

Clinic under stethoscope

College to determine if health clinic should be open to faculty and staff.

Big changes could be coming for LCC's Student Health Center, and student and staff surveys will help school officials make the final decision.

The clinic, which is now dedicated exclusively for student use, may be opening its doors to LCC faculty in the near future. The college's reason for doing so is the rising price for staff health insurance, which is estimated to rise 42 percent over this year's costs, says Mona Arbuckle, Director of the Student Health Clinic.

Approximately half of the health center's current funding comes from an \$8 fee assessed each term to students taking credit classes on the main campus. The other half is derived from the college's general fund.

Acceptance of this proposal to allow equal access to college employees could drastically impact the types and quality of service provided to students, says ASLCC President Rebecca Hill. Hill is concerned about the way in which this proposal was first

ASLCC ELECTIONS

Voters give candidates their D.U.E.

Tony McCown and Shaiku White were named the new ASLCC President and Vice President, respectively, May 19 at approximately 9:20 p.m. with 304 votes out of a total of 773.

Ryan Koch was named new ASLCC Treasurer, nudging out his friend and competitor Adam Davis 341 to 309.

Elizabeth Rosso ran uncontested in her bid for Campus Events & Multicultural Coordinator and received 612 votes.

All six ASLCC Senator candidates were approved by the LCC voters; they are Joseph Bosch, Moriah Demers, Marcia Sexton, Chika Takahashi, Justin Tittlefitz and Krystine Watkins. In addition, two write-in candidates were voted into office — Tom Casey and Sandin Riddle.

"I think everybody ran a

fantastic race," said McCown. "I'm happy with the results. I get to relax now. I'm going to Disneyland."

McCown and White, who ran on the platform of Diversity Unity Excellence, say they plan on being very active over the summer in an effort to acclimate to their new positions before the senate convenes at the beginning of Fall term.

All ballot measures passed with the exception of the \$5 sports fee initiative. It lost by a margin of 9 votes.

The 773 voters amount to approximately 10 percent of the eligible students on campus, according to data presented by ASLCC adviser Barb Delansky.

Both McCown and Koch said that they wish there had been a higher voter turnout, but that they were pleased with the results of the elections and ballot measures.

Rios-Stull ticket disqualified

Presidential candidates Saul Rios and Shana Stull were disqualified by the elections judiciary committee due to alleged campaign violations.

The complaints made against the duo are sealed and confidential, but Stull claimed that the bulk of them involved posters that broke campaign guidelines.

Vice Presidential candidate Harla Olson told Torch reporters that she had also filed a complaint against Stull for a "personal confrontation" between the two. Stull denies this claim.

Rios and Stull have officially appealed the judiciary committee's decision and said they plan to push for a recall, which would require the signatures of 300 eligible students. It is unclear what effect this action will have on the results of the election.

Early Childhood Education program receives \$20,000

Fourteen colleges cooperate for grant money from the Oregon Foundation.

The Lane Community College Early Childhood Education Program will be receiving \$20,000 to give out in scholarships next year. This money is coming from the Earl and Betty Gray Early Childhood Fund which is a part of the Oregon Community Foundation.

Last year administrators at LCC learned of an opportunity to receive scholarship money from the Oregon Community Foundation. Since other community colleges also knew about the possible scholarships, 14 schools

including LCC "decided to apply together as a collaboration with one application rather than competing for funds," said Lane Foundation director Janet Anderson.

The proposal for grant money was written and submitted by Lori Bumgardner Steger, grants coordinator at the Lane Foundation.

All together the schools received a \$750,000 grant, which allows for \$150,000 each year for five years. That money was divided up among the schools depending on the relative size of their early childhood education programs. LCC will get \$20,000 a year.

The money awarded to LCC will be given to 20 students, each receiving a \$1,000 annual scholarship. Scholarships must be applied, or reapplied, for each year. Administrators as well as students hope that these scholarships

will make the Early Childhood Education program more accessible for all students.

In the early Childhood Education Program a one-year certificate is offered as well as a two-year degree program. In the degree program students learn how to work with children from birth to five years of age.

"Hopefully, scholarships like these will make it so all students can afford to get involved in programs like mine," said Early Childhood Education Student Heidi Eisenbeis.

Anderson added, "These scholarships are the stepping-stones to higher education for many qualified Early Childhood Education students who otherwise couldn't afford college."

