel the plasma ploy is going too far. "Lane faculty and staff are already the heart and soul of the college, asking them give up their bodily fluids to become it's lifeblood as well is just too much," said an angry instructor who asked to remain anonymous.

Faculty, staff explore 'alternative strategies' in face of pending budget cuts

Mysterious symbols and repetitive phrases are appearing on chalkboards in classrooms on LCC's main campus.

"We're not sure what this is all about, but we're taking it very seriously," said campus public safety officers.

The most common symbol involves a money sign and an axe, officials told TORCHED. Repetitive phrases, which appear to be incantations of some kind have been found scrawled on chalkboards all over campus, and usually include references to Governor Oregon Ted Kulongoski, the state legislature and college administrators involved in the budget setting process.
