LinkedIn Learning for Students or Professional Dev.



November is Native American Heritage Month

Please stop by the Library (in the Center Building) to view a **display of books on**Native American and Indigenous art. From beadwork and murals, to painting and live performance, Native artists explore both heritage and contemporary issues of representation and belonging. View the online records of the books on display.



In addition to the art book display, we're highlighting the work of Sean Sherman, an Indigenous chef and author who's a recipient of a James Beard award, the Julia Child award, and a TIME 100 most influential people in 2023. His cooking style is based on North American pre-colonial food systems. Sherman's cookbook, "The Sioux Chef's Indigenous Kitchen" is available through the Library in print and online. We also recommend "Sean Sherman's 10 Essential Native American Recipes," from the New York Times. (If you encounter a paywall, sign up for a Library-sponsored NYTimes ac-