Torch wins ONPA top honor, 14 individual awards

The LCC student newspaper The Torch walked away with 15 awards at the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association annual Collegiate Day, including first place honors in the general excellence division for community colleges, bi-weekly and monthly college newspapers.

Held last Friday, May 7, in Monmouth at Western Oregon University, some 135 collegiate journalists from 17 colleges and universities gathered to hear keynote presentations, breakout sessions and the awards presentations.

"Being named the best community college newspaper in Oregon was a major goal for The Torch this year," Gabe Bradley, The Torch editor, said. "We've been talking about it since our first meeting last summer."

The Torch won four first place categories, seven second place categories and four honorable mentions.

In addition, Torch columnist John Mackwood was awarded an honorary Best Torch Columnist award for his four years of dedicated service in writing his column, Mackworld.

The Clackamas Print of Clackamas Community College won second place in the general excellence category while

The Advocate of Mt. Hood Community College and The Commuter at Linn-Benton Community College tied for honorable mentions.

The Torch won second place for the best design section and a second place for best section. Under best special section, The Torch won both first and second place. First place went for a section produced on the Titan's sixth place

finish at the NWACCCs and second for a section produced about nationally recognized skateboarder Tony Hawk and friends coming to Springfield, Ore for a featured presentation.

Bradley won a second place in the best writing category for three pieces including one about the Student Health Center to open doors to staff, "Kerry? You've got to be kidding me," "Editor

in chief responds to attack on paper's integrity."

Sarah Ross and Roland Ford nabbed second place for a series they wrote about racial harassment at LCC.

Bradley scored another first place in the best column category for his response to the attack on The Torch's integrity.

Under the best sports category Shawn Miller won a second for a story on Domonique King's take over for the Titans.

First place in the column writing division was won by Travis Roderick for his two columns titled "A head in the sand puts dishonesty ahead in the polls" and "Damned if I do, Bushed if I don't."

Megan Wilson won an honorable mention in best photography for three shots taken for The Torch and another honorable mention in the best spot news category for a dental student working on a low-income student's teeth.

In the feature photo division Sean Hoffman won first place and Sherry Whitmore won an honorable mention in the best sports photo category.

Finally, the last The Torch award went to Sean Hoffman for his second place finish in the college ad of the year category.

brought to the student body's attention and what exactly the changes could mean.

"We don't have any concrete promises that [the health clinic] won't flip over entirely into a staff situation," said Hill. "When I had a meeting with Mary Spilde about this originally, she said that she would be willing to write up a contract or charter basically saying that she would make sure that students would have representation. We haven't been back together on that, so my concern is, leaving office, I'm going to be leaving a new administration that doesn't have the background [on this subject]."

My fear is, five or ten years down the road, that this is going to turn into a staff-student, and eventually mainly staff [clinic]. That's my concern."

The proposed shift in mission would most likely mean a greatly increased number of patients. Planning for a newly remodeled space has therefore already begun, according to Arbuckle. The new clinic would include more space and additional health providers.

With increased patients and increased services come increased costs. In an effort to increase the funding for the new health clinic, several possibilities have been suggested. Staff may be asked to pay on a per-visit basis, or they may have fees assessed from dues paid to their respective employee unions. Other necessary expenses may be covered by a raised student health fee, but a final decision has yet to be made.

Faculty and staff are currently allowed to use the clinic on an emergency basis; depending on the type of emergency they may be asked to pay a \$6 fee. Part time employees of LCC who do not currently qualify for health insurance are

also being considered for future use of the clinic.

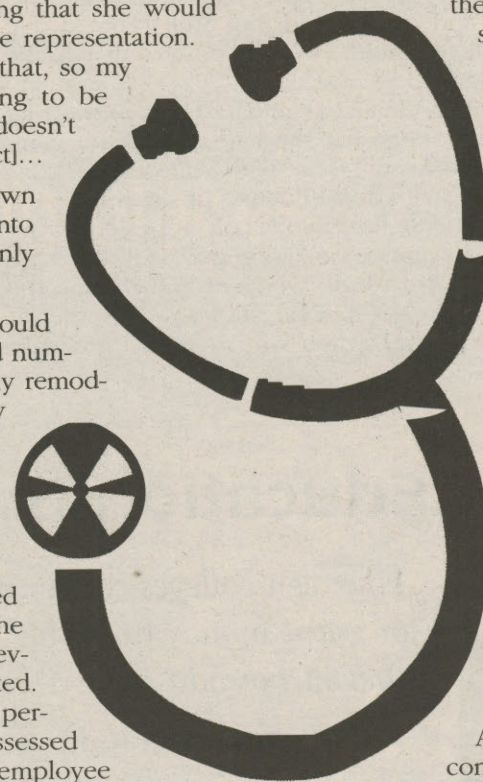
One other change to the current system, should the college decide to allow faculty and staff use of the clinic, involves the limits on who may use the clinic. Currently, only students registered for credit classes and paying the health clinic fee may make use the service. However, there is talk of allowing employee dependants, such as spouses and children, to access the clinic. Should this happen, it may mean that dependants of students would also be eligible to use the clinic.

"The issue of dependant care has come up," said Hill. "They asked on the employee survey, 'if you have dependants, would you be willing to bring them on campus?' Half the students don't have insurance; why are they not asking us if we have dependants?"

In an effort to ascertain potential use of and for the expanded clinic, student health information surveys have been distributed to both faculty and students to decide if the plan is feasible and how it would be funded. Questions include how often the clinic is or would be used by the survey participant, information interests, medical conditions and general policy.

The original deadline for the student surveys was May 1, but that has been extended to May 14 due to low return rates. Although the results of the surveys will be considered, the final decision on the state of the health clinic will be made by the LCC Board of Education.

Surveys can be picked up in the bookstore and the health and PE offices, and returned at the pick up point or in room 212 in Students First. An online version of the survey may soon be released via Express Lane for students; faculty surveys are also being done by email.

What a huge waste

Annual waste audit yields info on exactly how much garbage is generated by the campus each day.

On April 22, LCC recycling coordinator Jennifer Hayward led eight volunteers through 718 pounds of garbage for the college's annual waste audit, designed this year to coincide with Earth Day.

The night before, custodians brought a day's worth of garbage from all over the main campus to Bristow Square where it was sorted from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

With more volunteers this year than in previous years, Hayward was able to sort through a much larger quantity of garbage. The volunteers comprised members of Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group and Master Recycler Volunteers from Lane County.

The results of the audit were relatively consistent over the past four years, with the exception of disposable cups, paper and compost.

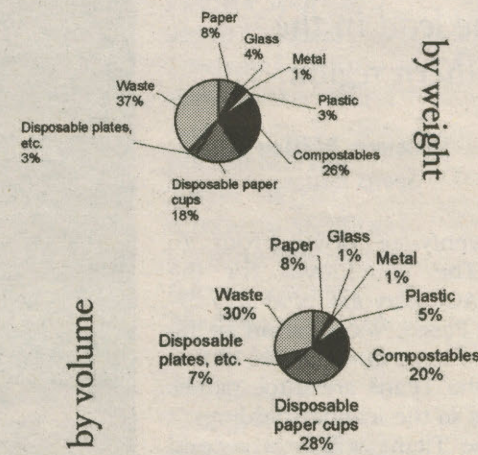
Hayward discovered that disposable cups increased more than 50 percent in volume over last year, while paper decreased in volume by roughly 50 percent. According to Hayward, the difference could be the result of volunteers sorting through a larger quantity of garbage from the cafeteria rather than from campus offices.

While compost decreased nearly 50 percent, Hayward said that steps are being taken to make improvements, including greater utilization of the campus Earth Tub Compostable.

The Earth Tub is just what its name implies: a large tub used for composting. Currently, it is primarily used by campus carpenters for sawdust and by the kitchen and food services for leftover food scraps. Hayward hopes to make it available to the entire campus as soon as possible.

In 2000 and 2001, LCC recycled 85 tons of paper, but threw away approximately 56 tons. According to Hayward, the only landfill in Lane

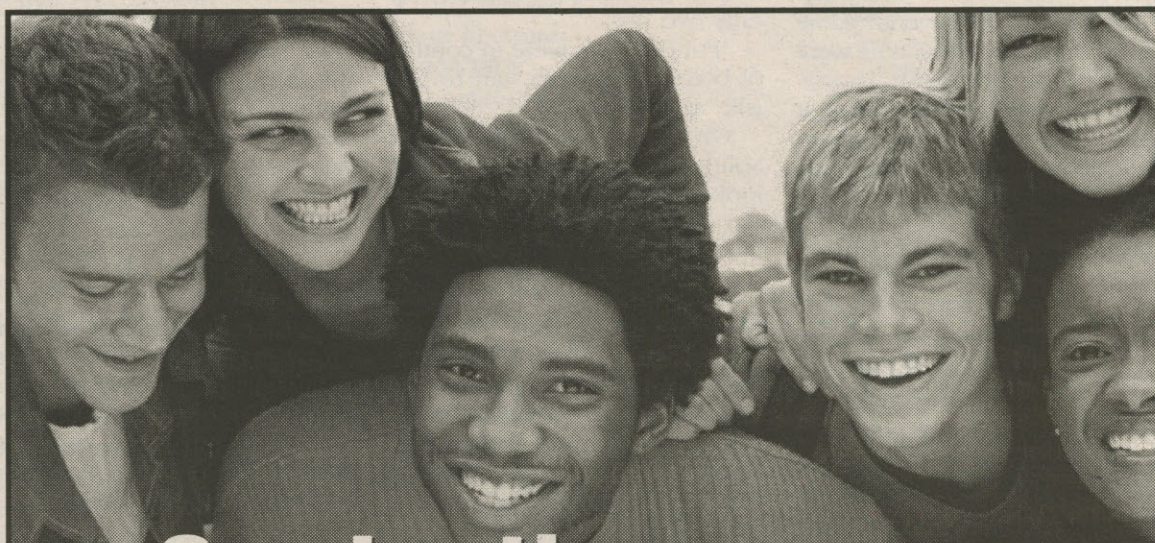
County is expected to be full in 50 years. Once it is closed, other disposal options will have to be considered, such as landfills outside the county. This would increase garbage costs substantially.

For the future, Hayward plans to "work the most on the availability of the compost and try to encourage students to use reusable cups," she said. She also pointed out that the cafeteria gives a 15-cent discount to those who reuse their cups. She is also considering minimizing paper hand towels on campus by switching to cloth. "Our ultimate goal is to reduce garbage by recycling," Hayward said.

Students can help by using reusable mugs as well as the paper and bottle recycling that is already available on campus and also knowing that the compost will be available for the public to use soon.

One ton of paper made completely from recycled scrap saves 7,000 gallons of water, three cubic yards of landfill space, 4,100 kilowatt-hours of energy and 17 trees.

Titans knock around Clackamas, SWOCC

The Titans have won 15 out of 16 games en route to a three game lead in the Southern region.

Twenty-six down, four to go. The countdown for the NWAACC playoffs, held May 27-31 in Pasco, Wash., is on as the league season dwindles down and the Titans are three games ahead in the league standings.

The Titans will host second place Mt. Hood, three games out of the league lead on Saturday, May 16 at 1 p.m. With a split in the double-header, the Titans will capture the league title.

"We're just looking to win one of those games at all costs," said Head Coach Rob Strickland. "Especially the first [game] because it will take pressure off the second game."

The Titans hosted Clackamas on May 8 looking to retain first place and sweep the season series.

LCC jumped out early by scoring four runs in the second inning of the first game. Freshman Mike Bauman pitched six strong innings, giving up only two runs in six innings. Freshman Jordan Boyd entered the game in relief in the seventh inning and earned the save by shutting down the Clackamas offense the rest of the way. Bauman won his seventh game of the season as the Titans were victorious, 4-2.

"This was much different in the way we got ahead early and we were in control of the game," said Strickland. "The

only thing that concerned me was that we didn't score any runs the rest of the game [after the second inning]."

Sophomore Cole Chapman started the second game for the Titans and faced trouble in the first inning. However, the defense came up clutch with a line drive double play and Chapman performed "magnificent" the rest of the game.

Sophomore Sam Kirby hit an RBI single that scored sophomore Donny Bradetich in the third inning and Bradetich hit a sacrifice fly to score freshman Jordan Bousquet in the fourth to give the Titans all the offense they needed in a 2-0 victory. Chapman shut down the Clackamas hitters by allowing only two hits.

"For once we were in control of both games from start to finish," said Strickland.

On May 11, the Titans hosted Southwestern Oregon and looked to expand on "control-

ling" each game from beginning to end.

Sophomore Jared Rascon took the mound for the Titans in the first game and gave up two quick runs in the first inning. The start was a little shaky, but nothing compared to when the Titans batted in the bottom of the inning.

Ouellette led off with a walk, which was followed by several hits, a fielder's choice, a hit by pitch and two walks. By the time SWOCC recorded three outs to end the inning, the Titans managed to score 10 runs. Ouellette, who hit a two-run homer to cap the inning, and Bradetich each scored two runs in the first inning.

"It just started off with a walk and we got five or six hits in a row," said Bradetich, who went 4-4 on the afternoon with three doubles, a triple and three runs. "Baseball is contagious like that."

"It gave me the opportunity

to play some guys who haven't played much all year long," said Strickland.

SWOCC scored a run in the sixth inning, which was answered in the seventh with a Bradetich double followed by freshman Kellen Hobie's two-run homerun. With the score at 12-3 entering the eighth inning, SWOCC used a hit by pitch, an error, several walks and a couple of timely hits to score six runs to close the gap.

Once again, the Titans ended the SWOCC rally by scoring two runs. Kirby hit a single, stole second base and was knocked in when Corbett hit a two-run double which also scored Wright who walked between Kirby and Corbett. The Titans walked away with a 14-9 victory.

Freshman Tyler Brown was given the start in the second game and took full advantage. Brown, who hasn't pitched more than 15 pitches in a game

this season, didn't disappoint by striking out nine batters.

Ouellette led off the bottom of the first inning with a walk. He scored when Kirby laced a single between third base and shortstop to give the Titans their only run scored thru four innings.

"The only thing I was concerned of was we had only strung together a couple of hits," said Strickland.

In the top of the fifth, Brown faced some trouble. After getting the second out, he walked a batter to load the bases. Brown was pulled after pitching a no-hitter thru four and two-thirds innings and Boyd promptly recorded a strikeout after entering the game.

"I felt bad for him [Brown]," said Strickland referring to Brown being one out away from recording the victory for the game. "I could not take that chance. I gave him a start to lengthen his arm out a bit. The most important thing was to get him some work."

When the Titans batted in the bottom of the inning they took full advantage, which SWOCC was unable to do minutes earlier. Corbett hit an infield single, which was followed by an Ouellette walk. Bradetich and Compo hit back-to-back RBI singles and after a Skundrick walk, Kirby came up with a two-RBI single to push the Titans to a 5-0 lead.

"I'll take a walk anytime," said Ouellette who walked twice in the game. "The people hitting behind me did really well by getting me in."

Bradetich hit an RBI single in the sixth inning to add another run and the Titans won 6-0.

"There's no better situation to play in then when you are in first place and playing well," said Kirby.

Students submitted about 25 plays written over the course of the class this year to the SPA Executive Council, which chose six for the show. The plays chosen include a mix of comedy and drama.

This year the SPA has produced two other plays, "Montana 1948" and "Independence," and co-produced "Six Degrees of Separation." They are now working on their next production, "The Real Inspector Hound," which will open early next fall.

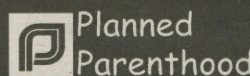

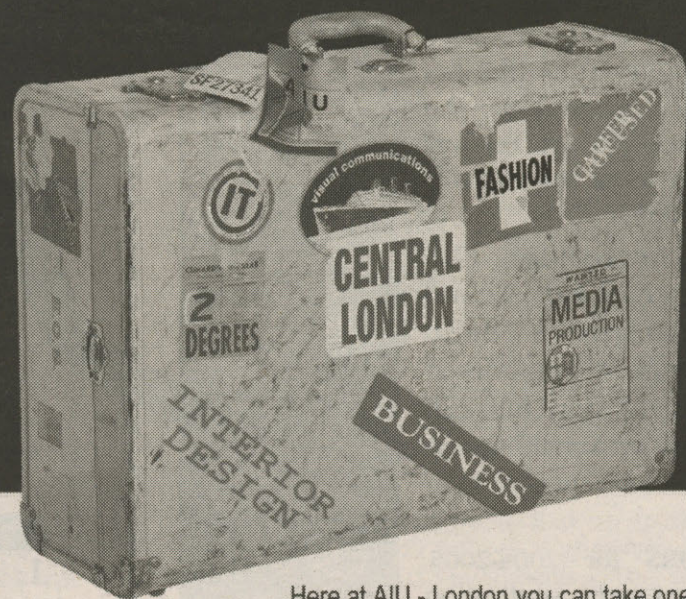
